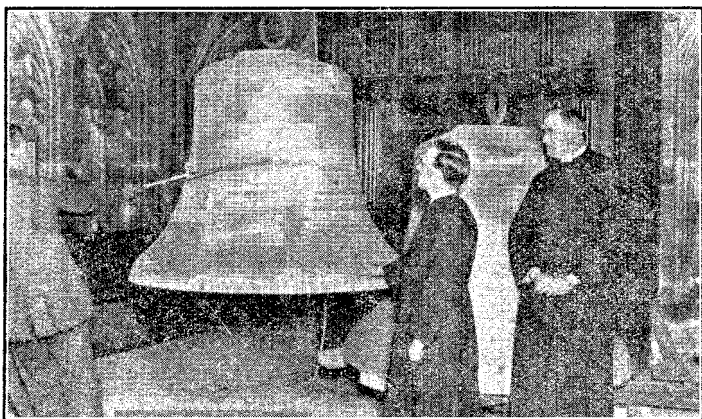

RINGING MASTER'S REPORT

Peals rung during 1962 total 56, the lowest since 1955 when 51 were recorded.

Once again our Minor friends have taken the lead with 23, against 19 of Major.

This was mainly due to the enthusiastic band at Barking, and those who ring in the Halesworth area. The major peals include Glasgow and Kendal Surprise, rung in the County for the first time, and a few other Surprise methods, otherwise these peals are of a very low standard.

Royal include London, Cambridge, Yorkshire, Pudsey and York Surprise, taking part in the latter enabled Mrs. S. R. E. Pipe to ring peals of York on 6, 8, 10 and 12 bells. Of the three peals of Maximus (Yorkshire and Cambridge 2) one was the 100th peal of Maximus by George E. Symonds, a record held by a minority. All, I am sure, will join me with congratulations on this fine achievement, not forgetting those who helped him to reach his goal.

Two peals of Caters, one of Triples and one of Doubles were recorded; again no peal of Cinques or Stedman was rung. These peals were rung in 35 towers, and 23 shared in the conducting, to be headed this year by John W. Blythe with 14.

Five young members scored their first peal.

Eye has had its first peal since re-dedication, so rightly conducted by the District Ringing Master, Robert E. Lester.

During the year 56 quarter peals have been rung, most of these for services, "Good Going" from 29 towers, Barking 7, Grundisburgh 5, Exning 5 and Rougham 4.

It is most pleasing to know that over the county several young pupils are getting interested in our art. At Halesworth John Blythe has a band making good progress, Walter Bailey at Higham is over-run with beginners, while Howard Egglestone is doing good work at Henley. Wherever a band has a recruit, I wish them every success.

During the year Mr. L. E. Last has done a grand job lecturing on bells and ringing in the county. Result so far—Wetheringsett bells are being rung regularly again.

With the Ladies Guild visiting the County in 1963 for the first time, why not make it a record year?

GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

In some ways this has been a disappointing year. Activity does not seem to have been quite so prolific as in some recent years, but, it is to be hoped that 1963 will show a reversal of this trend.

The attendance at meetings has not been as good as your officers would have wished and it is to be hoped that members will make a greater effort to support them in the coming year. The Annual General Meeting was held at Bury St. Edmunds

and was one of the best we have had with extra towers being available and tea being most successfully arranged by Mr. Wright and the ladies.

Membership is slightly down at 489 but in some parts of the Diocese there are quite a good number of young ringers coming along and in fact have been prominent at some of our gatherings. We should do all we can to encourage and extend this trend and give them all the assistance we can to improve their standards of striking and ringing generally. Your Committee have this foremost in their minds and it is to be hoped that it may be possible for a week-end course to be arranged at Belstead House in the not too distant future.

