



#### GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The brightest stars in the firmament of Suffolk ringing during the year 1950 are the names of 38 young people who were elected as new ringing members, and it is quite probable that a like amount of young folk have been attracted to our art whose names I hope may feature in the next Report.

A useful number of Honorary members have joined the Guild, which shows there is greater interest among the public than we have hitherto imagined.

To all these newcomers we offer a warm and sincere welcome and we hope they have come to stay.

Furthermore, many fully trained ringers who allowed their membership to lapse have returned to the ranks where they may enjoy ringing with their colleagues during a well-organised meeting or peal.

On the other hand many well-known names are absent in this year's report which is surprising and to be greatly regretted. There is little excuse for the non-payment of subscriptions, for in nearly all districts meetings have been held and the opportunity to offer the modest half-crown to the district secretary has been available.

The Guild does not function like a Trade Union. There is no closed shop. Every ringer is welcome to a pull with his comrades at any meeting whether he has paid his subscription or not, and questions are never asked as to whether he is, or is not, a member. A glance at the membership register shows up the erratic member, the "flash in the pan" type who pays one year's subscription and misses three. The type who rings a peal occasionally and knows he has to pay or the peal is not recorded, and until he rings a further peal he enjoys ringing at Guild meetings and reading the Report someone else has paid for.

Thank God for those staunch and loyal members who, year after year, come what may, render to the Secretary without fuss the annual subscription. They too, are seen in the register and they are not all peal ringers. I have a special message for these pillars of strength to the Guild who form the real backbone of our movement. I say "THANK YOU" and I am sure the District Secretaries agree with me and also thank you. So much for a little straight talking!

Thirty-three meetings were held during the year and nearly all these events have been well attended with a goodly percentage of young folk. To the distress and disappointment of District Secretaries whose voluntary work deserves all-round backing, many local ringers at some of these meetings have been conspicuous by their absence. The standard of the ringing however suffered little, but it is to be wondered whether the absentees are interested only in Surprise peal ringing.

The Annual Meeting was held as usual at Ipswich on Easter Monday and proved a great success. The service at St. Lawrence was splendidly attended, the body of the church being full and the hymns were sung with real feeling. Mr. Edward Ellenger read the

Lesson from the parable of the ten talents in such a clear manner that everyone present must have felt how closely connected were the words of Our Lord and our work in the Guild. In his sermon, nay, oration, our Clerical Secretary, Rev. C. P. Newell, held us in profound interest in pointing out our important duty to Church and State. He related it had been said "The hand that rocks the cradle rules the world," but, said Mr. Newell, it was equally true "The hand that holds the bell-rope TELLS the world." Food for thought indeed, and we would all do well to "think on these things."

I attended the Central Council Meeting held at Eastbourne and voted on your behalf on all matters that came up for discussion. All the business was given full publicity in "The Ringing World". The majority of the time was spent on C.C. rule amendments, and I hope the forthcoming meeting at Chester may be occupied with matters more closely affecting the rank and file and with which only the C.C. can deal.

I refer, as I did last year, to broadcast ringing. To my mind and I am sure to yours, the ringing which was broadcast on Christmas morning was little short of a disgrace. Nothing else that comes from Broadcasting House would have been allowed to proceed as did the Christmas ringing and it is evident that the B.B.C. are really ignorant of what constitutes good, bad or indifferent bells or striking. From an exhibition such as we received I hope your minds are thoroughly made up that the time has arrived when action should be taken with the B.B.C. that we and our art should cease to be so grossly misrepresented. In this connection I ask that you all attend the forthcoming Annual Meeting, when the matter may be discussed with a view to the Guild C.C. delegate making a resolution that the C.C. set up a committee to approach the B.B.C. and advise on future ringing broadcasts.

It may be quite safely said that the B.B.C. was not altogether to blame for what was put over the air. Partly at fault were the local companies, who were not fit to handle the job themselves and did not invite reliable strikers. Here is a lesson by which we may all profit when the occasion arrives for Suffolk bells to be broadcast. While a local band whose striking is generally not first class suffices for local ringing, let us hope they will give way to outside help by inviting the highest class strikers obtainable rather than adopt the attitude of dog in the manger as did quite probably happen in the Christmas ringing.

Two important restorations took place during the year. The new peal of six bells at Blythburgh, hung in a new iron and steel frame by Mears and Stainbank of Whitechapel, London, were dedicated by our Bishop in September, when nearly 100 ringers attended. Mellow and quiet, with a tenor 10½ cwt. in G, these bells will prove a great asset in the Halesworth district, and Mr. John W. C. Blythe, who is struggling with a company of beginners deserves much local and general help.

Brandeston bells had been silent for about 40 years and were removed by Messrs. John Taylor, of Loughborough, who recast both second and fifth bells and returned them to the tower in complete

new fittings and frame. The peal of six with tenor  $7\frac{1}{2}$  cwts. in G sharp, are really very wonderful for their weight.

