

#### THE SUFFOLK GUILD OF RINGERS

FOR THE DIOCESE OF

#### ST. EDMUNDSBURY AND IPSWICH.

#### **OBJECTS:**

- 1.—Federation. To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2.—Recognition. To obtain full recognition of the ringers office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualifications for which demands much time, skill, and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3.—Promotion of Change Ringing. To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Change Ringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, instructors when and where required.
- 4.—Reform. To promote a proper appreciation of the ringing chamber as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment thereof, as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition, to advocate needful repairs and renovations and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the condition of bells and their fittings.

#### CONSTITUTION.

- 1.—The Officers of the Guild shall consist of: The Bishop as President, Patrons, Vice-Presidents, Ringing Master, Secretary, Clerical Secretary, Treasurer, and Auditor.
- 2.—The Guild shall consist of (a) Ringing Members, (b) Honorary Members, (c) Life Members.
  - (a) Ringing Members may be elected at any meeting where there are five other Members present, or, provisionally by two other Members, before starting for a peal. Ringing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Ringing Members shall be 2s. 6d. per year.
  - (b) Honorary Members may be elected on a life payment of £2 2s. 0d., or 2s. 6d. per year.
  - (c) Life Members, residing out of the Diocese, to make a single payment of 5s.
- 3.—The Committee shall consist of the Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer and seven elected members, to be subject to election at each Annual Meeting, who may co-opt three other members. Four to form a quorum.
- 4.—The area covered by the Guild shall be divided into districts each of which shall have its own Ringing Master and Secretary. The Secretary will
  - (a) Arrange Meetings for Practice.
  - (b) Arrange for Instruction.
  - (c) Collect the Subscriptions of all Members.
- N.B.—In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary (or Captain, or Ringing Master), who shall collect all Subscriptions as soon as possible after January 1st and send them to the District Secretary.
  - (d) Forward these subscriptions to the General Secretary together with his Receipt Book and details of any expenditure, at the end of the year for audit.
- 5.—The Guild shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Change Ringers, and shall loyally abide by the Rules and decisions thereof.

#### RULES.

- 1.—Subscriptions shall be due on January 1st. New Members elected after October 31st will not be required to pay a second subscription for the following year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st shall lose his membership. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 2s. in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Probationers under the age of 16 may be elected on payment of half the annual subscription.
- 4.—The Committee may allow a Tower to compound on payment of 2s. 6d. per bell yearly; this to include all the ringers whose names shall be sent to the Secretary at the time of payment of the annual subscription.
- 5.—Should a ringing member, having paid five consecutive years' subscription, remove from the Diocese, he may without payment, become a Non-Resident member for such time as he continues to reside outside the Diocese.
- 6.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be under the direction of a Ringing Master and shall be such as is approved by the Central Council. The decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.
- 7.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for a serious offence against the Objects and Rules. Subject to appeal at a General Meeting.
- 8.—The Objects, Constitution and Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting after three months' notice given at a General Meeting.

#### REPORT FOR 1946.

The increase of ringing member's subscriptions, which was discussed at the last annual meeting, was put into effect at a meeting at Bury St. Edmunds on January 5th, together with the Revised Rules, Objects and Constitution which were drawn up by a Rules Committee.

Much publicity was given to the revision prior to adoption and we thank Mr. Oliver Barnard for providing the copies which were distributed to District Secretaries.

Many changes have taken place since the last report and the work of the Secretaries will be made easier if all members pay their subscriptions early in the year.

In order to ensure a more complete audit, it will be appreciated if District Secretaries will forward their receipt books, together with cash and accounts, at the end of the year to the General Secretary.

The Annual Meeting will take place at Ipswich on Easter Monday, as it is felt that members would prefer more time for ringing. Bells will be available from an early hour and it is intended to provide a good lunch which will follow the mid-day service at St. Mary-le-Tower. A good attendance is requested and those requiring lunch will be wise in notifying the Secretary in good time as the number will be limited.

Following the decision made at the last Annual Meeting, the names of only those who have paid subscriptions up to and including 1945 have been published in the Report. Much care has been taken to ensure accuracy, but any mistakes will be rectified if written notification is given to the General Secretary. The subscriptions of members serving in H.M. Forces are waived, but the privileges of the Guild are extended to them during their service.

#### SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR 1940-45.

After nearly six long and weary years of war the activities of the Guild are gradually reviving and 1946 opens with hope and promise. Ringing, like any other phase of normal life was disrupted and suffered badly, and a gigantic effort on the part of all of us is required to put the Guild on the footing it rightly deserves.

Many of our bells were unrung before the war, and it would be no exaggeration to say the present position is many times worse, and in this connection alone I ask everyone of you to do all in your power to improve this unhappy state of affairs.

There are many towers with bells in good condition but with no ringers to sound them, and I think it is our rightful duty to visit these isolated parishes now and again to convey the joyful message of the bells to the public. That the people still love the sound of their Church bells properly rung, there is not the slightest doubt, and I dare say many young recruits in all parts of the county will be attracted to our art, compensating us in time for our trouble and finally proving themselves assets to the Guild.

Upon examination it will therefore be seen that our duty to the Church, the public, the Guild and ourselves, is to see to it we are strict Sunday service ringers, visiting occasionally those towers where there are no ringers and keeping an ever open eye for the right type of young person as a potential ringer and giving that training which will ensure good striking and keenness, and a worthy member of the Guild.

The years of war have taken a heavy toll of our membership; age, too, is showing its signs on some of our most brilliant and reliable ringers and if we are to reach the high peak once enjoyed by our 6, 8 and 12 bell ringers, we must look for new and young blood to fill the ranks.

The next few years will prove the greatest test our art has ever faced, as the aftermath of a war usually does, and an even greater test will be put to change ringing than we faced after the 1914-18 war.

With the many types of pleasure and amusement and the easy means of travel that are presented us to-day, we may find

ourselves as voices crying in the wilderness, and the danger that ringing is dying out, so often repeated in the past as a prophecy, may in fact become a reality.

But now is the time to face up to these facts and to see to it that never (at least in our lifetime) shall ringing of any kind vanish from the face of the earth. Never let it be said that the glorious sound of Church bells, together with its traditional art which has been handed down to us for hundreds of years, died a natural death in the middle of the 20th century, due to the lack of interest of the ringers of that time, who had the chance to revive it.

We have our chance and a better one than was ever available. The majority of our bells are in good order and some magnificent rings hang in towers throughout the county. Transport too is fairly easy, but we must all, every one of us, pull our weight and ring our bells and find those recruits and ever be ready to improve our knowledge and striking.

In electing me as General Secretary you have rendered me an honour which I trust I may repay by efficiently carrying out the many duties involved in this office and by any improvement conducive to the welfare of the Guild and to the happiness and pleasure of you all, and finally, if not firstly, to the service of the Church and the public. My first duty was to visit Long Melford far away from us here in East Suffolk. I have hitherto understood this district to be on its last legs, but I was agreeably surprised to find a fairly large gathering of ringers turn up, and the ringing itself to be of a superior quality. It was at this meeting that Mr. E. Ambrose, who had faithfully held the position of District Secretary for many years, announced his wish to retire and Mr. Archie Fitch was elected to the vacancy. I formed the opinion that Mr. Fitch was the right man for the job and I am most happy to say I have had no reason to alter that opinion.

At a later date I journeyed to Clare, again with the idea that I should be lucky if I found a band large enough to ring the 8 bells. Suffice to say the meeting was a success and some good striking was enjoyed on these ponderous but lovely bells.

At a meeting at Horringer another change of District Secretaries took place when Mr. A. Gillings took over office from

Mr. W. Chinery, of the Bury district and once again I felt we were fortunate in securing such an enthusiastic young man. Indeed, Mr. Gillings has already proved himself a great asset to the Guild and I look upon him as one of my right hand men. At a joint meeting at Beccles, organised by Mr. Edwin Goate, I met many old friends and by the numbers that were present one had little doubt of the high esteem in which Mr. Goate is held.

Another successful meeting was at Halesworth and some good ringing by members far and near was brought round. The very name of this East Anglian town reminds all of us of Mr. Fred Lambert, a loyal and faithful Secretary of the Guild. We were sad to find he had been removed to hospital, but I am most thankful to say he is now out and about and carrying on the good work.

Lavenham day was enjoyed by hundreds so it seemed, judging by the crowds who invaded the mighty tower and it was good to see Mr. Stedman Symonds and his regular Sunday service band in their usual fine form, famous for their striking.

