

#### OBJECTS

- Federation. To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- Recognition. To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as
  essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their
  services (qualifications for which demand much time, skill, and
  mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- Promotion of Change Ringing. To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Change Ringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, instructors when and where required.
- 4. Reform. To promote a proper appreciation of the ringing chamber as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment thereof; as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition; to advocate needful repairs and renovations and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the condition of bells and their fittings.

#### CONSTITUTION

- 1. The Guild shall be known as the Suffolk Guild of Ringers for the Diocese of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich.
- The Officers of the Guild shall consist of: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese as President, Patrons, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer, Report Editor. Auditor, and the Technical Adviser.
- 3. The Guild shall consist of (a) Ringing Members, (b) Probationers, (c) Junior Members, (d) Honorary Members, (e) Life Members.
  - (a) Ringing Members may be elected at any meeting where there are five other Members present, or, provisionally by two other Members, before starting for a peal. Ringing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Ringing Members shall be 5s. 0d. per year.
  - (b) Probationers may be elected at any meeting where there are five other Members present. This grade of Membership is for those learning change ringing but who have not yet rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Probationers shall be 2s. 6d. per year.
  - (c) Junior Members under the age of 16 years, who shall pay half the annual subscription.
  - (d) Honorary Members may be elected on a payment of 5s. 0d. per year.

- (e) Life Members residing out of the county to make a single payment of 10s.
- 4. The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary & Treasurer, Report Editor, Technical Adviser, District Chairmen (ex-officio), District Secretaries (ex-officio), together with two elected Members from each Disrict, seven to form a quorum. The Committee will meet a minimum of three times during the year.
- 5. The area covered by the Guild shall be divided into Districts, each of which shall have its own Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Committee, who shall be elected at the District Annual Meeting. Each District will elect two representatives to serve on the Guild Committee. The Secretary will:—
  - (a) Arrange Meetings for practice.
  - (b) Arrange for instruction.
  - (c) Collect the subscriptions of all members.
    - N.B.—In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary, or Captain, or Ringing Master, who shall collect all subscriptions as soon as possible after January 1st and send them to the District Secretary.
  - (d) Forward these subscriptions to the General Secretary together with his receipt book and details of any expenditure, at the end of the year for audit.
- 6. The Guild shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, and shall loyally abide by the rules and decisions thereof.

#### RULES

- 1. Subscriptions shall be due in advance on January 1st, annually.
- 2. Any member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st shall lose his membership. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid. Lapsed members may be reinstated on payment of 2s. in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3. Junior Members under the age of 16 may be elected on payment of half the annual subscription.
- 4. Should a Ringing Member, having paid five consecutive years' subscriptions, remove from the Diocese, he may without payment become a Non-Resident Member for such time as he continues to reside outside the Diocese.
- 5. All ringing at meetings of the Guild shall be under the direction of a Ringing Master and shall be such as is approved by the Central Council. The decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.
- 6. A peal fee of 6d. per rope is payable in respect of all peals rung for the Guild. Conductors are responsible for collecting and forwarding them to the General Secretary. No peal will be recorded unless the peal fees have been paid.
- 7. The Secretary may pay, on request, 2nd class return railway fare, together with a maximum of two nights' hotel expenses to such representative attending the Central Council Meeting, provided that the total indebtedness of the Guild for all representatives does not exceed £20 in any one year.
- 8. The Committee may remove a member from the Guild for a serious offence against the Objects and Rules, subject to appeal at a General Meeting.
- 9. The Objects, Constitution, and Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting after three months' notice given at General Meeting.

#### RINGING MASTER'S REPORT, 1964

Ringing activity and performances during 1964 have been a curious mixture of immense keenness and enthusiasm in spot localities on the one hand and yet almost abysmal apathy on the other. If one assesses this in the light of Suffolk's scattered population and high number of rings of bells of which a large number are either unringable or in poor condition, then one could find reasons for the latter case. But the fact must be squarely faced that at the present time, taking the county in its entirety, the ringing scene is in a sorry state.

These might seem strong words with which to open one's report!, but when one considers how in the short space of 25 years we have let ourselves slip from one of the top three of four counties to one that is really struggling then the time comes for taking stock, with I trust, some constructive criticism.

