RINGING MASTERS REPORT-1967

If I were asked to cite the two most encouraging aspects of our work in the Suffolk Guild during 1967, I would name first, our closer liaison with Clergy and parish alike throughout the Diocese and secondly (for the fourth successive year) an increased membership.

This latter point, in an age when Rural Arts and Crafts and many things worthwhile are losing a lot of general support, is something of which we can be proud. And when I record that three of the Michaelmas Ordinands were ringers then this is good news indeed.

My travels around the Diocese during 1967 were not able to be outte as extensive as 1966 but nevertheless it was a pleasure to attend 12 meetings and to call on 47 Towers for either Service or Practice inging. Generally speaking our standard is outte good and credit is again due to our untiring instructors. I would like members to particularly note the addendum to the N.W. District membership list which is an excellent medium for district expansion and ascertaining "whats on."

The A.G.M. was again a tremendous success and what a tonic to see that fine belfry at Beccles filled to capacity with our President in its midst before the Service. We are trying Stowmarket this year and although only an 8 bell Tower there is a good supporting programme in the afternoon and evening.

The striking competition at Horringer broke all records—12 Teams competing, and we congratulate the winners.

One point on striking needs continued emphasis—that of Leading, and I ask instructors to stress its importance. And if I could generalise for a moment and give one tip for the 1968 competition it's this—put your good strikers on 1, 2 and Tenor!

Talks were given at Ufford, Beccles and Ioswich during the year—do let me know if I can help your area in this way.

The peals total for 1967 was the lowest since 1963 due entirely to some of our peal organisers not being quite so active in this field. It is a matter for regret no 12 bell peal has been rung for five years now, highligh ing the pressing need for the St. Mary le Tower Ipswich Restoration not only for the fortunate few I might add but 'open house' for ALL Guild members who wish to try their hand at Cinques and Maximus.

The first of Superlative S. Royal for the Guild is recorded and a notable anniversary marked with the fine performance of 10,080 Bob Major at Debenham in September. The goodly list of first pealers includes: Alan Kirk Solbert and Alan McDonald II both from Groton School, U.S.A., Michael Baldry, Clyde Curtis, Jane Hallas, Dr. Stuart Harrisen, Chris Nunn, Clifford Poulson, Sharon Page, John Rampley, Tony Spurling and John Wintram.

Four people conducted their first peal: Winifred Lockwood, David Derrick, Michael Howes and Adrian Knights. Personal achievements include 50th peals for Muriel Page, Leslie Mills and Michael Howes and 50th and 100th for the Guild for Edwin R. Goate and Neville Whittell respectively. Finally, hearty congratulations to George Symonds with peals in his 92nd year.

Our call change ringers and Quarter pealers have had an active spell—118 quarters being recorded with an interesting cross section of methods.

In conclusion may I thank you all for your support during last year. When I took office at Bury St. Edmunds in 1964 I was asked to define the Masters' job! There are no parameters for such an office nor would I venture to say for any ringer whatever his standard. Whatever we can do for the promotion of the Art of Ringing both as a hobby and a service to God and the community. Could this be our theme for 1968?

SECRETARY AND TREASURER'S REPORT

As 1967 closes it is apparent that the extent of the Guild's activities has been subject to the usual continuous changes which take place. Some new bands have sprung up, some have fallen away, the majority plod on faithfully week after week. Some members have lost interest, others have become rejuvenated in their enthusiasm. Unless progress in the tower is being made and we have an end-product in view there is likely to be complacency. To endeavour to leave ringing in a better state than we found it must surely be a good aim and the interest it provides should help carry us through the months ahead.

Guild Events

Members gave splendid support to the A.G.M. at Beccles on April 1st and about 180 attended the choral service, tea and meeting. The Bishop of the Diocese, Dr. Leslie Brown, preached an inspiring sermon. Fifteen towers were available during the afternoon and evening. All officers were re-elected except the Report Editor, to which office Rev. Lawrence R. Pizzey was elected.

A record number of teams entered the striking competition at Horringer on May 6th. Frank Lufkin and Miss Hilda Snowden were the judges and about 120 members attended. On May 13th, a memorial board to the late Stedman Symonds was dedicated in Lavenham Tower in the presence of a large company of his friends.

The Rt. Rev. D. R. Maddock was commissioned as Bishop Suffragan of Dunwich in the Cathedral and has been invited to accept the office of Vice-President of the Guild. I have welcomed the Bishop to the Diocese on your behalf and hope he may have a long and happy association with Suffolk. At the ordination services held at Hadleigh and St. Mary-le-Tower, Ipswich on 24th September, three of the ordinands were ringers. A particular welcome is therefore extended to Frank Tanner (St. Margaret's, Ipswich), Lawrence Pizzey (Bramford) and Brian Redgers (Rushmere). Stowmarket bells have been re-dedicated and Mr. Barnard and neighbouring ringers are working hard training a new band assisted by the Vicar and his family. Three Committee meetings have been held at Ufford, Framsden and Leiston with an increased average attendance of 15. A detailed inventory of the Pearson's handbells was drawn up together with rules relating to their use. They are also now insured for their replacement value of approximately £300.

