



THE SUFFOLK GUILD OF RINGERS FOR THE DIOCESE OF ST. EDMUNDSBURY AND IPSWICH.

OBJECTS.

- r.—Federation.—To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese, for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2.—**Recognition.**—To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualification for which demands much time, skill, and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3.—Promotion of Change Ringing.—To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Changeringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal-ringing; and to provide, as far possible, and at a reasonable cost, instructors when and where required.
- 4.—**Reform.**—To correct abuses, irregularities, irreverent and unbecoming behaviour in the ringing chamber; to promote a proper appreciation of it as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment of the ringing chamber, as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition, to advocate needful repairs and renovations; and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the conditions of bells and their fittings.

CONSTITUTION.

- 1.—The Guild shall consist of (a) Members, (b) Performing Members, (c) Honorary Members, (d) Life Members.
 - (a) Members may be elected at any meeting when there are five other Members present. Or, by two other Members, before starting for a peal. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid.
 - (b) Performing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a Tower Bell; or on two Handbells retained in hand.
 - (c) Honorary Members may be elected on a life payment of £2 2s. od.; or 2/6 a year; the other Members (including the Clergy), 1/- a year.
 - (d) Life Members, residing out of the Diocese, to pay 5/-.
- 2.—The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Ringing Master, Secretary, Treasurer, each District Secretary, and seven elected Members, who may co-opt three other Members.
- 3.—All these shall be subject to election at each Annual General Meeting, held on Easter Monday, at Ipswich and Bury St. Edmund's alternately.
- 4.—Each Archdeaconry may have its own Secretary, and hold its own Quarterly Meetings.
 - 5.—A District Secretary, in his District, shall
 - (a) Arrange for Meetings for Practice.
 - (b) Arrange for Instruction.
 - (c) Collect the Subscriptions of all Members.

RULES.

- I.—Subscriptions shall be due on January 1st. New Members elected after October 31st shall not pay a second subscription for the next year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st, and on being reminded, does not pay his subscription, shall lose his membership. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 1/- in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Junior Members, under the age of 17, may pay half the subscription and no entrance fee, but in that case may not vote at meetings and will not receive a Report.
- 4.—The Committee may, at its discretion, allow a Tower to compound on payment of 1/- per bell yearly; this to include all the Ringers, Clergy, Steeplekeeper, and Clerk; provided their names are sent to the Secretary with the subscriptions before Jan. 31st each year. Members who wish to be elected in any other month must pay the usual amounts for that year. As many Reports as their are bells will be supplied to the Secretary of a company so compounding. In return for this privilege, Members of such a company should feel in honour bound to obtain as many Honorary Members as possible for the Guild.
- 5.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be such as is approved by the Central Council, and the decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.*
- 6.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for serious offences against the Objects and Rules.
- 7.—These Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting, after notice given at a previous General Meeting, or at each Branch, or District Meeting. The Objects and Constitution can only be altered by a resolution passed at two General Meetings. Provided that the amounts of Subscriptions can be altered at a General Meeting after three months' notice.

THE SUFFOLK GUILD.

REPORT for the Year 1927.

The only outstanding subject during last year has been one of finance. As the year 1926 ended with a small deficit, the matter has had to be one of anxious consideration both of the members, and especially of the committee. They have met several times, and at length unwillingly proposed that the Report now in the printer's hands should be issued without the list of members, and this was endorsed at a general meeting. At first it was hoped that the deficit was only temporary, but as it has been increased during 1927, this is not the case. It is clear that we are spending slightly above our income. As the deficit is not a large one, and should be quite wiped out by printing the smaller Report for one year, it should not be difficult to pay our way in future if we all try.

There are several ways in which we can do this. The number of honorary members is very small, and could be easily doubled. This alone would free us from any anxiety in future. If a tower cannot get one or two people to be sufficiently interested in their ringing to pay 2/6 a year to the Ringers' Guild, it does not speak much for the skill they have attained, or for the pleasure they give to their hearers. We may be sure however, that that is not the reason, and that round every ringing tower there are several people who only need asking, in order to subscribe to us.

Another way is by every member getting certificates. Very many members have not yet got their membership certificates, while very few have applied for certificates of any attainment they may be entitled to. The Central Council is thinking of issuing such certificates, so evidently other ringing associations are not so backward as we are in applying for them.

But the chief way in which we can put our funds straight is by paying our subscriptions. In 1926 just 50 less than half the recorded members paid up. This is a matter of which the remedy is in our own hands. Let every tower see that all its members pay, and promptly. Let every secretary see that all the members in his district pay, and promptly, and we shall have all the money we want and more. The difficulty is largely about members who live at a distance. Obviously it is not worth anyone's time to make a long journey to collect a shilling each year, but could not every outlying member, or tower, be visited once; and an arrangement made by which the subscription in future years would be collected and paid with a minimum of trouble and cost?

So far we have made a good start, and in 1927 we have had 425 ringing members who have paid, against 347 in 1926.

RINGING MASTER'S REPORT.

The peals recorded for the Guild in 1927 have quite maintained the standard of previous years, both as regards quality and quantity; 69 have been rung, as against 64 last year, and 68 in 1925.

The outstanding performance is the Superlative Maximus, at St. Mary-le-Tower, which it is no exaggeration to say has set the whole ringing world talking, and as readers are no doubt aware, has provoked great controversy on method extension. Whatever views one may have on this, the fact remains that it is an exceedingly fine achievement, and the Guild is to be congratulated on having amongst its members a band capable of giving a lead to the whole exercise.

The Leiston band, to whom we always look for good additions to our peal lists, have not failed us, and have maintained their reputation as one of the leading eight bell bands in the country. We are pleased to note the appearance of fresh names in their band; a good sign this!

The band at Lavenham have again done well, and valiantly keeps the torch of change-ringing shining in the west side of the county. Congratulations are due to them on ringing the first peal of Superlative by a local band in W. Suffolk.

The band centred in and around Debenham have again been busy, and rung several good peals.

We are pleased to see another name peal this year, this time by a band of "Georges," rung on the feast day of their patron saint.

Several good performances are recorded on six bells, notably the peals, in seven methods at Benhall, in six methods at Blaxhall and Hasketon, and the peals of Bankes-James arrangement of Cambridge S. Minor at Sproughton. The Hasketon band is new to our list, and we are pleased to see also the Ixworth and Mendlesham bands ringing peals.

In addition to the ringing recorded in peals, there is a large amount of ringing done in the diocese by bands, who for various reasons do not ring peals, but who are nevertheless doing their bit to keep the East Anglian tradition of change ringing alive.