Peals numbered 56 during the year. Five members rang their first peal and many more passed notable milestones in their peal ringing careers. The Ringing Master refers to some of these highlights in his report but I feel that we must congratulate all who have achieved successes in this sphere. Whilst I do not wish to encroach upon the Ringing Master's domain I would urge all beginners to aim at ringing their first peal. The benefits which accrue from the experience of peal ringing do much to improve the standard of striking for Sunday Service ringing.

This year has seen the restoration of the ring of eight at Eye. We all know the efforts made by Mr. Claude Rush to bring this project to completion. It is, therefore, gratifying to know that we have another octave in first class order. Work is contemplated at Hartest to augment the existing ring of five to six and we hope that 1963 will see the completion of this worthy scheme. Plans are being considered for restoration work at Bury St. Edmunds and Ipswich and whilst these are probably of a more long term policy we still welcome them and look forward to the day when they will be carried out.

The Central Council meeting was held at Cardiff at Whitsun when you were represented by Messrs. C. W. Pipe and J. W. Blythe.

The supply of badges received at the end of 1961 have been on sale during the year and any member who is still in need of one can obtain it from any of the District Secretaries.

The Accounts for the year show a large excess of expenditure over income. The purchase of badges is the principal item of expenditure to account for this. A donation made to the Melbourne Cathedral Appeal is also of a non recurring nature, but, the remainder is attributable to a variety of reasons. Whilst I anticipate that the 1963 accounts will not show such a rapid decline in our finances due to compensating factors it is obvious that we must now take steps to arrest this trend. Your Committee has, therefore, recommended that the annual subscriptions be increased in 1964.

May I thank all members and Officers who have given their support during 1962 and trust that by our united efforts 1963 may prove to be a better and happier year.

TECHNICAL ADVISER'S REPORT

During the year your Technical Adviser continued his work of inspecting and reporting on the contents of our Suffolk towers and completed 16 reports, bringing the total to date 241. Of the 16 towers, 12 contained rings of bells, being those at Little Stonham, Groton, Edwardstone, Bildeston, Newton Green, Lidgate, Great Waldingfield, Lawshall, Moulton, Horham, Little Waldingfield, Ipswich St. Mary-le-Tower. All except the last are unringable.

At Little Stonham (5) the tenor is cracked in the crown and the bell frame and gear are much decayed due to a leaky roof. At Groton (5) the treble has been cracked at the lip by unsafe clocking, a method which was being used on the others. The frame is wedged to the walls at bearing level and a new frame and gear would be required to permit change ringing again. Bildeston (6) has a cracked pre-Reformation treble. Of the others, only the fifth was being used and that was unsafely clocked. It has been said that the tenor is cracked, but the writer could find no evidence of this, though the bell is a poor one musically, due, perhaps to being too thin. The rope circle is peculiar, being clockwise 145326, and the gallows type frame, part oak, part soft wood, has all the bells swinging the weakest way of the tower. Here again a new frame and gear will be needed before the bells can be swung in full circles.

The tenor at Newton Green (5) has a porous zone in the crown and is quite unfit, even to swing chime. The frame is a hotchpotch of timber and is now quite unfit even for a light ring of bells.

Lidgate (5) has the third and tenor cracked at the lip, the frame and fittings are seriously delapidated and are held up by two rolled steel joists inserted underneath in modern times.

Great Waldingfield (6) are by Briant of Hertford, 1800, with the fourth re-cast Warners, 1876. The frame is 6ft. 4in. high and sits on three courses of brick mounted on a timber grillage, a most unusual use for brick. Unusually for Briant bells, they are quite a bit out of tune, the second and fifth being nearly half a semitone sharp compared with the tenor. Here, too, the frame has seen its best days, the fittings are decayed and the bells need quarter turning. Currently Ellacombe hammers are used.

At Lawshall the writer had expected to find six bells, but the tower never seems to have contained more than the present minor five. The third is cracked at the lip. Chiming hammers have been used since about 1902 and the gear necessary for change ringing is fragmentary or absent. Peculiarly the third wheel has the garter hole at 12 o'clock with the bell down, those on the treble and tenor are normal.