Finance

The general account balance is about the same as last year at £204 4s. 7d and can be regarded as satisfactory as expenses have been slightly higher. Members have given wonderful support to the Restoration Fund and the present balance at £240 13s. 7d. is the highest since the fund was started in 1947.

Membership

Membership has again increased by 37 and it is good to see the 400 mark passed again.

TECHNICAL ADVISER'S REPORT

In 1967 your Adviser reported on the rings of bells at Benhall, Newmarket St. Mary, Rushmere St. Andrew, Kelsale, and the sets of four bells at Sternfield and Darsham.

The ring of six at Benhall were overhauled by Alfred Bowell in 1927 and remain in quite good order. As inspected, one of the tenor bearings was loose in the frame and required attention. The elm headstocks and some of the wheels were worm-eaten and the treble clapper was an inch too long.

At Newmarket St. Mary, Taylors put the ring of five in a new metal six bell frame in 1904, and they added a tenor in 1923. Here the frame wanted painting and attention was required to some of the clapper joints and rope pulleys.

At Rushmere St. Andrew all the six bells swing N-S, and the vertical crack in the centre of the west wall changes its width as they are rung. Also the tower has spasms of horizontal movement when particular changes are rung. Your Adviser considers that the bells should be re-hung in a new frame with some of the bells swinging E-W with the frame support structure set on a reinforced concrete girdle to tie the walls together. Generally towers like Rushmere are stiffer E-W than N-S.

At Kelsale the two trebles are in an upper timber frame which rocks excessively when they are rung. The plain bearings on the fifth, sixth, and seventh are badly worn, and the tone of the fourth and sixth leaves much to be desired. In the long term a new frame is needed.

The four at Sternfield were re-hung by Alfred Bowell in 1935. He re-cast the treble, and hung them all for swing chiming with levers in the timber four bell frame of about 1600. He replaced the side frame on the south side and stiffened it up elsewhere, but it remains weak in the N.E. corner due to decay.

At Darsham the four bells have not been overhauled for a great many years and are in poor order. All the bells need turning and supplying with new fittings. A leaking roof has seriously decayed the frame in two areas.

Musically the bells are odd, they are closest to being the front four of a ring of six, but they hang in a normal four bell frame with a central access opening.

During the year the Stowmarket bells were re-dedicated. Before the work was put in hand it was agreed by the parish that the bell frame should be anchored, but at the time of re-dedication this unfortunately had not been done, and the whole frame was shifting E-W relative to the walls as the bells were rung. Such movement is bound to make the bells harder to ring than they need be.

At Kersey the six bells including the cracked tenor have been removed to the Loughborough Foundry. The tower is to be restored, and the bells will in due course be hung in a new frame set just above the clock room floor. The tenor is to be re-cast and the new frame is to be capable of being extended to house eight bells.

The single bell at Walton cast by Thomas Lawrance of London about 1520 and the single bell at Little Bradley have both been re-hung by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank.

The Groton treble has been repaired by welding by the British Welding Research Association at Abington Hall, Cambridge, and is now in use again up the tower. It is to be hoped that the visit of the band of ringers from Groton School, Mass., U.S.A. during the summer will lead to a complete restoration of these bells for change ringing. This will involve a new frame and fittings.

Your Adviser was asked to look at the tower parapets at Halesworth, and he found them in an extremely decayed state. Re-building them would seem to be indicated, and the parish was advised to consult their architect.

At Bardwell the tower is cracked and some of the belfry walling has collapsed, so ringing has been suspended until the defects can be made good.

Your Adviser is concerned about some of the rusty metal bell frames he has seen recently in Suffolk towers. Cast iron has good corrosion resistance but often our frames are in rolled mild steel or wrought iron and all are generally supported on steel girders set into the walls. It is very important to repaint before the rust gets too much of a hold as then a great deal of preparation work is necessary to get down to bare metal. The local band does have a duty to keep the P.C.C. informed of the position and to ensure that the matter is kept before them till dealt with.

OBJECTS

- 1 FEDERATION. To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese for the purpose of mulual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2 RECOGNITION. To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringes and their services (qualifications for which demand much time, skill and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3 PROMOTION OF CHANGE RINGING. To encourage, cultivate and foster the art of scientific Change Ringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, instructors when and where required.
- 4 REFORM. To promote a proper appreciation of the ringing chamber as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal or care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment thereof; as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition; to advocate needful repairs and renovations and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concurring the condition of bells and their fittings.

CONSTITUTION

- 1 The Guild shall be known as the Suffolk Guild of Ringers for the Diocese of St. Edmundsbury and Ip_wich.
- 2 The Officers of the Guild shall consist of:— The Lord Bishop of the Diocese as President, Pairons, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer, Report Editor, Auditor and the Technical Adviser.
- The Guild shall consist of (a) Ringing Members, (b) Probationers, (c) Junior Members, (d) Honorary Members, (e) Life Members.
 - (a) Ringing Members may be elected at any meeting where there are five other members present, or, provisionally by two other Members, before starting for a peal. Ringing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Ringing Members shall be 5s. 0d. per year.
 - (b) Probationers may be elected at any meeting where there are five other members present. This grade of membership is for those learning change ringing but who have not yet rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Probationers shall be 2s. 6d. per year.
 - (c) Junior Members under the age of 16 years, who shall pay half the annual subscription.
 - (d) Honorary Members may be elected on a payment of 5s. 0d. per year.
 - (e) Life Members residing out of the County to make a single payment of 10s.

