



THE SUFFOLK GUILD OF RINGERS

FOR THE DIOCESE OF

ST. EDMUNDSBURY AND IPSWICH.

OBJECTS:

- 1.—**Federation.** To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2.—Recognition. To obtain full recognition of the ringers office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualifications for which demands much time, skill, and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3.—Promotion of Change Ringing. To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Change Ringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, instructors when and where required.
- 4.—Reform. To promote a proper appreciation of the ringing chamber as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment thereof, as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition, to advocate needful repairs and renovations and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the condition of bells and their fittings.

CONSTITUTION.

- 1.—The Officers of the Guild shall consist of: The Bishop as President, Patrons, Vice-Presidents, Ringing Master, Secretary, Clerical Secretary, Treasurer, and Auditor.
- 2.—The Guild shall consist of (a) Ringing Members, (b) Honorary Members, (c) Life Members.
 - (a) Ringing Members may be elected at any meeting where there are five other Members present, or, provisionally by two other Members, before starting for a peal. Ringing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. 'The subscription of Ringing Members shall be 2s. 6d. per year.
 - (b) Honorary Members may be elected on a life payment of £2 2s. 0d., or 2s. 6d. per year.
 - (c) Life Members, residing out of the Diocese, to make a single payment of 5s.
- 3.—The Committee shall consist of the Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer and seven elected members, to be subject to election at each Annual Meeting, who may co-opt three other members. Four to form a quorum.
- 4.—The area covered by the Guild shall be divided into districts each of which shall have its own Ringing Master and Secretary. The Secretary will
 - (a) Arrange Meetings for Practice.
 - (b) Arrange for Instruction.
 - (c) Collect the Subscriptions of all Members.
- N.B.—In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary (or Captain, or Ringing Master), who shall collect all Subscriptions as soon as possible after January 1st and send them to the District Secretary.
 - (d) Forward these subscriptions to the General Secretary together with his Receipt Book and details of any expenditure, at the end of the year for audit.
- 5.—The Guild shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Change Ringers, and shall loyally abide by the Rules and decisions thereof.

RULES.

- 1.—Subscriptions shall be due on January 1st. New Members elected after October 31st will not be required to pay a second subscription for the following year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st shall lose his membership. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 2s. in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Probationers under the age of 16 may be elected on payment of half the annual subscription.
- 4.—The Committee may allow a Tower to compound on payment of 2s. 6d. per bell yearly; this to include all the ringers whose names shall be sent to the Secretary at the time of payment of the annual subscription. The number of reports issued will equal the number of bells.
- 5.—Should a ringing member, having paid five consecutive years' subscription, remove from the Diocese, he may without payment, become a Non-Resident member for such time as he continues to reside outside the Diocese.
- 6.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be under the direction of a Ringing Master and shall be such as is approved by the Central Council. The decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.
- 7.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for a serious offence against the Objects and Rules. Subject to appeal at a General Meeting.
- 8.—The Objects, Constitution and Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting after three months' notice given at a General Meeting.

SECRETARIES' REPORT FOR 1947.

The entry of the year 1947 was heralded by the ringing of Church Bells in many towns and villages, but this centuries-old tradition is gradually fading out, and my number one appeal is for Suffolk Ringers to revive this romantic old custom.

Considering the privileges we enjoy throughout the year by ringing bells at our convenience it is not asking too much, nor is it such a great hardship to turn out just before midnight and ring the old year out and the New Year in. Here in Grundisburgh we ring twice every Sunday, Christmas Eve and Festival days and half muffled for the dying year on New Year's Eve up to midnight, and open for the entry of the New Year.

Before the first month was out our popular Ringing Master Mr. C. J. Sedgley was taken into hospital where after two serious operations he laid dangerously ill. Much anxiety not only in the County, but all over the Country was felt for his life, but the prayers offered for his recovery to normal health were answered and after six months he was restored to us again. Thank God.

At the same time one of the severest winters on record set in and for seven weeks the earth was covered by snow and ice followed by floods with disastrous results. Many things suffered including ringing, and meetings and peals were practically at a standstill.

Our Annual Meeting was held as usual at Ipswich on Easter Monday and was well attended. A nice service was arranged and a good organist was engaged and the address by the Rev. F. Tucker Harvey was a benefit and well received.

