RINGING MASTER'S REPORT—1966

It is always very heartening for a Ringing Master to be able to report a year of progress and I do this gladly for 1966. However I am conscious too that it is very easy to be repetitive as I comment on each year's activities, so I will endeavour to confine myself (as Dickens' character Mr. Gradgrind emphasised) to "facts, boy, facts"!

For the third successive year we have recorded an increased membership and this has happily resulted in widespread teaching. Each District has, in its own way, taken up the challenge of recruitment and there are now centres over the face of the Diocese. Isolated agreed, but it's a start and if we can continue at the same tempo as set in 1966, our target of 500 members by 1970 is a distinct possibility. Apart from the well-known beginners' towers, Theberton, Leiston, Blythburgh, Horringer, Barrow and Otley made a start during the year and have already shown excellent results. I commend the "circuit" system operating in the N.E. District; am more convinced than ever that it is the answer in our scattered community and would like to refer to it at Beccles in April.

As evidenced by our record A.G.M. at Lavenham with 200 present, ringing has received a timely 'shot in the arm'. I call on every one of you to keep this up. It was a privilege to be able to visit 43 different towers during 1966 including 15 of the 22 meetings and I accord my thanks to those who made my wife and I so welcome. We have a varied calendar for 1967 and Beccles should prove an ideal venue for our Annual Meeting.

The quality of Sunday Service Ringing was clearly demonstrated at the Striking Competition at Theberton. Results were as follows:

Neither let us be slow in asserting our Churchmanship—it's high time this nonsense of assuming that ringers just ring and go to the pub opposite was dispelled. I am very proud of the fact that seventy-five per cent of our young bands are Communicant members of the Church.

Turning to peals, we improved again on last year. The first of Albanian and Lincolnshire Surprise Royal and Ealing S. Major are noted; and the first of Stedman Caters for ten years! The peal of London at Wilby was the 1,500th peal of Major for the Guild. However it was in the field of Multi-Minor, culminating in 148 methods, that we were able to record the highest number of methods ever rung to a peal. Moving from 40, to 55, 66, 100, 134 and 148 Howard Egglestone distinguished himself with some first class conducting. Being leading peal ringer (23) and conductor for 1966, besides considerable teaching and social work I congratulate Howard on your behalf on the contribution he makes to our ringing affairs.

"First pealers" were: H. Archer, Stephen (14) and Ruth Bedford (13), Andrew (12) and Wendy Ellis (13), Robert Cassidy (13), Melvin Hone, Brian Clampin, Barry Haywood, David Brooks, Ernest Smith, Owen Claxton and John W. Carter. Special congratulations to the youngsters and their tutor Peter Bedford and his bands, and to Leslie Mills as leader at Bures.

Some other interesting peal notes emerge. The first on the Mendlesham six, the seven Surprise at Preston, Vevuar Bedfords 1st as conductor and peals by G. R. Goodship (79) and G. E. Symonds (91). Grundisburgh had its 200th peal on the bells and personal milestones include J. I. Rogers and T. Brooks' 50th, R. L. K. Whittells 100th for the Guild, S. R. E. Pipe and C. W. Pipe 300th and 600th respectively.

Eighty-nine quarters with good variety are listed for the year and very pleased we are to see them. I'm sure you will all agree the worth of printing the quarters.

May I suggest that whilst the beginners are naturally started on Doubles and Minor as ringing maturity develops do go out into the eight and ten-bell fields when you can. A young ringer that has had his six bell peal needs one of Triples or Major to keep him interested and I will gladly be available for that step if I can assist.

Last, but not least our call change ringers. Be encouraged by the fact that the Ringing World Committee is endeavouring to set up a "call change ringers weekly feature" which should be of interest to all.

I look forward to another progressive year in 1967. Thank you for your support; let us remember our duties to God and the Church, the District and the Guild and moreover, enjoy your ringing to the full.

GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

In presenting what I hope will be a comprehensive and encouraging Report of 1966, I hope also that we as individual members will examine ourselves to see what contribution we have made over the past year for the progress of ringing. We have all heard said many times "I don't go to Church but I love to hear the bells on a Sunday morning". This to me is an indication that our work kindles in more than a few people the thought of the continuance of Christian worship. It probably portrays it to ten times the number of people who are assembling in the building below. Every peal, quarter peal or short 'touch' is representative of the attitude of the band in their minds towards the ringing in which they are taking part. Perhaps 50 per cent are putting everything into it, 25 per cent are indifferent and the remainder couldn't care less. Even such a 'touch' might sound better than one where the band is composed of 100 per cent keenness but where experience is lacking. It is therefore not for us to stand outside the tower and remark, "That was a bit of a jumble" when it may well be the very best that the band are capable of producing. Far better, surely, to impart our own knowledge and skill whatever grade it may be for the furtherance of the art and attainment of the highest standard possible. Ringing has so many facets and each one can become the study and pleasure of a lifetime if we are prepared to put something of ourselves into it.

