



### RULES.

- 1.—Subscriptions shall be due on January 1st. New Members elected after October 31st will not be required to pay a second subscription for the following year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st shall lose his membership. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 2s. in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Probationers under the age of 16 may be elected on payment of half the annual subscription.
- 4.—The Committee may allow a Tower to compound on payment of 2s. 6d. per bell yearly; this to include all the ringers whose names shall be sent to the Secretary at the time of payment of the annual subscription.
- 5.—Should a ringing member, having paid five consecutive years' subscription, remove from the Diocese, he may without payment, become a Non-Resident member for such time as he continues to reside outside the Diocese.
- 6.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be under the direction of a Ringing Master and shall be such as is approved by the Central Council. The decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.
- 7.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for a serious offence against the Objects and Rules. Subject to appeal at a General Meeting.
- 8.—The Objects, Constitution and Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting after three months' notice given at a General Meeting.

### SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR 1946.

As I write on this New Year's night, I look back on the year that has passed with mixed feelings of satisfaction and regret. Satisfaction on the steady progress of the Guild by increased recruits, re-instatement of members, more peals and conductors and greatest of all, more bells rung for Sunday services. Regret by the loss of several valuable ringers by death, among them Mr. William C. Rumsey, of Debenham, whose performances up to the beginning of the war, made news, and whose service to the Guild as District Secretary was held in high esteem. Bill Rumsey was a man we could least afford to part with, but a Greater Power has called him to his last Home and we are left with his pleasant memories. Would that there arise a dozen men from among us endowed with all his capabilities, we would indeed be rich.

Another item of regret is the small amount of District Secretaries who have remitted subscriptions for 1946. Five in all, including my own district, which leaves nine unpaid. This will seriously affect our credit balance, but I hope for a happier position by the date of the Annual Meeting, when we should be able to show a record financial year.

You will, I am sure, smile at these last few words and visualise what is in the back of my mind. You are quite right and I will not try to hide the fact, but rather to shout from the hilltop in as loud a voice as possible.

It has been proposed and seconded at a General Meeting that a Bells Restoration Fund be formed by the Guild headed by the £40 3% Defence Bonds and swelled by part of our credit balance and a substantial amount of this fund donated to the Grundisburgh Bells Fund. I make no apologies for my persistency in this connection and I trust you will all back me to the last man and maid and help me achieve my collossal task to raise the £1,000 required. I have put my hands on nearly £200 since the last Annual Meeting and which, by the way, has not been easy. The remaining £800 is going to be a far greater task and I shall require not only your sympathy and good wishes, but all the money you can give me. If You, dear reader, and all members of the Guild send me £1 this year, Grundisburgh Bells will be re-hung and ready for your enjoyment in far less time than they

are likely to be at present. I cherish the idea of a light peal of ten, which would be very useful to the district, but as beggars cannot be choosers, I must concentrate on the re-hanging of the present eight bells for your future pleasure.

I have given advice on the prospective trebles at Mildenhall and although the money was quickly raised, I hear no news of their immediate installation at the time of writing. This grand tower and present peal, together with two new trebles, should prove an acquisition to the County, and may mean the revival and increase of the art in this remote corner of our hunting ground. Here I would like to say "Good luck and our best wishes to you, Mr. Fordham and Mr. Wallis."

Many meetings have been held during the year in all parts of the county and I have made it my business to visit as many as circumstances would permit. Travel is still difficult and has been the reason for my non-attendance at some obscure District Meeting. Bungay, Fressingfield, Stradbroke, Southwold, Leiston, are only a few of the places I would like to see meetings at, but for the time being I must leave these towers in the hands of our capable District Secretaries and instead of buying that car I must put my spare cash into Grundisburgh Bells Fund!!

Some good meetings have been enjoyed at Bury under the vigilant eye of Mr. Gillings, and again at Hadleigh in the hands of Mr. Joe Corder, while the Annual Meeting at Ipswich was a fair success, I believe. We enjoyed having the Bishop give us his interesting address and his presence, with other clergy, at the lunch, made the occasion a notable one. The lunch was quite good, which reminds me to tell you I hope to arrange an even better one this year.

An exceptionally well attended meeting was held at Mildenhall and the 50 ringers were entertained to tea and presided over by the Vicar, the Rev. J. Sawbridge. At the business meeting which followed, mention was made of a suggestion to re-hang the bells in ball bearings. Those present were asked to vote whether they were in favour of ball bearings or to let the bells remain in the present plain bearings. It was interesting and revealing to note that 100% voted in favour of the latter.