I was disappointed by those ringers who did not attend.

The very nice lunch was followed by the business meeting, when about 80 people were present and the Chair was occupied by the Rev. H. Drake. The high light of the meeting was the decision to create a Guild Restoration Fund which Mr. Ernest Pye headed with a grand and generous gift of £50. At a later meeting Mr. Pye again showed his generous nature when he presented me with a cheque for £200 on behalf of Grundisburgh Bells Fund.

I am glad to say Mr. Pye has now come to live among us. We welcome him as a friend and a good ringer, the son of one of the greatest ringers the world has ever known. May we show him our gratitude for his great generosity.

I represented the Guild at the Central Council meeting held at Exeter and met some of the finest and best known ringers in the country when I was able to report a general revival of ringing in Suffolk. The great peal of 12 bells with a tenor of 72 cwt. was put to good use and here again Suffolk was represented.

Twenty-nine meetings were held during the year spread over nearly all the districts and the district secretaries are to be congratulated for the work they have put in by making the meetings as enjoyable and instructive as possible.

At Beccles, Mr. Edwin Goate works hard in a difficult district, where apart from the beautiful 10 bells in his own tower, there is a lack of both ringers and bells. Ringing is practised slowly and laboriously and I dare to say it could be enjoyed far more if the beat was speeded up.

In the Bury district many meetings have been held under the supervision of Mr. A. Gillings and all members should have received their moneys' worth. Here again I trust I shall be pardoned for saying a little more speed would be conducive to easier striking. Transport is still my chief problem but Mr. Gillings has put in some very good and useful work on my behalf in the Eye and Mildenhall districts. Thank you, Mr. Gillings, your frequent reports and beautifully rendered accounts are a pleasure to receive and handle.

The Debenham district is famous for its prolific peal ringers, conductors and good strikers. No meetings have been held chiefly due to the fact that tea cannot be arranged.

Mr. Leslie Brett is district secretary pro-tem and I trust he will be elected permanently when I feel sure he will revive the district to its former greatness.

I am glad to report the revival of the Eye district with Mr. W. Archie Lock as secretary. A keen young man with a genial disposition who has already done some good work, he has a difficult task ahead. I trust those many ringers in this district whose names do not now feature in our columns will return to the fold and back him up.

My best wishes Mr. Lock and may good luck and success be yours.

Mr. George Filby after many years as Secretary in the Fressingfield district still holds that position. Another difficult district with scattered ringers which could perhaps be made more bright and interesting for its members if some joint meetings could be arranged. I thank Mr. Filby for his long and faithful service.

The Hadleigh District has increased in its membership thanks to Mr. Joe Corder who has introduced the ringers at Copdock.

We welcome these members in our midst and trust they will remain with us.

Hadleigh bells are kept ringing through the efforts of Mr. Frank Betts and we thank him for his good work.

Turning to the Halesworth district we remember Mr. Fred Lambert who held the post as secretary since the formation of the Guild until the date of his death which took place in October. By his passing the Guild has suffered a sad loss and we have lost a dear and genial friend. Faithful to his Church and to his Maker he was faithful and loyal to the Guild and to ringing in general. He found recruits and taught them; he kept his own and other church bells ringing and he worked for the benefit of the Guild. Many ringers attended his funeral service which was conducted by the local Rector who gave the most beautiful address I have ever heard on a like occasion. His fellow ringers rang handbells at his graveside and his church bells were rung half muffled. A half muffled peal of Grandsire Triples was rung on the bells at a later date. May he rest in peace.

Mr. R. S. Payne of Southwold has taken over secretarial duties for Halesworth district and I ask all members to rally round him and give their loyal and unstinted support. Perhaps some of us may meet Mr. Payne and Halesworth members when the new peal of six bells for Blythburgh are dedicated when I trust a new band may be formed and become members of the Guild.

A change of secretary has again taken place in the Ipswich district due to Mr. James Jennings taking up residence at Brantham.

We regret Mr. Jennings' departure, for his office as district secretary portrayed a healthy sign for Ipswich. His work as instructor and service ringer will not be forgotten and we are glad he has not entirely left the County. We convey to him our best wishes and thanks for his past services and trust we shall see and hear of him from time to time.