At Moulton (5) the second, fourth and tenor are cracked in the crown and all are unsafely clocked. The bell frame supporting structure was found to be very decayed and some action will soon have to be taken to adequately support the bells.

Horham has the oldest existing ring of eight bells in the whole of England. There were earlier rings of eight, but they have all in part or completely been re-cast in later times. At Horham the latest bell is the treble dated 1673. The last peal was rung here in 1911 and now the frame and gear is much decayed, but of considerable interest. The writer has in hand an article for the *Ringling World* on these bells. The rope circle clockwise is 15643278 and the fifth and tenor to-day only have three-quarter wheels, i.e. the rim only covers an arc of 270 degrees.

Little Waldingfield (5) tenor seems to have been re-hung about 1900 and the fittings are quite good, but the state of those on the other rule out change ringing as the headstocks are so weak. The frame is decayed and has been wedged to the walls at bearing level. The medieval ladder to the bells is of interest, others are to be seen at Boxford and Orford.

Ipswich St. Mary-le-Tower (12) has an unsatisfactory part wood and part metal frame. Tonally some of the lighter bells are much below any reasonable standard. In order of poorness, the worst first, the writer suggests:— Fifth (Warners 1866), Fourth (C. Hodson 1688), Treble (Warners 1866), Ninth (Warners 1866), Second (Taylors 1845), Sixth (Darbie 1671). The writer feels that some re-casting will be unavoidable if the musical properties of the ring are to be brought up to a reasonable standard and he has suggested that the front six and the ninth should be re-cast. The new frame should make provision for either a flat sixth or a sharp second, depending on whether the ninth is to be re-cast or not.

The Diocesan Advisory Committee for the Care of Churches has considered a number of faculty applications connected with bells. The scheme to add a treble to the five at Hartest was approved. The three bells at Martlesham are to be re-hung for swing chiming, and the tenor, which is cracked, re-cast. The brick top of Nayland tower is to be removed as the pinnacles are unsafe and a timber framed spire is to be installed instead. This will make its appearance to be much the same as in Constable's day. The bells are to be re-hung in a new frame lower down the tower. The Committee has also considered John Marven's tomb in Copdock churchyard. He was a noted Suffolk ringer and died in 1789, aged 34. His tomb is a fine one and its restoration has been recommended.

During the year Eye bells have been re-dedicated after re-hanging and re-casting the tenor. They now go much better than formerly and the musical effect is much improved.

Worlingworth (8) bells have been rung for the first time for some years, the silence being due to repairs to the fabric; unfortunately the tenor is cracked in the crown and the tone is affected.

Ipswich St. Nicholas (5) were also rung for the first time for quite a period; it is reported that the bearings are much worn, causing considerable knocking. The front four are in driven-in bearings with wood boards over, installed probably over 100 years ago. Those for the tenor are in cast iron boxes and are thus more recent.

Although 1962 was a quiet year for peals, two fine individual performances by our members must be mentioned. George Symonds rang his 100th peal of Maximus in March and in August Roddy Pipe called the first of Glasgow Surprise for the Guild. Congratulations to both.

At long last the launching of the appeal for the St. Mary-le-Tower Restoration Fund has been made. At the time of writing some £10,000 of the £25,000 required overall has been raised. The re-hanging of the bells is planned, but this will have to take its turn after more urgent church works. Still, perhaps it won't be too long now before we have a good ring of twelve again.

Looking forward to 1963, let us strike an optimistic note and hope that the small increase in paying members for 1962 will result in better attended meetings and more intermingling by the various bands in the district, after all that is one of the objects of our Guild. More important, however, let us hope that we will be more successful in our efforts to find and train recruits and so provide more Sunday Service Bands.

In conclusion I would like to thank all those who have helped me with my duties in the year and at the same time wish, most sincerely, all members of the Suffolk Guild a very successful 1963.
