The President, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, General Secretary and Treasurer, Report Editor, Technical Adviser, Pearson Handbells Trustees, District Chairman and District Secretaries (exofficio), together with two representatives from each District.

OBJECTS

- FEDERATION. To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2. RECOGNITION. To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualifications for which demand much time, skill and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- PROMOTION OF CHANGE RINGING. To encourage, cultivate and foster the art of scientific Change Ringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, instructors when and where required.
- 4. REFORM. To promote a proper appreciation of the ringing chamber as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment thereof; as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition; to advocate needful repairs and renovations and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the condition of bells and their fittings.

CONSTITUTION

- 1. The Guild shall be known as the Suffolk Guild of Ringers for the Diocese of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich.
- The Officers of the Guild shall consist of: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese as President, Patrons, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer, Report Editor, Auditor and the Technical Adviser.
- The Guild shall consist of (a) Ringing Members, (b) Probationers,
 (c) Junior Members, (d) Honorary Members, (e) Life Members.
 - (a) Ringing Members may be elected at any meeting where there are five other members present; or, provisionally by two other Members, before starting for a peal. Ringing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Ringing Members shall be 5s. per year.
 - (b) Probationers may be elected at any meeting where there are five other members present. This grade of membership is, for those learning change ringing but who have not yet rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Probationers shall be 2s, 6d, per year.
 - (c) Junior Members under the age of 16 years, who shall pay half the annual subscription.
 - (d) Honorary Members may be elected on a payment of 5s. per year.
 - (e) Life Members residing out of the County to make a single payment of 10s.

- 4. The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer, Report Editor, Technical Adviser, Pearson Handbells Trustees, District Chairmen (exofficio), District Secretaries (ex-officio), together with two elected members from each District, seven to form a quorum. The Committee will meet a minimum of three times during the year.
- 5. The area covered by the Guild shall be divided into Districts, each of which shall have its own Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Committee, who shall be elected at the District Annual Meeting. Each District will elect two representatives to serve on the Guild Committee. The Secretary will:—
 - (a) Arrange Meetings for practice.
 - (b) Arrange for instruction.
 - (c) Collect the subscriptions of all members.
 N.B.—In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary, or Captain, or Ringing Master, who shall collect all subscriptions, as soon as possible after January 1st, and send them to the District Secretary.
 - (d) Forward these subscriptions to the General Secretary together with his receipt book and details of any expenditure, at the end of the year for audit.
- 6. The Guild shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, and shall loyally abide by the rules and decisions thereof.

RULES

- 1. Subscriptions shall be due in advance on January 1st annually.
- 2. Any member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st shall lose his membership. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid. Lapsed members may be restated on payment of 2s. in addition to the annual subscription.
- Should a Ringing Member, having paid five consecutive years' subscriptions, remove from the Diocese, he may without payment become a Non-Resident Member for such time as he continues to reside outside the Diocese.
- 4. All ringing at meetings of the Guild shall be under the direction of a Ringing Master and shall be such as is approved by the General Council. The decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.
- 5. A peal fee of 6d, per rope is payable in respect of all peals rung for the Guild. Conductors are responsible for collecting and forwarding them to the General Secretary. No peal will be recorded unless the peal fees have been paid.
- 6. The Secretary may pay, on request, 2nd class return railway fare, together with a maximum of two nights' hotel expenses to such representative attending the Central Council Meeting, provided that the total indebtedness of the Guild for all representatives does not exceed £20 in any one year.

- 7. The Committee may remove a member from the Guild for a serious offence against the Objects and Rules, subject to appeal at a General Meeting.
- 8. The Objects, Constitution and Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting after three months' notice given at a General Meeting.