Mr. E. G. Ellenger has been elected to fill the vacancy and I am grateful for so good a man taking up the reins. Full of zeal and keenness for the prosperity and progress of the Ipswich district, Mr. Ellinger is prepared to work hard for the benefit of members and I trust he will receive full support at his meetings from ringers who can show they are as interested in The Guild as they are in ringing the fine peal performances they are credited with.

I have little to report from Lavenham—Mr. Stedman Symonds remains loyal and faithful as ever, keeping around him his band of Sunday service ringers whose striking is second to none. Long live Lavenham.

Mildenhall district again comes into its own and it gives me great pleasure in seeing so many names in our membership columns. My thanks are due to Mr. R. Wallis for re-floating this district and although he has resigned the secretaryship I hope for his continued support. My right hand man, Mr. Gillings, will keep an interested eye on Mildenhall to the best of his ability and with loyalty and backing from the members, the district should settle down to progress.

Saxmundham district under Mr. W. Smith reports little change. Bells are rung in scattered churches and the district secretary finds the office none too easy and long distances to travel, all of which gains my admiration and thanks to Mr. Smith for his continued support and good work.

May he carry on for many more years.

I have to thank Mr. James Bailey for his large amount of honorary members, once again, and I should like to see other districts emulate this fine example which is such a valuable source of income. Good ringers and good striking has always been the slogan at Leiston and great performances took place there years ago. Is it too much to hope for a repetition of its past history?

The Stowmarket district is fairly well blessed with good ringers and good strikers and Mr. Bert Chilvers sends me in a good list of subscriptions for which I sincerely thank him.

There are many peal ringers and conductors in this district which in the past held the laurels for performances, and I dare to forecast a great revival which we will watch with interest. Little news and few complaints come from the Sudbury district which is run by Mr. Archie Fitch, who have again forwarded a useful number of subscriptions for which I thank him.

Mr. Fitch works hard in this difficult district and has arranged many meetings for the benefit of his members, some being well attended and others not so well. There is a shortage of recruits and the three fine eight bell towers are manned by barely one eight bell band. Help and encouragement is badly needed by our representative in Sudbury, and I appeal to all Westerners to rally round Mr. Fitch and try hard for a general improvement.

Woodbridge district. We find it hard to realise our Founder and good friend, Rev. H. Drake is no longer with us. At the age of 79 he was quietly called to higher service in November, and his passing came as a sad shock rather than a surprise, for he was practically active up to the last. Known throughout the whole exercise for his great love and interest in Bells and Bellringing, he will be sadly missed and we have lost a dear and good friend. His death causes a vacancy on the Central Council, a matter which must be dealt with at our next Annual Meeting. On your behalf I attended his funeral service held in his church at Ufford.

Much work is needed in Woodbridge district and like elsewhere more recruits are wanted for training. Messrs. Billy Woods and Stanley Woodard are working hard to form a new Sunday service band at Woodbridge. May they be blest with good luck and success.

Fifty-four peals were rung during the year and a passing comment on a few may prove interesting. My son, George, at age 11, surprised us by calling Bob Major (without assistance) at Ufford. Two peals were rung at Clopton, where the bells were condemned many years ago. The first peal of Royal at Mildenhall was rung soon after the peal had been augmented to 10 and was conducted by Mr. Harry Lister. Spliced Oxford and Kent Major at St. Mary-le-Tower, conducted by Mr. O. G. Barnard. Cambridge Maximus when Mr. W. P. Garrett rang his 100th peal of Maximus at the age of 80. This well struck peal reflects great credit on the part of Mr. Garrett and Mr. George E. Symonds. God bless them both and may they live to ring for many more years.

A peal of Cambridge Major at Stradbroke made news and caused surprise, and here I would like to congratulate Mr. Ernest Pye for his masterly handling of the 23 cwt. tenor. Stradbroke bells are very fine but the tall tower oscillates badly and affects the go of the bells. It was nearly 40 years since a peal was rung on them.