Let me say straight away, however, that to offset this we are indeed fortunate to have about a dozen centres of real progress, where beginners are being taught at a most heartening rate, where Sunday service ringing and quarters have provided a real and necessary backbone to the year's work. We all know where these centres are and the instructors behind the scenes have mine and, I know, the whole Guild's warmest praise. They have realised that the two legacies that have been left this generation, no teaching done at the important pre-war and immediate post-war periods in the leading centres and the allowing of so many of our major rings (and others) to deteriorate, have got to be tackled by first principles: Hard teaching and maintenance of their own peals at least in first class order. It has been said before, I know, but Ipswich, Helmingham, Leiston, Stowmarket, Sudbury, Bury St. Edmunds, Debenham, Hadleigh and Lavenham were household words for quality of bells and the performances rung on them. To these may be added another score of 'Key' rings alone, but of that galaxy scarcely one tower is rung today on Sundays.

But even more tragic is the falling away of ringers who are capable of putting the matter right. It is my firm belief that if a band is organised and prepared to teach, then by their own initiative and industry their bells will be restored. Bures, Grundisburgh, Mendlesham, Aldeburgh, Offton, etc., are examples of this. It is wrong to blame the bells, poor though they might be.

Despite all this I am convinced that 1965 is going to see a reverse trend and the example being set by such places as Beccles, Blythburgh, Ashbocking Bramford, Henley, Rushmere, Rougham, Offton and others is going to spread. To those of you who are either teaching or manning a tower on Sundays, both I trust, a warm thank you. Keep up this good work, this is the backbone we need in the Suffolk Guild right now. If by good fortune your band is fairly strong, do try and visit, say monthly, any other tower in your vicinity where ringing does not take place. That regular Sunday morning or evening is the surest way to attract recruits from a neighbouring village, and to let locals know that there are bells in the tower.

Now to events and performances during the year.

Ringing at District Quarterlies has been quite good considering attendances and the organised practice meetings have proved very valuable. May I ask members to look up at least one new method for these functions and let others know of this. This will increase our repertoire especially in 5 and 6 bell field and provide incentive for beginners.

The striking competition held at Buxhall on September 26th provided some excellent ringing and participation by bands from four of our five Districts proved the popularity of such a day. Results were as follows:

with the first three teams turning out some first rate Minor. I would like to see 12 teams plus at Cavendish on September 25th, 1965. Incidentally the choice of method is now open.

Now to peals, seventy being recorded for the Guild during 1964. Peals are often criticised, generally by people who do not ring them themselves, but one can pretty well gauge a Guild's healthiness by its peals. Only seventy of our paid up members of over 300 took part in these. Every peal is a good performance whether it be Doubles or Maximus, but obviously all the more worthwhile if there is a first pealer, a new method/conductor or for some special occasion. It can be fairly said that the best ringing generally occurs in peals and these give an ideal opportunity for sustained concentration and driving a method home. Ring plenty, but I caution this with a request that fresh ground be broken whenever possible.

Congratulations to Messrs. Margetts, E. J. Lockwood, Fordham, Dodds. Oakley and young Michael Howes on scoring their first, to C. W. Pipe and R. E. Lester for their 400th and 300th for the Guild respectively and to R. L. K. Whittell on his 100th peal. Last but not least, George Symonds scoring 6 in his 90th year (many a good tune, etc.!) and to James Bennett on his monumental toal of 1,300. N. F. Whittell and R. E. Lester were top for the Guild with 30 and 26 respectively.

It was good to see two peals of Stedman Triples, firsts for Suffolk of 8, 10 and 12 Spliced, Edmundsbury and Lindum S. Major and Rutland S. Royal. We thank visitors from neighbouring counties for their help and can assure them that they are most welcome amongst us.

Quarter peals also totalled 70 in a variety of methods. This goodly number was probably sparked off by the Guild's contribution to the Cross and Arrows Festival organised by Howard Egglestone and was followed up by many of our beginners scoring their first quarter. A word too about our call change ringers, especially those at Kelsale and Worlingworth. Your efforts are appreciated.

