THE SUFFOLK GUILD OF RINGERS

FOR THE DIOCESE OF

ST. EDMUNDSBURY AND IPSWICH.

OBJECTS.

- 1.—Federation. To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese, for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2.—Recognition. To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualification for which demands much time, skill, and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3.—Promotion of Change Ringing. To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Change Ringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, and at a reasonable cost, instructors when and where required.
- 4.—Reform. To correct abuses, irregularities, irreverent and unbecoming behaviour in the ringing chamber; to promote a proper appreciation of it as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment of the ringing chamber, as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition, to advocate needful repairs and renovations; and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the conditions of bells and their fittings.

CONSTITUTION.

- 1.—The Guild shall consist of (a) Members, (b) Performing Members, (c) Honorary Members, (d) Life Members.
 - (a) Members may be elected at any meeting when there are five other Members present. Or, by two other Members, before starting for a peal. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid.
 - (b) Performing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a Tower Bell; or on two Handbells retained in hand.
 - (c) Honorary Members may be elected on a life payment of £2 2s. 0d.; or 2/6 a year; the other Members (including the Clergy), 1/6 a year.
 - (d) Life Members, residing out of the Diocese, to pay 5/-.
- 2.—The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Ringing Master, Secretary, Treasurer, each District Secretary, and seven elected Members, who may co-opt three other Members.
- 3.—All these shall be subject to election at each Annual General Meeting, held after Easter Day at Ipswich and Bury St. Edmund's alternately.
- 4.—Each Archdeaconry may have its own Secretary, and hold its own Quarterly Meetings.
 - 5.—A District Secretary, in his District, shall
 - (a) Arrange for Meetings for Practice.
 - (b) Arrange for Instruction.
 - (c) Collect the Subscriptions of all Members.
- N.B.—In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary (or Captain, or Ringing Master), who shall collect all Subscriptions as soon after January 1st as possible, and send them to the District Secretary.
- 6.—This Guild shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Change Ringers, and shall loyally abide by the Rules and decisions thereof.

RULES.

- 1.—Subscriptions shall be due on January 1st. New Members elected after October 31st shall not pay a second subscription for the next year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st, and on being reminded, does not pay his subscription, shall lose his membership. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 1/- in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Junior Members, under the age of 17, may pay half the subscription and no entrance fee, but in that case may not vote at meetings and will not receive a Report.
- 4.—The Committee may, at its discretion, allow a Tower to compound on payment of 1.6 per bell yearly; this to include all the Ringers, Clergy, Steeplekeeper, and Clerk; provided their names are sent to the Secretary with the subscriptions before January 31st each year. Members who wish to be elected in any other month must pay the usual amounts for that year. As many Reports as there are bells will be supplied to the Secretary of a Company so compounding. In return for this privilege, Members of such a Company should feel in honour bound to obtain as many Honorary Members as possible for the Guild.
- 5.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be such as is approved by the Central Council, and the decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.*
- 6.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for serious offences against the Objects and Rules.
- 7.—These Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting, after notice given at a previous General Meeting or at each Branch or District Meeting. The Objects and Constitution can only be altered by a resolution passed at two General Meetings. Provided that the amounts of Subscriptions can be altered at a General Meeting after three months' notice.

THE SUFFOLK GUILD.

Report for 1933.

Although the new subscription only takes effect this coming year, yet the fact that the change was made in 1933, brings the matter into our present Report. The change seems to have had the wholesome result of causing members to pay more punctually last year. Also the accounts were not closed arbitrarily on December 31st, but a few days later, so as to get in all the 1933 money. The result has been that we have in fact increased our balance slightly during the year. The suggestion was made last year that the different bands should collect the subscriptions of their members at the first meeting in January, and send the amount at once to their District Secretary. This has been done in many cases, so that we ought not to be in any financial difficulty in future.

Each year lately we have chronicled the re-hanging of eight bell rings. So we now have Wilby, Halesworth, Southwold, Debenham, Stradbroke, and this year Woodbridge, as pleasant towers to ring in. Ufford and All Saints Sudbury, are at present silent, awaiting repairs, and we hope soon to ring again at Kelsale. Of six bell towers, Otley can rejoice in their new and well-made frame; but Saxmundham is not yet put into ringing order.

We have not so far made a list of the cracked bells in the Diocese; but four of the bells at Woodbridge, which were cracked, have been welded, one of the three at Kettlebaston, and the single bell at Blythburgh. These are all now ringing quite well again, so we may hope soon that all cracked bells will be a thing of the not-very-creditable past.

Quite a number of new bands are learning changes, but they are not far enough advanced to join the Guild.

Ringing Master's Report, 1933.

The general decline in the number of peals rung throughout the country as disclosed in the C.C. analysis, extended to Suffolk, and we have a considerable decrease to record, 83 against 101 in 1932. Various reasons, which will readily occur to our members, can be assigned for this, and does not necessarily mean that less ringing has been done. The most disturbing feature is the decline in Minor ringing. In the three years 1928-30, 93 peals of Minor were recorded, against 57 in the three years 1931-33; this should give rise to serious thought, and stimulate us to give every assistance to the encouragement of ringing in the six-bell towers and country districts.

Although our peal list has lost somewhat in quantity, the high standard of recent years has been well maintained, and new additions have to be recorded in Little Albion T.B. Max., and Bosmere, Daventry, Waveney, and Woodbridge S. Major. In recording the four latter methods, it is a pleasure to note that the Suffolk Guild, by the efforts of two of its premier companies, is maintaining a foremost place in the remarkable development in Surprise ringing which has taken place in recent years.

Peals were rung in 34 different towers, Framsden with 16 being easily first. 161 members took part, 29 of whom shared the conducting. Several members have rung their first peal during the year, and others their first in various methods.

Meetings have been held at several places during the year, and have been fairly well attended; but it is to be hoped that more members will support them, and take advantage of the opportunities offered of practice and instruction.