RESTORATIONS. The talked of trebles at Mildenhall became a reality when they were dedicated in May. It seemed nearly every ringer in Suffolk turned up to hear the latest ring of ten in our County, and to compliment Messrs. Gillett and Johnston upon a splendid piece of work. And now I hear with great pleasure two trebles may be installed at Stowmarket, which should result in another fine peal of ten. While I cannot claim a restoration at St. Mary Quay, Ipswich, I must thank Mr. Ronald Clouston for these bells being ringable once again. Six bells of good tone, with a six cwt. tenor, they were abandoned nearly 40 years ago on account of the condition of the Tower. The church was partly destroyed by bombs, and the bells may be transferred to another tower if one suitable can be found. They will be available for ringing on the day of the Annual Meeting. The new peal of six bells for Blythburgh Church is in the hands of Messrs. Mears & Stainbank. We await their dedication with great interest.

Clopton bells were condemned 20 years ago but have been touched up by Messrs. Cecil Mayne, Fred Crapnell and Charles Clarke, and are now a worthy peal of six with a 14 cwt. tenor. Mr. Archie Fitch reports the re-clappering of the tenor at All Saints, Sudbury, may soon be put in hand.

Grundisburgh. We go from strength to strength. Last year at this time the fund stood at £192, while today it touches £720, and the order is provisionally placed with Messrs. John Taylor who have promised to commence the work shortly after the issue of the faculty and licences. Last year I appealed to you for donations to this worthy project, and I have been the happy recipient of many generous gifts. Many promises of donations have been made by Suffolk ringers which have not yet materialised and I shall be grateful to those good people if they will keep their word. The whole of the money required for the bells will in a short time from now be raised and I know there are many in the County who desire to have more than a passing interest in them. They will want to ring upon the newly

re-hung bells and they will want to feel they have contributed to the restoration.

Please hurry with your subscriptions. Make up your minds at this very moment to send me your gifts for Grundisburgh Tower and Bells Fund before it is too late. Your names will be recorded in the "Friends of the Bells" book which will go down in the ages for future generations to see.

An amplifying set has been installed in the belfry at St. Mary Stoke, Ipswich, which plays records of famous peals of bells.

I have heard the effect of this latest intrusion in our art which from a distance is quite pleasing, but in the vicinity of the tower, one hears the scratching of the needle on the record and the dreadful distortions likely to emanate if not properly tuned in. When asked by the very pleasant Rector, my opinion of this modern innovation I replied "It is a departure from the truth." I hear a similar apparatus may find its way into the tower at St. John's, Felixstowe. With the nice little ring of six bells at St. Mary Quay, Ipswich, waiting for a new home, I would indeed feel sad and wonder why the Diocesan Authorities could not arrange for their transfer to Felixstowe, if they are allowed to hang idle and Felixstowe Church has a musical box in its belfry instead.

I mention this as a warning. The Red Light for Clergy and ringers shows in the tower at Stoke, Ipswich. This undesirable practice, if allowed to continue on the grounds of cheapness will surge into our churches like a mighty flood and will ironically enough, ring the changes on our present bells, sounding their death knell and that of our art.

Summing up, what does this report amount to!

The necessity for a greater effort by everyone of us, if ringing is to keep its head up.

Priority No. 1, is the finding and teaching of beginners to become regular attendants and good strikers. Many may be called, but few chosen, for only a small percentage come to stay. Every ringer should endeavour to ring for Sunday service and regular practice when progress in method and striking should be the keynote.

If every ringer would make up his or her mind to call a 720, quarter peal, or peal, or to ring a couple of peals each year, we should soon be on the Royal Road.

(The ringing and calling of peals cultivate concentration and eliminates the careless habit of continual trips and errors).

The backing up of your district secretary and local captain, by becoming one of those who always turn up.

Ringing Brethren, Make up your minds to do that little bit extra in 1948 and help to put Suffolk back into the premier position it once occupied.

A marked increase of ringing members is shown for the year; there being no less than 37 additions and 86 new members have been elected.

The working balance in the Bank has increased by £22 19s. 6d., thanks to the good work put in by our District Secretaries and augmented by advertisements.

The careful and economic handling of Guild funds will render our Balance even higher and this I trust may be drawn upon and transferred to the Guild Restoration Fund. In this way every member can play a small part by obtaining all classes of subscribers to the Guild, thereby rendering financial help to restorations all over the County.