REGULATIONS relating to PEARSON'S HANDBELLS

- The Pearson Handbells are the property of the Suffolk Guild of Ringers, under the care of the Trustees. They are loaned to any member of the Guild whose name appears in the current Annual Report, according to the regulations relating to the handbells.
- 2. The bells are loaned in the first instance for a maximum period of three months. At the end of this period they are to be returned to the Trustees by the borrower, and they may then be loaned for a further three months if they are not required by another member of the Guild. If they are borrowed for this further period, the borrower may be asked to return the bells to the Trustees if they are required by another member of the Guild. A member from another tower has priority over a member from the same tower as the preceding borrower.
- The bells are the responsibility of the borrower, after he has signed for them, until they are returned to the Trustees by the borrower. The bells are not to be loaned to anyone by the borrower without the prior consent of both the Trustees.
- 4. The bells must be returned to the Trustees upon request. The Trustees should endeavour to give seven days' notice if they require the bells and should return them to the borrower as soon as possible.
- If the bells are required for a particular occasion, they can be reserved up to three months in advance.
- The Trustees are responsible to the Committee of the Guild for the administration of the bells, and their decisions regarding the bells can be revoked by the Committee.
- The Trustees and the Committee of the Guild would be grateful for financial help for the maintenance of the handbells from members who have enjoyed the use of them.

Looking back over 1969, I am impressed, as I have been for the past two or three years, by the high percentage of young ringers in our towers. However, there has not been a rise in membership during the year as I should have liked. Perhaps we all take our Guild for aranted—we are all members, and we enjoy our District quarterly meetings - but the overall welfare of the Guild is something we think we can, or must, leave to the Officers. This is false reasoning. The well-being of the whole Guild is very directly influenced by each and every member. Too many people wait until their District Secretary asks for their subscription and very few of us make it our business to ensure that learners and newcomers are made members at the first opportunity. Let us all make an effort in 1970 to see that our own subscription is promptly paid, and that every other ringer we know in the county is a member of the Guild.

Meetings

The General Guild meetings have been well attended this year. The A.G.M. was held at Bury St. Edmunds on 12th April. The service, at which the Provost preached, was held in the Cathedral and was followed by tea and the business meeting in the Silver Jubilee Boys' School. The meeting heard with regret of George Pipe's decision not to continue as Ringing Master for another year. As evidence of the quality of his leadership, suffice it to say that during his 5 year term of office the membership of the Guild increased by some 37%. Howard Egglestone was unanimously elected as Ringing Master, and George Pipe was elected a Vice-President.

The Striking Competition took place at Woolpit on 3rd May, the Shield being retained by Bramford. Eleven teams competed in a most enjoyable event.

A General Meeting was held at Clopton and Otley on 13th September, and amended the Constitution to make the Pearson Handbell Trustees ex-officio members of the Committee.

The Sudbury Mammoth Olde Tyme Rallye held at Long Melford in June, brought the climax of nine months hard work by Leslie Mills, on the Guild's behalf, when we staged a display of ringing on tower bells (using the Whitechapel Expo Belfry) and handbells. Our most warm thanks to Leslie and all who contributed in any way to the most successful weekend.

The Committee has met three times during the year, with an average attendance of fourteen.

Finance

The General Account balance increased by some £12, and the Restoration Fund by near £15 over the year. Grants totalling £60 were paid to Bungay, Halesworth and Woolpit, and grants amounting to £45 are promised to Kersey and Worlington.

Central Council

Our four representatives all attended the Annual meeting, held this year at St. Albans.

My especial thanks to District Secretaries and members of the Committee who have worked both hard and well during 1969.

I am sure that George will still take an interest in Guild affairs to the continued benefit of the exercise generally.

I feel that 1969 was a good year for the Guild in many ways. The experiment of holding a Peal Week was a great success as the list of first pealers proved. In 1970 the Week will be held from September 26th to October 4th, to coincide with the diocesan celebrations to mark the completion of the present stage of the cathedral. I hope that all members will avail themselves of an opportunity to ring a peal during the

week.

The Striking Competition held at Woolpit again proved to be a very enjoyable and worthwhile day. The competition was won for the second year running by the talented young Bramford band. There is no doubt that the overall standard in this competition is improving all the time and is therefore proving the point of the contest by making everyone more striking conscious. I cannot pretend that our striking is of a consistently high standard at all times, with the amount of basic teaching going on at the moment this would be impossible, but at least the competition is making us realise that good striking is attainable and worth the effort.

