



#### GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT.

It gives me great pleasure to report a marked improvement in all spheres of the Guild's work during the year 1949.

The reports from the district secretaries indicate that more church bells are rung for services on Sundays. Our membership of practical ringers and recruits have increased and meetings on the whole have improved through larger attendances. Very little difficulty has been experienced in obtaining subscriptions and nearly all members had paid well before the end of the year. A glance at the balance sheet will show the Guild's finances to be healthy.

Before commenting on the events of the year that has passed, my thanks are due most warmly to all those who by their hard and faithful work have contributed so much to a successful year. Much of the credit must go to the District Secretaries for their able leadership and organisation. Their meetings provide much pleasure, social and practical, and all ringers should show their gratitude to these unpaid men for the good work they are putting in on behalf of the Guild, the Church and themselves. To encourage our District Secretaries and to show our thanks I ask all ringers to attend meetings and pay subscriptions PROMPTLY. I can add no greater tribute to the District Secretaries than to say without their help the Guild would scarcely exist and I thank them all most sincerely.

The Annual Meeting was, as usual, held at Ipswich and was well attended by our own ringers and many visitors. The bells were made good use of and at the service at St. Maryle-Tower our new Clerical Secretary, Rev. C. P. Newell gave an inspiring address to a large congregation.

During the year 30 meetings have been held and 107 peals were rung. Messrs, George A. Fleming, William J. Button and George Pipe qualify for having their names appear in "The Ringing World" as having rung 40 peals and over. I may add that these three ringers are regular Sunday service and weekly practice attenders. Mrs. Pipe heads the list of conductors and would probably have

doubled her total had she not been incapacitated by a sprained arm.

I cannot complete this report without once again refering to striking. This all important phase in our art, far more important than the ability to ring intricate methods or to pile up the peal totals. Good striking is only attained by the perfect rhythm of all the ringers and the ability to keep that same pace usually set by the Tenorman.

If the tenorman is inclined to quicken or slacken his pace good strikers automatically sense the change and no-one suspects the difference. As a rule bad striking is the result of bad handling and a bad handler should be quickly noted by the rest of the band who will be wise to ring to the pace of the offender. I again stress the importance of ringing rounds until a good beat is reached before calling the bells into changes. The greatest contribution to good striking is bold open and closed leads. Alas, not all our ringers can "Open and Close" the lead, and the striking suffers badly. Many ringers have no idea how to open and close and I ask our more fortunate brethren to teach them.

All three representatives of the Central Council attended the meeting held at York and ringing was enjoyed at the Minster (tenor 60 cwt.), Ripon, Selby and Wakefield. We had no resolutions from you but perhaps this year a resolution may go forward with a view to improving the treatment of bells meted out by the B.B.C. for services, Christmas morning and New Year's Eve.

The first restoration dedicated in the year was at Bredfield where Messrs. Gillett & Johnston are to be congratulated on the fine peal of six bells.

Followed a week when the dedication took place at Grundisburgh. The work by Messrs. John Taylor on the lightest peal of ten bells in any church in the world proved amazing, and all ringers were delighted with the brilliance of this little peal. The new peal of six at Blythburgh will, I understand, be dedicated about Easter of this year. A brand new product from Messrs. Mears & Stainbank's Whitechapel foundry, they should prove a great acquisition

in this lonely part of Suffolk and I anticipate a great gathering of ringers at the dedication.

The six bells at Brandeston are to be overhauled and we await the recasting of two bells at Woodbridge. Two treble bells are to be added to the ring of six at Cotton and your generous financial help is needed.

Many of our once famous peals are showing signs of wear and age and there is much work for the bellfounders in the county. Funds for all these rings of bells should be started *now* and not left until the bells are totally unringable. Much money can be raised in the meantime, resulting in ultimate restoration, where probably a fine ring would be abandoned due to the large cost involved.

In glancing through the peals a few items stand out worthy of mention. The peal at Rickinghall conducted by James Bailey. The one at Hasketon conducted by William Sawyer. The peal at Tuddenham in honour of the diamond wedding of Mr. Charles Parker (age 84). The Stedman Triples at Ufford and peals of Holt's Original conducted by Mr. Frank Fisher. Two peals at Southwold. Peals on the new bells at Bredfield and Grundisburgh and the Little Bob at Bungay and Fressingfield conducted by Mr. E. Whiting. The handbell peals conducted by Mr. George Wightman, aged 83. And finally, the wonderful performances in the peal tour by the Yorkshire and Cheshire ringers.

Deeply regretted is the loss through death of the Rev. W. H. Trickett, William J. Groom, John Hall, Robert J. Steed and Rev. P. M. Hinde.

Rev. Trickett had served on the Guild as Clerical Secretary and we are indebted to him for his good work. Mr. William J. Groom of Debenham was well known as a good ringer and a splendid striker and conductor. His death causes a great gap in the ranks of the Guild. Mr. R. J. Steed was a member in the Stowmarket district and will be remembered as a Sunday service ringer and a safe man in peals. He had done good service to mankind and his loss will be severely felt. Mr. John Hall of Framlingham was

one of the old school in that district when there was more activity, due to the presence of ringers who have since moved away.

To the relatives of our deceased brethren we offer our deep sympathy in their loss.

Illness and old age also takes its toll and among those whose health is impaired is Mr. David Elliott, William Dye (90) and Charles Parker (84). We wish them a speedy recovery to better health. Three veterans who deserve special mention are Messrs Fred Tillett and George Symonds of Ipswich and Mr. George Thompson of Hasketon, 1 visited Fred a few days after Christmas and found him remarkably well at over 80 years of age. His thoughts are always of ringers and ringing and his advice is always worth listening to. Perhaps he will favour us with his presence at the next Annual Meeting, and so let the younger generation see the man who rang Debenham tenor for 103 hours when in his early twenties. Mr. George E. Symonds at well over 70 is wonderful to say the least, and is still going strong. Well known and remembered throughout all England his contribution to the art of ringing will live through the ages. Mr. George Thompson at 85 still rings at Hasketon for services and is a grand man.

The health of our Ringing Master has again suffered while that of Mr. W. J. G. Brown leaves much to be desired. Ringing in the County is not improved by the incapacity of these two first class men and we hope and pray that good health may soon restore them to our active ranks.

Two new bands have been established at Bredfield and Easton. Under the guidance of the Rev. Cotton and Mr. Goss we hope the Bredfield beginners will persevere with patience and practice and ring their bells each Sunday. Experienced help is needed and nearby ringers can render a great service to this struggling band. Mr. Sidney Wightman has taught several ringers at Easton. Their striking is good and their Rector also a ringer, fires their courage. We welcome both bands into the Guild.

To all ringers, "A Happy and Prosperous New Year" is

my warm wish for 1950. All you who ring have a talent, to which I would like to see you add another talent. More and more ringers, is still the demand of the Church, and we must continue our work of training the recruits. With goodwill and zeal we will achieve our goal. The future of change ringing is dependant upon what we do now.

The Suffolk Guild is firmly established on the road to success and the co-operation of the Clergy and Ringers so vitally essential and now so largely recognised is the one and only sure foundation of a successful and glorious future. For remember, United we stand, divided we fall.