Guild Events

The A.G.M. at Lavenham on April 16th was undoubtedly a great success and it was estimated that some 200 people attended the gathering, thus creating a record in attendance. We were grateful to the Rev. A. A. Muxlow, Vicar of Stowmarket, and himself a ringer for his address at the service. A total of 20 towers were open during the afternoon and evening. At the business meeting all the officers were re-elected.

Another very successful striking competition was held on May 7th at Theberton and the arrangements were very efficiently handled by Trevor Bailey and fellow officers of the North East District. Thanks are accorded to the Judges (Tom Lock, Hon. Secretary, Middlesex Association, and Richard Hunt of Ruskington, Lincs.).

On May 14th Rougham bells were re-dedicated by Canon Gilbert Thurlow who also preached an inspiring address which was later the subject of a leading article in the "Ringing World". The bells now 'go' splendidly and the work accomplished at this tower is of great credit to the local band.

In addition to the 20 District Meetings and numerous district practice evenings, two joint meetings have been held with neighbouring associations. I hope we shall see more of these in the future as they are a splendid indication of the fraternal spirit which exists among ringers everywhere. As usual our Calendar of Events for the coming year is to be seen on the front inside cover.

Committee Meetings in 1966

The usual three meetings have been held viz., 26th February at Stratford St. Mary, 13th August at Little Glemham and 26th November at Stoke-by-Nayland. General matters of administration and organising of events were the chief items of discussion at these meetings. There was an average

attendance of 13 which is indicative of representatives interest in the free running of the Guild. I would be grateful if members with any problems at their towers would ask their representatives to bring them to the notice of the committee. Also if it is heard that a ring of bells is to be removed or tampered with in any way which might be regarded as untoward, please bring such matters to the notice of the committee. If this is done remedial action may well result after action is taken by the Diocesan Guild as a body under our Technical Adviser, who is on the Diocesan Advisory Committee.

Treasurer's Report

It may be safely said that the Guild financial state is satisfactory with an increased balance in both General and Restoration accounts. No grants have been made for bell restoration work during the year but the receipts side is again largely helped by a generous donation from the Guild Social at Bramford on December 17th. The transfer of £100 from the current account to a deposit account will help the funds slightly with the interest annually accruing.

Membership

The analysis shows an increase of 25 members over 1965 largely due to the increase in the North-East District.

TECHNICAL ADVISER'S REPORT

In 1966 your Adviser reported on the rings of bells at Wickham Market, Hadleigh, Boxford, and Great Barton together with the set of four at Mettingham.

At Wickham Market pigeons had been getting into the bell chamber, and though the frame and fittings were new in 1883 they are now deteriorating. The tenor headstock is wormeaten and split, and a complete overhaul will soon be necessary. Another factor is a vertical crack in the west part of the round tower. Fortunately the bells still remain fairly easy to ring.

The eight at Hadleigh by contrast are really hard work; the worst bells in this respect are the two tenors. The front six go reasonably well on their own and the writer made recommendations for enabling these to be rung regularly for service for the time being. The main trouble is a distorting frame and worn fittings, and a restoration must include a new frame. The Miles Graye III tenor is virtually the same mouth diameter as the Lavenham tenor and $\frac{1}{2}$ in. thicker in the soundbow; now it has no canons it must weigh no more than 23 cwt., rather less than the 28 cwt. reputed.

The eight at Boxford have not been properly rung for some 40 years due to the frame arrangement and the tower. The three trebles hang in an upper tier just under the roof, with the five tenors in an old four bell frame below. This frame has been much weakened to get the extra bell in. The sixth and seventh here have remarkably fine pre-Reformation inscriptions. The treble is cracked. The tenor here at 50 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. mouth diameter is less canons and argent and is not likely to scale more than 22 cwt.

Great Barton bells are not in a good state, the tower is cracked in the east wall, the gudgeon pins on the fourth and tenor (1861 vintage) are badly worn, the third and fourth are very poor tonally, and the bell frame after many years service and much patching is now getting past it.