- 4 The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer, Report Editor, Technical Adviser, District Chairmen (ex-officio), District Secretaries (ex-officio), together with two elected members from each District, seven to form a quorum. The Committee will meet a minimum of three times during the year.
- 5 The area covered by the Guild shall be divided into Districts, each of which shall have its own Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Committee, who shall be elected at the District Annual Meeting. Each District will elect two representatives to serve on the Guild Committee. The Secretary will:—
 - (a) Arrange Meetings for practice.
 - (b) Arrange for instruction.
 - (c) Collect the subscriptions of all members. N.B.—In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary, or Captain, or Ringing Master, who shall collect all subscriptions as soon as possible after January 1st., and send them to the District Secretary.
 - (d) Forward these subscriptions to the General Secretary together with his receipt book and details of any expenditure, at the end of the year for audit.
- 6 The Guild shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, and shall loyally abide by the rules and decisions thereof.

RULES

- 1 Subscriptions shall be due in advance on January 1st annually.
- 2 Any member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st shall lose his membership. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid. Lapsed members may be reinstated on payment of 2s. in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3 Should a Ringing Member, having paid five consecutive years' subscriptions, remove from the Diocese, he may without payment become a Non-Resident Member for such time as he continues to reside outside the Diocese.
- 4 All ringing at meetings of the Guild shall be under the direction of a Ringing Master and shall be such as is approved by the Central Council. The decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.
- 5 A peal fee of 6d. per rope is payable in respect of all peals rung for the Guild. Conductors are responsible for collecting and forwarding them to the General Secretary. No peal will be recorded unless the peal fees have been paid.
- 6 The Secretary may pay, on request, 2nd class return railway fare, together with a maximum of two nights' hotel expenses to such representative attending the Central Council Meeting, provided that the total indebtedness of the Guild for all representatives does not exceed £20 in any one year.
- 7 The Committee may remove a member from the Guild for a serious offence against the Objects and Rules, subject to appeal at a General Meeting.
- 8 The Objects, Constitution and Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting after three months' notice given at a General Meeting.

REGULATIONS relating to PEARSON'S HANDBELLS

The Pearson Handbells are the property of the Suffolk Guild of Ringers, under the care of the Trustees. They are loaned to any member of the Guild whose name appears in the current Annual

Report, according to the regulations relating to the handbells. The bells are loaned in the first instance for a maximum period of three months. At the end of this period they are to be returned to the trustees by the borrower, and they may then be loaned for a further three months if they are not required by another member of the Guild. If they are borrowed for this further period, the borrower may be asked to return the bells to the trustees if they are required by another member of the Guild. A member from another tower has priority over a member from the same tower as the preceding borrower.

The bells are the responsibility of the borrower, after he has signed for them, until they are returned to the trustees by the borrower. The bells are not to be loaned to anyone by the borrower without

the prior consent of both the trustees.

The bells must be returned to the trustees upon request. The trustees should endeavour to give seven days' notice if they require the bells, and should return them to the borrower as soon as possible. If the bells are required for a particular occasion, they can be re-

served up to three months in advance.

The trustees are responsible to the Committee of the Guild for the administration of the bells, and their decisions regarding the bells can be revoked by the Committee.

The trustees and the Committee of the Guild would be grateful for financial help for the maintenance of the handbells from members

who have enjoyed the use of them.

DISTRICT REPORTS NORTH WEST

Quarterly meetings were held at Barrow, Elveden, Horringer and

Ixworth.

Practice meetings were held at Rougham, Lakenheath, Fornham St. Martin, West Stow, Great Barton and Ixworth. Service ringing has been carried out at Fornham St. Martin, Pakenham and Dalham—all towers at which the bells are not normally rung. Quite a number of district members have taken part in this special service ringing; and mention must also be made of the efforts of the Rougham band, who have carried out ringing for special services at Hunston, Great Ashfield, Stowlangtoft, Thurston, Hepworth, Dinkstone, Hessett, Pakenham and Ixworth. It is to be hoped/that the occasional ringing of these normally silent bells, whether for practice, service, or wedding, will prove worthwhile.

During 1967 District membership has increased from 57 to 74—an increase of 30 per cent over 1966.

Three District towers entered for the Striking Competition, held at Horringer: Ixworth, Horringer and Rougham were placed 5th equal, 7th and 9th respectively. Can we manage four entries in 1968?

The recent innovation of holding practice meetings on a Friday evening has been tried on two occasions, and has proved popular, particularly with the volunteer incorr.

ticularly with the younger ringers.

Finally, a big thank you to Robin and Janet Rogers, and to John Underwood, for their work in teaching younger ringers and getting the District buzzing again. My sincere thanks.
