



GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

The outstanding event of the year was the Coronation of our beloved young Queen which gave ringers the greatest opportunity of their lives of bringing to the public the joyful sound of church bells.

From all parts of the County, from early morn until late evening our ringers did what was expected of them and the bells occupied their high and rightful place above the cheers and tumult of this never to be forgotten occasion.

Suffolk bells had been recast and rehung, others had been patched up to make them ringable and many towers where the bells had remained silent for years proudly took their place among their more important brethren and rocked with joy to herald the beginning of a new Elizabethan era.

Scores of young folk had for months beforehand diligently been practising in order to give of their best on the great day and, thanks to their instructors, the County and the Guild are the richer for a record number of recruits.

Eighteen General and District meetings were held during the year: the Annual Meeting as usual being at Ipswich on Easter Monday when there was a fair attendance at the service and business meeting both of which were conducted by our Clerical Secretary, Rev. C. P. Newell.

Three proposals were made at a General Meeting at Halesworth which were: (1) To change the Annual Meeting from Easter Monday to a Saturday; (2) To charge a levy of sixpence per person per peal and (3) To increase the annual subscription.

The difficulties of organising a really successful Annual Meeting at Ipswich on Easter Monday increase each year and I feel a change might be tried. The fixing of a levy on peals to help pay the expense of the Annual Report is fair and justified and will enable a more comprehensive report to be issued.

An increased subscription would not in my opinion propor-

tionately increase our income.

The General Meeting at Bury St. Edmunds on 6th February will decide and I must point out that if the peal levy is adopted it must take effect immediately and conductors of all peals must collect and remit to the General Secretary or Peals Secretary within one month of the peal being rung.

Many ringers have failed once again to pay their annual subscriptions and consequently their names have been removed from the Annual Report. It is to be greatly regretted that a large percentage of these defaulters have rung peals and several performances may have to be deleted from our records due to this serious infringement of the rules. Subscriptions are due on 1st January each year and membership expires on 31st December of that year.

Our District Secretaries have worked well and loyally once again. They are chiefly the leaders of the Guild in a practical sense by their contribution to service ringing, practice and meeting arrangements and they ask little or nothing for the expenses they incur. These men

and in particular the young lady who runs District 12 are the back-

bone of the Guild. They deserve our loyal support.

The Ipswich and Saxmundham Districts still remain without local secretaries which, I must confess causes me some little surprise for there was a time when the highest example of ringing and membership was set by these two districts. To be unable to produce at least one man to lead and run each district would, several years ago, have been considered shameful and unthinkable. Let us hope this apathetic state of affairs may soon be remedied and there may come forth from each district a person who is willing to prove there are as good leaders in these districts as elsewhere.

The Lavenham District has been merged with Sudbury and our sincere thanks are due to Mr. Stedman H. Symonds for his long and

faithful work as District Secretary.

A word of thanks on behalf of the Guild should go to Mr. L. D. Mills who has done yeoman work in the Sudbury District and there is every sign that he intends to carry on as he began. Many new members have come from this farthest corner of the County and two splendid ideals, first class handling and striking are kept up to a high standard. Their aim? More and more recruits and more service ringing.

Fifty-one new members joined the Guild during the year while eighty-two who were members in 1952 have lapsed due to non-payment. I trust these people will remember to pay the 2/- re-instate-

ment fee, if and when they rejoin.

Death struck a cruel blow when Mr. Garnham A. Blaxcell was fatally injured in a road accident during September. One of the best known East Anglian ringers, Garnham had conducted a large percentage of the three hundred peals he had rung for the Guild in probably more towers in the County than any other ringer. He is sadly missed. Also taken from our ranks is Mr. Percy K. Parker of Tuddenham who had been a member since the formation of the Guild. Of a quiet disposition he was a popular man and should be remembered for his last duty when upon his death bed he sent out to collect the subscriptions of the Rector and fellow ringers which he paid to me personally before he died.

To the relatives of the above deceased brethren and any others,

we in the Guild offer our sincere sympathy.