In the six months since the A.G.M. at Bury in June I was able to visit 37 different towers for either service practice, meeting or peal ringing. A figure which I hope to at least double during 1965. Please make any request where assistance in any form of ringing is required—either the General Secretary or myself will be pleased to help.

May I conclude by thanking those of you who have given both the Guild and me personally your support. Please forget old prejudices and back up your officers and keep up the good work by supporting the Church and every facet of the Art. The reward of a really active and vital Suffolk Guild will be immeasurable and will be repaid to us "some ninety and some an hundred fold".

#### GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

My review of the year's work will begin from my election in June at a well attended A.G.M. at Bury St. Edmund's. In addition to the change of Officers, the creation of new posts of Chairman and Report Editor were proposed and an enlargement of the Committee. These motions were all ratified at a General Meeting in Ipswich on September 12th when over 70 members attended.

The Striking Competition at Buxhall on September 26th also proved popular and ten teams competed for the Hubert Mitson Shield. My thanks are due to Messrs. W. Arnold, F. B. Lufkin (Essex Association) and F. C. Goodman (Norwich Association) for their kind assistance with the judging.

The Central Council Meeting was held at Truro with Miss A. E. J. Lester and Mr. C. W. Pipe representing the Guild.

The following analysis will show a loss of 85 members on 1963, largely due to the abolition of compound towers and the inevitable loss after the increase in the annual subscription. I would like to take this opportunity of urging all members to do their utmost in the field of recruitment—seeing one's own pupil ring his first 720 or quarter peal can be as rewarding as ringing a peal of Surprise Major, and I feel sure the future of the Guild depends on this.

The increase in the balance of the General Account is largely attributed to the increase in the subscriptions. Although no grants have been made from the Restoration Fund, the Receipts of £21 IIs. 6d. are a little disappointing. I ask all members to give as generously as they can to collections at Meetings.

The Jubilee of the Diocese was marked by the visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury to Bury St. Edmunds and Ipswich, where a reception was held in County Hall. The Guild was represented at this function by the

Ringing Master and myself.

A very successful week-end course to provide for the needs of prospective instructors was held from January 30th—February 1st, 1964. The course was held at Belstead House, Ipswich and was kindly sponsored by the East Suffolk Education Committee. Thanks are due to the hard work put in by the organiser, Mr. L. E. Last.

It will be seen that the Calendar of Meetings for 1965 is included on the inside cover. The venues have been provisionally fixed and will be adhered to where possible with the co-operation of the clergy concerned. Sunday Service ringing and practice nights as far as I am aware have also been included under the heading of towers as a further guide to the activities in the county. I would be grateful if tower secretaries would notify the Report Editor or myself of any amendments or additions. Likewise the matter of adjustment of peal totals since several members have remarked to me that their peal total as shown in the Report is incorrect.

Our most sincere condolences are extended to the relatives of members who have passed to higher service during the year.

My grateful thanks are due to those who have helped me complete this first year of office. In particular to Mr. Roger Whittell for his help in compiling this Report and to the ladies for the splended tea at the General Meeting in September. My best wishes to you all for good ringing during 1965 and the furtherance of the work of the Guild.

#### TECHNICAL ADVISER'S REPORT

In 1964 your Technical Adviser reported on the bells in a further 10 Suffolk towers, bringing the total to date to 276, and he made re-inspections of three other rings of bells. Progress has been slower this year due to your Adviser having undertaken to train a band from scratch on the new light ring of six, tenor 3 cwt. 0 qr. 16 lb., at his home tower of Christ Church, Radlett, thus making absence from Hertfordshire at the week-end more difficult until the new band is established.

Of the 10 towers inspected three contained rings of bells. At All Saints, Newmarket (8), the fittings are in a bad state and the headstocks badly worm-eaten. Musically they are very unsatisfactory; but the five heavier bells are the only existing ring by John Thornton of Sudbury and are perhaps the only ring he ever cast, which may explain their poor tone. Until recently only one bell has been tolled and a scheme to instal a set of Ellacombe hammers has been approved and it is hoped that this will arouse enough interest to get the ring completely overhauled. Swinging all eight bells in full circles is now alas too risky to contemplate.