Mettingham has an unringable four; only three bells have ropes due to a decayed wheel on the second, yet it is this latter bell which is the only one safe to use!

Bell restoration work in 1966 has been rather less than in former years. Rougham were re-dedicated after a thorough overhaul and are now in excellent order. Another re-dedication of some interest was that of the Bramford tenor after a welded repair in Denmark. This welding was observed by the British Welding Research Association's representative from Abington Hall, Cambridge, and they have since then successfully welded a scrap bell at Abington Hall. It is hoped that they will soon commence work on the Groton treble.

Stowmarket bells are away at the Loughborough Foundry and are expected back shortly. The bells from St. Mary's, Bury and Nayland have remained at Loughborough for another year. Troston bells have been returned to the church, the tenor is hung dead up the tower and the other

five sit on their mouths in different parts of the church. This also applies to Stanstead where only one of the trebles is used. The five at Lidgate are soon to be lowered from the frame for safety, they have been unringable for many years with the third and tenor cracked.

At Sweffling the tower parapets are unsafe and at Monks Eleigh the tower walls are breaking up internally; in both cases ringing has had to stop, at least for the moment.

Worlingham tower has had a reinforced concrete roof cast and the parapets rebuilt, and the bells were rung for the first time for some years. The N-S tower sway is considerable and a new frame with a better layout is needed lower down the tower.

Thurston is another tower where the bells have not been rung in full circles for some years before 1966; their state is, however, poor. Clopton were rung again in 1966 but here the second and fifth are cracked in the crown.

Your Adviser visited Huntingfield to check on the position of a proposed central heating boiler just by the tower and he found that with it in the suggested position the treble could not be rung in changes. The scheme is being reconsidered.

Your Adviser asks to be kept informed of bells that are difficult to ring without obvious cause, or where permission to ring is not granted due to the state of the tower or the bells so he can visit and keep the index and directory of towers up to date.

RULES

1. Subscriptions shall be due in advance on January 1st, annually.
2. Any member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st shall lose his membership. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid. Lapsed members may be reinstated on payment of 2s. in addition to the annual subscription.
3. Should a Ringing Member, having paid five consecutive years' subscriptions, remove from the Diocese, he may without payment become a Non-Resident Member for such time as he continues to reside outside the Diocese.
4. All ringing at meetings of the Guild shall be under the direction of a Ringing Master and shall be such as is approved by the Central Council. The decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.
5. A peal fee of 6d. per rope is payable in respect of all peals rung for the Guild. Conductors are responsible for collecting and forwarding them to the General Secretary. No peal will be recorded unless the peal fees have been paid.
6. The Secretary may pay, on request, 2nd class return railway fare, together with a maximum of two nights' hotel expenses to such representative attending the Central Council Meeting, provided that the total indebtedness of the Guild for all representatives does not exceed £20 in any one year.
7. The Committee may remove a member from the Guild for a serious offence against the Objects and Rules, subject to appeal at a General Meeting.
8. The Objects, Constitution, and Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting after three months' notice given at General Meeting.

OBITUARY

Ronald A. Francis

Ronnie Francis of Rickinghall passed away on December 13th, 1965, aged 50 years. A ringer for the past 30 years he was also sidesman and latterly Churchwarden at the Rickinghall Churches.

Frederick Kinsey

On August 24th Fred Kinsey passed away in the Ipswich and East Suffolk Hospital in his 85th year. He was taught ringing by his father at Old Newton but had been connected with bands in the Ipswich area for the past 50 years. He was a most faithful Sunday service ringer at St. Margaret's, Ipswich until about two years ago and had made a speciality of rope-splicing, at which he was expert. A half-muffled quarter peal of Grandsire Triples was rung as a tribute.

Stanley Smith

Lavenham tower has lost a faithful and loyal member in the passing of Stan Smith during 1966. Aged 66, he had started ringing in 1919 and had rung one peal at Lavenham, and a few handbell peals. He had over the years taken part in many quarter peals for Sunday service ringing.

Stedman H. Symonds

The whole county mourned the passing of Stedman Symonds in February. One of the famous Lavenham band and a ringer there, like his father for over 60 years, he was an accomplished composer and conductor. Stedman was a master of the whole art of ringing from teaching to handbells—all with the patience and skill of a true craftsman.

Of his total of 239 peals, 100 exactly were for our Guild. He was the first Ringing Master (in 1921) when the Guild was formed and remained a loyal member until his death.