By the retirement of our President, The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, Dr. Richard Brook we lose a good friend. His Lordship was a great lover of church bells and many were the occasions when he stated from a pulpit his joy at hearing the sound of the bells as he approached a church. May we hope for the same support and interest from his successor.

Bell restoration continues in the County; the once famous eight at Leiston having been rehung in ball bearings and the five bells at Hartest entirely refitted in a new frame. Both by John Taylor of

Loughborough.

The fourth and seventh bells at Woodbridge have been recast by Gillett and Johnston of Croydon and we now await the return of the six bells at Tannington where a complete restoration has been effected.

At the time of writing there is little else to look forward to except the rehanging of the ten bells at Stonham Aspal. This, when sufficient funds are raised and the work completed, will be a major benefit to Suffolk ringers and many will require a peal at this well known tower. But, reader, have you given a donation towards this work? Messrs. W. J. Buttom and Russell Parker are almost entirely responsible for seeing this project to a successful finish. They receive little financial help from the Village or elsewhere and they rely practically on whist drives and socials to augment their fund. Your donation NOW will encourage them in their good but hard work. They will remember you when the work is finished. They will probably remember you if you give nothing!

Apart from a promise from Canon R. H. Babbington to have the bells of St. Mary-le-Tower inspected by bell founders no move appears to have been made to overhaul the bells mentioned in last year's Report due chiefly to lack of interest and not lack of money. There are now several young folk in their teens in the Guild who are capable of putting up a good show in a peal of Cambridge Maximus but due to the poor condition of the twelve bells at St. Mary-le-Tower it would be harmful to the health of these keen young ringers to allow the attempt. The delay in getting this one only of several peals in the County overhauled is retarding progress, stifling interest, helping to kill the art, and is, of course contrary to the ideals of the Guild, May we hope to have in the near future at the Cathedral, Bury St. Edmunds, and Ipswich, peals of bells that are as good as those in other Counties.

During the year I was invited to give talks on Bells and Campanology to members of the Rotary Clubs at Ipswich and Frinton. The Ipswich Inner Wheel and St. Mary-le-Tower Men's Forum. I endeavoured to make these talks as interesting and comprehensive as possible, mentioning the fact that bells, like other things, will not last for ever without repair and I felt convinced that my listeners would not fail to support any particular restoration fund if called upon to do so.

This, I trust, will be my last report as General Secretary as I feel it is not good for the Guild to be denied a change of ideas. The Guild has prospered by a record number of members and the financial assets are higher than ever before. A substantial sum can now be credited to our Bell Restoration Fund when larger grants can be made to applicants. This should be an incentive to those whose bells require attention. "First come, first served".

RINGING MASTER'S REPORT

The peals rung for the Guild during the past year numbered 110, which has only once before been exceeded—in 1938 which had 116. These peals were rung in 57 Towers, 42 names appearing as conductors and whilst there is nothing particulary outstanding to record,

excepting the Spliced Surprise in four methods, which was the first in these methods for the Guild, yet a good variety of methods have been rung. All the Standard methods appear, together with the Spliced Surprise, mentioned above, Spliced Treble Bob, Painswick S. Major, Yorkshire S. Royal and Major and Little Bob Major. Our Minor ringers were well to the fore with a record total of 51, including a 10,080 in five methods which is the longest length of Minor for the Guild.

Once again we must comment on the large number of members who have rung their first peal, or first peal in various methods, together with some very good conducting performances on the part of some of our younger members. Can we look to these as promising signs for the future? Do they denote a renewed interest in the Art and that influx of youth which is so greatly needed? We sincerely trust so. That we have some very promising young members both young men and maidens, is very evident as a perusal of oun peal records will show, and they have put up some very good performances during the past year, which all goes to prove that the accent is on youth. The careers of these young people will be watched with interest, we hope they will progress and do all they can to advance the Art wherever they may be, bearing in mind those traditions of good striking and truth which are their heritage from those great ringers who have gone before.