It was a great pleasure to see and hear the Guild in action at the Old Tyme Rallye at Long Melford. This venture really put Suffolk ringing on the map and was a great success; this was mainly due to the organising ability and tireless enthusiasm of Leslie Mills; it is not generally realised the amount of work and effort which he unstintingly put into this unique occasion but I am sure that he was rewarded by the sight of thousands of people seeing and enjoying ringing being performed by guild members.

Our peal ringers had a very successful year, 124 peals being rung. Four members conducted a peal for the first time, Muriel Page, Robert Southgate, Brian Whiting and Roger Whittell. A total of 16 first pealers is a very encouraging sign that the teaching of the past few years is paying dividends and our congratulations go to Elizabeth Bowyer, Cheryl Lay, Amanda Richmond, Mrs. Joan Muxlow, Mrs. J. Perry, Sally Potter, David Barber, Raymond Bumstead, Kelvin Dakin, Desmond Harold, Philip Harold, Richard Knight, Peter Muxlow, Nigel Rogers, Stephen Pettman and Felix Potter. Other note-worthy performances included Frederick Wade ringing a peal after a 30 year gap and a very fine effort at Great Thurlow in which Sam Twitchett conducted a peal in which all of the other ringers were his pupils. Other personal milestones included Martin Thorley's 750th peal while his 12 year-old daughter Katharine followed in father's footsteps with her 25th peal. Congratulations also

go to Muriel Page, Alan Bridges and Michael Howes on their 100th peal, Les Brett on his 600th peal and his 200th as conductor, George Pipe on his 150th as conductor and Michael Howes on ringing the Cambridge "family" to peals. Amongst other note-worthy peals was the Bob Major at Stowmarket and the first peal of London Royal by a resident band. There is one performance however which I have intentionally left till last and one which I am sure all those mentioned previously will agree with me provides us with the highlight of the peal columns. I refer of course to the peal of London Surprise Major at Grundisburgh in which George Symonds, in his 95th year, turned in a magnificent performance and provided us all with a superb example and added another remarkable performance to an already highly distinguished career. The grand old man of Suffolk ringing indeed.

These notes can only highlight a few of the many facets of our activities in 1969, but I think that it can be seen that the Guild is in good heart. We cannot afford to be complacent however, it would be very misleading of me to pretend that all is well. Things are better and are improving but with all the ringable peals of bells without ringers let alone the unringable peals in Suffolk there is still a tremendous amount to do. We have turned the corner over the past few years, but the next period must be one of consolidation and continued progress. This can only be done by all members playing a full part in all activities. Support your local tower captain and back up your district officers, but above all always give of your best whilst in the tower. Thank you for your support in 1969. I am sure that 1970 will again see the Suffolk Guild doing its part for the Church and the exercise.

TECHNICAL ADVISER'S REPORT

During the year the bells at Bungay St. Mary and Woolpit have been re-dedicated after their overhauls. At the former there was no floor immediately below the bells making maintenance hazardous and one was to be fitted. At Woolpit the bells were rather too loud inside and somewhat so outside on the south, your adviser made recommendations to correct this.

The Kersey bells are due back in the restored tower early in 1970 and it is hoped that they will be re-dedicated before Easter. They have not been swung in full circles this century!

At Barrow the clappers have been overhauled by the bell founders, and at Ipswich St. Nicholas, Neville Whittell has in his own time re-hung the three trebles and hopes to deal with the two tenors in the Spring. He is much to be commended for this work as it is very doubtful when the parish will be able to afford the new frame and fittings which they will need in the longer term, and it is desirable to keep the bells in a ringable condition meantime.

Our flint rubble towers are giving trouble in a number of places and ringing has had to stop at Helmingham, Ixworth and Great Barton. The towers in this material need regular maintenance and when this is not done the effect becomes cumulative. Every five years the towers and the

rest of the fabrics are inspected by a competent architect. He reports to the P.C.C. and it is up to them to put his recommendations into practice before his next visit in five years time. Also, sometimes this is not happening and on his next visit he finds little or nothing done and the structure in a much worse state. A stitch in time saves nine even on church towers. So please keep in touch with your P.C.C. and get to know the contents of the Architect's report and when appropriate see that recommended work on the tower is dealt with.