In both these restorations the belifounders have made first class

jobs and are to be congratulated.

This year we look forward to seeing two trebles added at Cotton where Mr. Bert Chilvers has worked hard to raise the money to complete the octave.

At Bures Mr. Leslie Mills has made himself responsible for raising funds to add two trebles to the heavy peal of six, tenor 21 cwts.

It is also proposed to restore the six bells at Monewden by recasting and retuning and hanging all the bells in new fittings and

frame, the driving force being Mr. S. Arbon.

Cash gifts are urgently required for all three projects, and ringers who expect to ring on these bells at a later date should hand or send their donations to the above gentlemen NOW. The restorations are, I understand, to be carried out by Messrs Gillett and Johnston of Croydon.

Much more restoration requires to be undertaken in the County where on the whole our bells have fallen low in rank compared with other counties. The majority of our heavyweights, once famous for tone and "go", have seen their best days and recasting and rehanging

now so sadly essential, is the only answer.

Is it fair to the public who have to endure the sound of bells out of tune, and of poor quality, and to the future of our art, when young folk are expected to learn on rough going bells, that apathy should be so predominant among ringers and certain incumbents. There never was a time when bells of such pureness of tone were cast as those which the bellfounders turn out today, and nearly all newly hung bells are a real joy to manipulate. This is indeed the Golden Age of Bellfounding and Bellhanging.

LET US DO OUR JOB. Away with the mantle of apathy so prevalent these days and let us all set about putting our houses (bells) in order. Let every ringer who resides in a parish where hangs a peal of neglected bells see to it that those worn stairs and rotten ladders and floors, constituting a real danger to the unwary and the risk of fire due to rubbish which has accumulated for years, be brought to the notice of the incumbent and churchwardens, and duly appear on the agenda at the next Parochial Church Council Meeting. A simple report on the actual state of the bells and frame is only a step further in the right direction and much good can evolve from a little interest and action taken in that unringable peal of bells which form one of the 40 cases of neglect and danger in the County.

Forty-nine peals were rung during 1950 compared with 107 during 1949, which was a peak year partly due to the 17 peals rung by the Cheshire tourists and those in honour of the birth of Princess Ann. Nevertheless, a serious decline and I have wondered if the reason for this decrease is connected with the poor condition of some of our once famous peals, or the attitude of a few local companies who refuse to allow a peal attempt unless local ringers

are included!!!

Worthy of mention is the attempt to beat the record length of Double Norwich at Debenham and all the ringers deserve the highest

marks for their striking.

The loss by death among our ranks is light, but the name of Charles W. Parker of Tuddenham, which has featured in Reports since the inception of the Norwich and Ipswich Association, is published among our subscribing members for the last time. Taught to ring at Grundisburgh by the late Mr. Tom Saddler of Witnesham, Mr. Parker rang many peals in the district. He was instrumental in raising the money required to add two trebles at Grundisburgh in 1897 and had been a ringer and REGULAR member of the Suffolk Guild up to the time of his death in November last, at the age of 85 years. Mr. Parker's last wish was for handbells to be rung over his grave and this was reverently carried out by his fellow ringers.

Mr. W. Head of Little Waldingfield has also been called to higher service, having reached an advanced age. Well known by the older school, he had been a ringer all his life and had hoped to see

the restoration of his local bells before he died.

To the relatives of our deceased friends we offer our deep

sympathy.

The District Secretaries deserve our warm thanks for their loyal work on behalf of the Guild. They are in office for the purpose of collecting the annual subscriptions, and arranging meetings in order to improve the standard of ringing, and to encourage a bond of friendship among all students of the art. They have worked well and deserve support in the manner you all know best how to give.

Greatly encouraging to me, and, I am sure to all who have not missed the opportunity of hearing him, have been the remarks of our President, Dr. Richard Brook (Bishop of the Diocese), on those occasions of dedications. More than once the Bishop has pronounced his extreme fondness for the music of church bells and it is indeed a comfort to know we have in the Head of the Church a real friend and staunch supporter of our work.

Canon Graham too, has shown his interest and hospitality in no uncertain manner, and our Clerical Secretary, Rev. Newell, well known for his fondness for bells and ringers, has rendered faithful

service.

Throughout the County I find in incumbents and laymen, friends and supporters of our art, awaiting the invitation to work or serve in the manner best suited to them, and it is these people we should approach with a view to them becoming honorary members. A closer understanding between clergy and ringers was never more necessary than it is today and apart from the enjoyment experienced when relations are happy between East and West, the possibilities of repair and restoration are far more enhanced.

But the "give and take" principle remains essential if we are to enjoy the sympathy, help and understanding from the Church dignitaries. Visits from the head of the East End to the West End

deserve visits from the West to the East.

We must Play the Game.