The vacant District Secretaryship at Hadleigh caused by the death of Mr. Charles F. Mee, was filled by Mr. Joe Corder, one of the young band in training at this noted tower. I am amazed at the pertinacity of these young people at Hadleigh. Their enthusiasm is undaunted in spite of the poor going of these great bells and one can only admire them for their continued Saturday night practices and regular Sunday service ringing, and I dare to prophecy that some good material will emanate from this district. I wish Mr. Corder and the Hadleigh band, with their lady heavy bell ringer, good luck and good ringing.

Meetings have also been held at Debenham, where Mr. Rumsey holds the fort. What an example to us young ringers is Mr. Rumsey's record, in training recruits, Sunday service duties, ringing peals in all parts of the county (an enormous amount of which he has conducted), a perfect striker, a safe ringer and conductor and, an unequalled man on a heavy bell, and finally his long and faithful term of office as District Secretary. Although his health has impaired his activities, I trust he may be spared many more years to help us through the difficult transitional period that lies ahead.

In the Helmingham and Framsden towers we have had well attended meetings with a very high grade of method ringing, as is to be expected when in the company of these highly skilled ringers whose performances before the war left us breathless. The records of Messrs. Last, Wightman, Brett, Bennett, Pryke, A. Whiting and the late G. Whiting are worthy of study.

Due to ill health Mr. John Arbon has resigned the Secretaryship of Framlingham district. He, too, has been a good man and his office is held by Mr. W. E. Maulden, one of the most popular men in Suffolk and a talented ringer of bells in hand and in the tower. I hope most sincerely he will stay with us as an officer of the Guild.

Mr. Filby is plodding away in Fressingfield district and his bells at Wingfield are undergoing repair, while in the Eye district, with Mr. Roy Nelthorpe serving in H.M. Forces in India, not a single person has paid the Guild subscription. I hope to visit this district in the near future with a view to rectifying this unhappy state of affairs.

The Mildenhall district has had no Secretary for several years and no subscriptions have been received from any of its members. This is not to be wondered at if there is no Secretary to arrange frequent meetings and I intend putting in a new leader or suggesting an amalgamation with Bury.

The Saxmundham district, under Mr. W. Smith, has rendered a fair amount of subscriptions and we look to this district to show us it has still some of its life left, and those prolific records of the past which have gone down in ringing history are capable of repetition.

We are glad to see the return of Mr. H. D. Lister to Stow-market and we remember his notable performances up to the outbreak of war. With Mr. Oliver Barnard as a reinforcement to the local company and a coming leader in the Guild, together with Mr. G. Blaxcell to push up the peal totals, and Mr. Bertie Chilvers as Secretary, there is every indication of the success of this district.

Mr. Fred Bowell and his assistant, Mr. Geo. E. Symonds, have retired from office in the Ipswich district. Mr. Bowell

is well known for his success as a friend and trainer of beginners and Mr. Symonds' name is world wide as a ringer and conductor. The district is now under the leadership of Mr. James W. Jennings, a keen young man with instructors' qualifications, and we feel confident of his success.

Last of all comes Woodbridge district, which has been under the able guidance of Mr. Charles E. Fisher, whose popularity has gained him a name well known in Norfolk and Suffolk. As Treasurer and District Secretary since the formation of the Guild, as a trainer and conductor and regular Church attendant and Sunday service ringer, Mr. Fisher has gained high respect for his contribution to the Guild and the exercise. It was with great regret that we had to accept his resignation of office and although I thank him publicly I feel we are in his debt for the loyal and loving work he rendered the Guild for so many years. Thank you, Mr. Fisher. You have elected me to fill these two positions for the time being and I trust the confidence you have in me will not be misplaced.

In conclusion, I thank all members for their loyalty to the District Secretaries and to 'myself, and ask for still greater co-operation all round, with more recruits and more service ringing, always with the thought behind our minds that only the best is good enough for God and the Church.

## RINGING MASTER'S REPORT, 1940-45.

During the period under review, 47 peals have been rung for the Guild, the yearly totals being: 1939, 2; 1940, 2; 1941, 1; 1942, 4; 1943, 1; 1944, 10; 1945, 27. The ringers taking part in these peals numbered 94; those appearing as conductors being 17. For the first time in many years no new methods have been recorded, peal ringers confining themselves generally to the old favourite Standard methods, the old East Anglian preference for "Tenor in" is again shown; no peals with the Tenor covering have been rung.