At Fornham St. Martin the bells are in such a poor condition that the

P.C.C. does not want them rung till they can be overhauled.

At Leiston a new locally made headstock was fitted to the fourth bell about 1966. This bell was not easy to ring when the writer visited in 1967, and he now understands that this bell is not now used. He hopes to visit and see what can be done. All the bells were re-hung in 1954.

It is hoped to re-hang the five East Bergholt bells. The underside of the frame has been affected by damp and a damp course is to be inserted, the frame and its cage overhauled, and the bells re-hung. The present unique method of ringing will be retained.

Your Adviser inspected the Wetherden bells and reminded the parish of the advice he gave after their overhaul in 1955 when he found that the addition of the ringers' gallery caused the sallies to pass through the ceiling holes at backstroke, and the holes were just not big enough to permit this without undue friction. His 1956 advice unfortunately had not been acted upon.

After very considerable debate it does appear that the Sudbury St. Peter bells are to be hung dead, at least initially. The fear we all have is that once hung dead there is only a slender chance that money will be found to hang them for ringing properly at a later date.

At Worlington it is hoped to re-hang the five bells in a new frame. They have not been ringable for many years.

At Poslingford it is grand to report that local ringers have fitted a new wheel to the treble after the old one became broken due to a leaking roof. The other bells have been overhauled.

We must all be on the alert for thieves. Already other dioceses, particularly Chelmsford and Norwich, have been losing bells and now alas the treble to those at Wherstead has been stolen. The single bell at Ramsholt almost went, but fortunately did not get further than the first floor. Please take particular care to keep towers locked and the key kept in an inconspicuous place.

At the Olde Tyme Rally your Adviser spent two days behind Mr. George Elphick's model of a mediaeval bell foundry and some of his plaster casts of bell marks. A considerable amount of interest was shown by the general public and the ringers who attended.

OBITUARY

It is with regret that we note the passing during the year of the following members and good friends of the Guild.

ERNEST SYDNEY BAILEY, Leiston.

With the death on 30th December of Ernest Sydney Bailey, means one less of the famous Bailey Brothers that did so much to further the art of ringing in the early part of this century, starting with a peal of Plain Bob, eight of the brothers went on to ring peals of Surprise Major together. Being called to rest at the age of 87 years, Sydney was a regular churchmam and ringer at Leiston, until ill health prevented him a few years ago. He will be remembered by all who rang with him.

OLIVER E. G. BARNARD, Stowmarket.

The very unexpected death of Oliver E. G. Barnard, Tower Captain of Stowmarket, only two months after his marriage, came as a shock to all, and a loss of a colourful character of the Suffolk Guild. The fruits of his labours came only shortly before with the restoration of Stowmarket Bells for which he raised funds through jumble sales, waste paper and collections. His peals were rung on many famous bells including the high numbers, conducting many of them himself.

CHARLES W. BEECROFT, Debenham.

At the age of 80 years, Charles W. Beecroft, passed to Higher Service. Learning to ring at his native Earl Soham where he was Master Farrier, after the wartime ban he joined the Framsden company where he soon graduated to surprise and rung several peals including three spliced. His retirement left a big gap in the Framsden band.

BISHOP RICHARD BROOK

With the death of Bishop Richard Brook, the Suffolk Guild lost one of its past Presidents, standing out as a strong bishop his sense of humour was warm and winning with his native bluntness.

JAMES DALE, Stowmarket.

Stowmarket lost one of its older ringers with the death of James Dale, starting his ringing career at Holbrook, moving to Wetheringsett, and then to Stowmarket, where he became a most faithful Sunday service ringer at Stowmarket, also on practice nights, and was for many years steeple keeper there.

SIMON WILLIAM KINSEY, St. Margaret's, Ipswich.

Known to all as "Bill", Simon William Kinsey, passed away at the age of 91 years at his home, from where he used to walk over 2 miles to ring at St. Margaret's. Starting ringing at Old Newton in 1897 and moving to Ipswich, joining St. Mary-le-Tower in 1914, then was requested to help train a band at St. Margaret's, this then became his tower. It was a sad day for him when he had to give up ringing in 1950, through ill health.
