

## **Guild Peal Week 2007**

The week before the first Suffolk Guild Peal Week in years didn't bode well. Heavy snow brought large parts of the county to a standstill and bird-flu loomed as other parts of the county were restricted. However, as the beginning of the peal week arrived, the snow had disappeared and with few members carrying poultry to peals we were free to commence. If everything had gone to plan, 56 members would've rung fourteen peals at twelve different venues, lead by eight different conductors, with a number of firsts. Although peals were lost at Kempston in Bedfordshire, Orford, Monewden, Grundisburgh, Rendham and the mini-ring at Claydon, Ann Quilton scored her first peal in accomplished style at Monewden, Barry Dixon got his first Cambridge and Lincolnshire Major and three rang their first on 12. Also, the peal at Stowmarket was unable to go ahead due to an injury to a band member in the week leading up to it. This was a particular shame as it was to be Louis Suggett's first as conductor at the age of fifteen. As well as all this, the peal week inspired the Halesworth band to ring a local band peal at Rumburgh, due to be rung on the 28th, February due to other commitments during peal week itself. Thanks must go to all those who turned out to ring and conduct and to those who allowed their bells to be used (especially Horringer at less than 24 hours notice!) and I look forward to even more successes and better luck in Peal Week 2008! Also best wishes must go to our Peal Secretary Christine Knight, we all hope to see her back ringing soon.

## **Report of GMC meeting 21<sup>st</sup> October 2006**

### **Matters Arising**

Barsham PCC has accepted the resignation of the tower captain. A new vicar is to be appointed at the beginning of December and it hoped that the situation will be resolved then.

### **Correspondence**

The Lenny Sharpe bequest was discussed further. It was appreciated that guild views were split over this. The secretary has received a letter of thanks following the grant and it was decided to wait and see if Ixworth come back to the GMC with more figures in the future.

### **Financial Report**

**General Fund.** The projected income for 2006 is £300-£400 less than 2005, made up from subscriptions and peal fees. Expenditure too is projected to be about £350 less than 2005. Overall the General Fund balance is projected to be between £400 and £500 down on the 1<sup>st</sup> January 2006 balance of £3486.

**Restoration Fund.** The income is up £1,700 from last year, as a result of increased interest, donations and affiliation fees. At present £39,000 has been allocated in grants, but not yet paid. The unallocated balance stands at £30,890

The treasurer was asked to reassure the committee that costs could be covered. It was also pointed out that a decrease in subscription income was in part due to a greater percentage of members being over 65 than previously, rather than in reduced membership.

WG told the GMC that KAJ he wishes to stand down at next AGM and suitable candidates for Treasurer need to be sought.

### **Ringling Master's Report**

**Guild Training Day.** Although a success, it seemed to clash with many other events, so a different time of year will be considered.

**Ten Bell Ringing** The possibility of a fun 10 bell striking competition coupled with a social event was being considered. It would enable more people to practice and take part in ringing on higher numbers and as a stepping stone to 12.

Practices for **National Twelve Bell** competition are going well with ringers from across the county taking part.

The Ringing Master has enjoyed young ringers' practices at Tostock and their outing.

Questions were asked about the possibility of forming a movable company of ringers to help cover ringing in more towers and about the reinstatement of the Recruitment and Training Committee.

### **Applications for Grants**

Felsham was awarded a grant of £6000 and Rattlesden £4000.



## Ringer's new heart for joy

Just 24 hours after being placed on the transplant register, Barry Gould had a new heart pumping in his body.

The 64-year-old had not even had time to properly consider his prognosis, of only a year without the operation, when a heart became available.

He was taken by ambulance car to Papworth Hospital, and by 3pm on Jan 4th he was on the critical care ward after having the four-hour life-saving operation.

Mr Gould said: "I can't quite take it in. it's an unreal

Feeling. I could be dead if I hadn't had this heart."

His wife, Brenda, 62, who he has been married to for 37 years added: "The transplant has given us a chance or at least a hope of a longer life together. We weren't prepared to give up on Barry."

Mr Gould feel ill at Christmas 2005, when he thought initially he had a chest infection.

There is still a possibility that his body will reject the heart