Meetings at Stowmarket and Sudbury have been held and proved remarkably successful. On two occasions the Ladies'

Guild held the reins while Guild members were happy to do as they were told and we thank Messrs. Barnard and Fitch for their very efficient arrangements which largely contributed to the success of these events.

As regards peals. We took great pleasure before the war in recording some new methods rung by our friends at Leiston and Helmingham and while it is not possible to record a new method rung, we have again broken the ice in doing something new for the Guild by the ringing of a peal in 4 spliced Surprise methods, which took place at Framsden, conducted by Mr. Leslie C. Wightman. The peal of Bob Caters at Ipswich, apart from being beautifully rung, was a new departure from usual practice. Little Bob Maximus was also rung for the first time.

I trust I shall not stand rebuked for writing in bad taste if I mention the second peal of Spliced Surprise at Framsden, which was conducted by my wife, the first lady to reach this zenith in conducting. To her and Mr. Wightman I raise my hat. and to my son, George, in ringing peals of Cambridge and Superlative Major on an inside bell at the age of eleven, I say "Well done."

Mr. Harry Lister has begun a revival of his valuable pre-war work and I am glad to notice there is evidence of more than one peal conductor at Stowmarket. Mr. James E. Bailey has put in some useful work in the Leiston district and the two Leslies at Framsden have again pulled their weight. One name is conspicuous by its absence and in referring to our popular Master, may I say that ill health has prevented him fron appearing in our peals columns. My earnest hope, and that of yours I am sure, is for his speedy recovery to normal health again.

Let me not however, forget to mention the great percentage of those whose names rarely appear in print, but who never-the-less are the backbone of the Guild and ringing in general. Those modest stalwarts who attend regularly their service ringing practices and meetings, and take upon themselves the unthankful task of finding and teaching beginners, deserve our whole-hearted thanks. Your good work is not overlooked and we salute you.

Our District Secretaries have done good work again, Many district meetings have taken place and every member of the

Guild should have had ample opportunity of receiving his money's worth in ringing and meeting old friends. The social side plays a great part in our ringing life and much pleasure is gained from this aspect alone.

The work of the District Secretaries can be made easier and brighter if all members would make a point of attending as many meetings as possible and having put in an appearance, be ever ready to ring when called upon to do so, or to be frank and tell the M.C. the particular method required. Last, but by no means least, the prompt payment of subscriptions at the *beginning* of the year.

We have entered a New Year with all its hopes and fears. What are to be our resolutions? I give you one word: FORWARD. Put in more Sunday service attendances, more practices. Attend more meetings. Find and train the new blood. Help that youngster through that first Peal. Ring and conduct that first or new 720 or Peal and finally, do something which will give you the satisfaction of having DONE something for yourself, your neighbours and the Guild. I thank you one and all for your continued loyalty and support.

### TREASURER'S REPORT FOR 1946.

The subscriptions of more than half the members who paid during 1946 were not received by me before 31st December, consequently they cannot be shown in this report and our credit balance is not as great as that I had hoped for.

Nevertheless our District Secretaries have done a grand job and the membership has greatly increased for since January 1st I have received subscriptions for no less than 113, which brings the total of our Ringing Members up to 238.

The sum of £14 10s. 0d., representing late 1946 subscriptions, has been paid into the bank since January 1st, 1947, which can be added to our credit balance as shown at 31st December. Together with our £40 War Bonds and £1 3s. 0d. held to our credit with "The Ringing World" our capital to date (January, 1947) is £92 7s. 2d.

I would like to see more honorary members, whose subscriptions have not been increased, chiefly as an inducement to join our ranks.

A large list of honoraries is a great asset to any Association not merely as a means of swelling the credit balance, but retains the interest of a large body of non-performers all over the county, and contributes to a great extent towards the success of the Guild.

May I ask all members to make a special effort to secure their local clergy, relatives and friends and other well wishers of the Guild into this class of membership.

Here I would like to thank Mr. J. M. Bailey, of Leiston, who has revived the hon. membership of 10.

The rules of the Guild are that no peal shall be credited unless all performers are members and have paid their subscription for the year in which the peal was rung, excepting Life Members.

We are glad to see peals rung and have no desire to discount any performance due to a ringer or ringers not having paid their subscription but in future this rule WILL be strictly adhered to and we advise conductors to make sure that all ringers are bona fide members.