At Ousden the five bells hang in a central tower in a frame dated 1758; the bells were cast by Lester & Pack in the same year with a tenor of 14 cwt. 1 qr. 10 lb. The tenor badly needs quarter turning, but the bells are now only sounded with Ellacombe hammers. The headstocks are severely worm-eaten and will soon be unsafe to support even the dead weight of the bells. In the long term a new frame and fittings are required.

At Rougham the fourth bell of about 1400 badly needs turning again. A treble was added and all hung in a new frame with new fittings by Day in 1895, but there are four different designs of clapper joints in the six bells, all are unsatisfactory by modern standards. The pulleys rattle, and the plain bearings allow the lubricant to run over the slider paths. It is hoped that the six bells will be overhauled shortly.

The Lavenham bells have been removed to the Loughborough Foundry where it was found that the tenor, which retains canons and most of the argent, weighs only 21 cwt. 0 qr. 7 lb. The strike note is \(\frac{1}{2}\) semitone sharp of D flat, which is quite exceptional for this weight. The bells are to be hung in a new metal frame with new fittings. The old frame of about 1525 has been dismantled and the timbers were found to be in a very seriously decayed state.

St. Mary's, Bury St. Edmunds, bells have been removed to Loughborough while work is in hand restoring the tower which began to disintegrate on the west side. A new metal frame is to be installed, mounted on a reinforced concrete girdle needed to stiffen up the tower. Funds are the problem here and no date is known to the writer for the bells' return to the tower.

At Bramford the five heavier bells were all cast by Miles Graye I in 1632, unfortunately a bent Ellacombe hammer has cracked the tenor. There are only two other sets of five or more bells bearing Miles Graye's name, those at Great Leighs, Essex, and Swaffham, Norfolk, but they are almost certainly the work of his son and not the founder of the Lavenham tenor. We have recently had some experience with a Danish firm who very successfully welded the cracked Little Hallingbury, Essex, tenor of about 1400. This bell is hung dead and chimed, and it was desired as a national matter to see if the same technique would be satisfactory for bells swung in a full circle. The Bramford tenor is to be welded using this technique.

During the year the Dalham bells were rung for the first time for quite a while, and it was a great pleasure to have the incumbent, the Rev. H. B. S. Cartwright, take a rope with us. It is such a pity that we have so few clerical ringers in the diocese.

At Stoke-by-Clare the installation of the heating system mentioned in the last report has been completed, but the equipment is really vast and larger than anyone had been led to believe. As a result the two tenors are unringable as the ropes fall inside the perimeter of the plant. Your Adviser has submitted a scheme for altering the fall of these ropes but unfortunately the living is vacant at the moment.

At Little Thurlow the cracked third bell is to be recast, and all five bells hung dead in the existing frame. They will then be chimed with Ellacombe hammers. This is a set-back for change ringers in the area but clearly unless local ringers do give strong support to P.C.C's one cannot grumble if a cheaper scheme is selected which will enable the bells to be heard but not to be swung in full circles.

At Stanstead (6) the bells are to be rehung with new fittings and put in a new metal frame set on a reinforced concrete girdle. The single bell at Wixoe is to be rehung after being unsafe to use for some years and the tenor of three at Little Saxham is to be rehung in a new metal three bell frame. The other two bells are to be temporarily placed on the church floor

Your Adviser has now completed ten years service on the Diocesan Advisory Committee for the Care of Churches and has been re-appointed by the Bishop for a further term of five years. As change ringing gets back on to its feet again in Suffolk and more rings are regularly used your Adviser will be very pleased to help solve any problems which may arise connected with badly going bells, etc. A letter to his home, 1 Canons Close, Radlett, Herts, will ensure an early visit.

#### **OBITUARY**

#### Mr. Llewellyn Allum

As a last respect a peal of Yorkshire (his favourite method) was rung upon the bells where he learnt his change ringing. All who took part were members of that band. To his young widow, we offer our deepest sympathy: they had been married only 18 months.

The death occurred of Mr. F. W. Rickwood of West Stow on August 28th, at the early age of 44 years.

"Bill", as he was known, was a most reliable ringer, always being punctual. West Stow has lost a wonderful man.

#### Mr. Arthur E. Smith

During the year the Blaxhall company lost a respected member in the death of Mr. Arthur E. Smith, at the age of 74 years.