During the ban years ringing became in a more or less moribund condition, only those places with a tradition of handbell ringing being able to keep practical interest alive. As will be seen in the peal list, a few handbell peals were rung in and near Ipswich; it may be of interest to record that the last part of one of these was rung after the "Alert" siren had sounded. It is to be wished that more ringers would take up this very fascinating branch of the art.

The ban was lifted on two occasions and each time bands responded as well as their depleted numbers would allow, and the bells rang out their message of Victory. With the complete lifting of the ban, peals became more numerous, although they were mostly confined to one small district bounded by Debenham, Framsden, Helmingham and Woodbridge. Perhaps as members get back from the Forces and things return to normal, we shall see peals rung in other parts of the county; peals do not of course represent everything in ringing, far from it, there are other interests, Sunday Service ringing, Guild meetings, where we can renew old friendships, and so on, yet it cannot be gainsaid that peal ringers show a keen and healthy interest in the art.

Amongst the peal ringers are noted two remarkable young performers, Master Geo. W. Pipe, who rang his first peal—Bob Major at Woodbridge—at the age of ten, and Master John R. Mayne, who rang a peal of Camb. S. Major at Ufford at the age of twelve; both have the advantage of having parents who are good ringers. They are to be congratulated on their achievements, which should be an encouraging example to other young performers.

## R.J.P.

We offer sincere sympathies to the relatives of the following members of the Guild who have died since the last report.

- ABLITT, GEORGE A. For many years captain and ringer at Hasketon. His peals for the Guild numbered close on 100, many of which he conducted. He had rung over 100 for the N.D.A.
- BOWELL, ALFRED, BELLFOUNDER, OF IPSWICH. The whole exercise has suffered a great loss by his passing. His skill as a bell hanger was unequalled and his genial personality gained him wide popularity with all whom he came into contact. Peals, 2; N.D.A., 23.
- CATCHPOLE, CHARLES A. Ringer at St. Mary-le-Tower and a great friend of all who knew him. His death was deeply regretted and we feel we have not only lost a great ringer, but a dear friend. His peals numbered 175. N.D.A., 130.
- CRICKMER, WILLIAM C., of EARL SOHAM. He was famous as a ringer in the 16,608 Oxford Treble Bob at Debenham on June 6th, 1892, which occupied 10 hours 32 minutes. He had rung 6 peals for the Guild and 119 for the N.D.A.
- FARNISH, GEORGE, ASHBOCKING. Well known for his preference of six bell towers and good striking. An able conductor, he had rung about 50 peals.
- MEE, CHARLES. His passing was heard with regret by the hundreds who knew him, for there was never a more lovable man. As a ringer and conductor on bells in hand and in the tower, he was supreme in his day. His peals for the Guild numbered 26. For the N.D.A., 121.
- RIVERS, EDGAR, SPROUGHTON. A great ringer of years gone by; his passing has left a gap in our ranks. His peals numbered 26, but a far greater number with the N.D.A.
- SHEMMING, HERBERT W. Member of St. Mary-le-Tower with whom he had rung some worthy 12 bell reals. He gave his life for his Country while in H.M. Forces and we regret the loss of this young and promising ringer. Our sympathies go out to his father, George and brother, Charles. He had rung 26 peals for the Guild.

- SMITH, FREDERICK J. Another sad loss to St. Mary-le-Tower, with whom he had been a member several years after leaving Leiston. A splendid ringer in all methods on all numbers and a genial disposition. We miss him greatly. His peals totalled 126 for the Guild and 98 for the N.D.A.
- SMITH, JAMES. Captain and ringer at St. Margaret's, Ipswich and one of the old brigade and a champion of Bob Triples, which was his first peal.
- WARD, WILLIAM. An old member of the Guild and the N.D.A., he lived for many years at Ufford and in his younger days rang several notable peals at Woodbridge and district.
- WATLING, FREDERICK, of SAXMUNDHAM. Well known in East Anglia at the beginning of the century for his six and eight bell peals. The dryness of his tales and jokes made him popular wherever he went, but the sharpness of his tongue when striking was not up to his high standard earned him great respect. He had rung about 100 peals.
- WHITING, GEORGE, HELMINGHAM. We have indeed lost a most talented ringer and conductor and his place will be hard to fill. George Whiting made a name in Suffolk ringing history in ringing so wide and varied a number of peals, many of which he conducted, and as a man he was loved by all who knew him. He had rung 123 peals for the Guild and 50 for the N.D.A.
- BAILEY, EDGAR, H. Latterly of Aldeburgh and the eldest of the Bailey brothers; his passing is regretted but his contribution to the Ringing Exercise has been enormous. In the flourishing years when Baileys and Leiston were the marvel of ringers up and down the country, Edgar Bailey made a name which will go down in ringing history. His peals for the Guild numbered 19, while for the N.D.A. they totalled 242, including 39 on handbells on all numbers.
- DURRANT, ALBERT, IPSWICH. Although not on the active list during the latter 10 years of his life, his name was great in the days of James Motts and Charles Mee, with whom he rang many a good peal on handbells and in the tower. Albert Durrant loved good striking and was interested more in quality than quantity and we are the poorer by his passing. He rang 36 peals for the Guild and 85 for the N.D.A.
- LINDOFF, GABRIEL, of DUBLIN. Life member. We mourn the loss of one of the greatest men in the Exercise, but his name will live for ever in the annals of ringing. As a composer he had no equal and as a man he was loved by all. A great gentleman.

- COLES, CHARLES T., HIGHAMS PARK. Life member. One of the greatest ringers that ever lived, his death came suddenly and we were grieved at the news. He was one of the few who had rung over 1,000 peals and conducted a high percentage of that number. Tom Coles was a gentleman in more ways than one. His quiet charm and ever ready eagerness to make way for one to stand in or call a peal, his ability in organising, and his quiet manner in teaching, together with other abilities, made him one of the most popular and respected of ringers in the country.
- DAVIS, JAMES E., WALWORTH, S.E. Life member. He was known from one end of the country to the other and will be remembered as one of the greatest conductors in his time, With over 1,000 peals to his credit, Jim Davis was at home on all numbers of bells and the Exercise has suffered a great loss by his passing.
- FUSSELL, WILLIAM E., SLOUGH, BUCKS. Life member. One of nature's finest of gentlemen, renowned for his wit and unending stream of stories, a great organiser and writer, and an architect by profession, the late Bill Fussell leaves behind him history that will be read as long as bells are rung. We deeply regret to part with another of those great ringers whose peal totals reach well over the 1,000 mark.
- PYE, GEORGE R., CHADWELL HEATH. Life member. We deeply regret the passing of this most talented ringer whose name we were proud to associate with. Brother of the late William Pye, surely the greatest ringer that ever lived. Bob Pye held laurels high in the Exercise and as a ringer, conductor and gentleman he had no equal. He too, reached the terrific figure of 1,000 peals and well towards the 2,000 mark. We mourn his loss and cherish his memory.
- PIKE, EDWIN F., BROCKLEY. Life member. Suffolk born and a good all round ringer combined with a jovial personality. His passing leaves a gap in London ringers.
- BRETT, ERNEST, CITY OF LONDON. Suffolk born and well known as a member of St. Andrew's, Holborn. Sadly missed.
- MADGWICK, WILLIAM R., LONDON. A first class ringer on all numbers and who had travelled the world. Once resided in Ipswich and was attached to St. Mary-le-Tower.
- POPNELL, GEORGE, NEWPORT, MON. A young and clever ringer of a cheerful disposition. His death is a blow to towers in Wales.

- HOLMAN, JOHN, SHEFFIELD. One of the most loved men in the North of England, he was a service ringer and conductor at the Cathedral for many years.
- HOWARD, CHARLES. Master of the Essex Association for many years. Not a great peal ringer, but cherished a love for good Sunday service ringing. A great loss to Essex.
- NEVARD, WILLIAM, GREAT BENTLEY. Well known all over East Anglia and had done a lot for the Essex Association, including his own parish bells, which he restored at his own expense.
- FITZJOHN, THOMAS, SCARTHO. Formerly of Norfolk, and a staunch supporter of the N.D.A. One of the old school and could be termed a "Fine old English Gentleman."
