#### **OBJECTS**

- 1. FEDERATION. To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2. RECOGNITION. To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualifications for which demand much time, skill and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- PROMOTION OF CHANGE RINGING. To encourage, cultivate and foster the art of scientific Change Ringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, instructors when and where required.
- 4. REFORM. To promote a proper appreciation of the ringing chamber as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment thereof; as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition; to advocate needful repairs and renovations and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the condition of bells and their fittings.

#### CONSTITUTION

- The Guild shall be known as the Suffolk Guild of Ringers for the Diocese of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich.
- 2. The Officers of the Guild shall consist of: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese as President, Patrons, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer, Report Editor, Auditor and the Technical Adviser.

- The Guild shall consist of (a) Ringing Members, (b) Probationers, (c) Junior Members, (d) Honorary Members, (e) Life Members.
  - (a) Ringing Members may be elected at any meeting where there are five other members present; or, provisionally by two other Members, before starting for a peal. Ringing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Ringing Members shall be 50p per year.
  - (b) Probationers may be elected at any meeting where there are five other members present. This grade of membership is, for those learning change ringing but who have not yet rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Probationers shall be 25p per year.
  - (c) Junior Members under the age of 16 years, who shall pay half the annual subscription.
  - (d) Honorary Members may be elected on a payment of 50p per year.
  - (e) Life Members residing out of the County to make a single payment of £1.
- 4. The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer, Report Editor, Technical Adviser, Pearson Handbells Trustees, District Chairmen (ex-officio), District Secretaries (ex-officio), together with two elected members from each District, seven to form a quorum. The Committee will meet a minimum of three times during the year.
- 5. The area covered by the Guild shall be divided into Districts, each of which shall have its own Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Committee, who shall be elected at the District Annual Meeting. Each District will elect two representatives to serve on the Guild Committee. The Secretary will:
  - (a) Arrange Meetings for practice.
  - (b) Arrange for instruction.
  - (c) Collect the subscriptions of all members.
    N.B. In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary, or Captain, or Ringing Master, who shall collect all subscriptions, as soon as possible after January 1st and send them to the District Secretary.
  - (d) Forward these subscriptions to the General Secretary together with his receipt book and details of any expenditure, at the end of the year for audit.
- The Guild shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, and shall loyally abide by the rules and decisions thereof.

#### RULES

- 1. Subscriptions shall be due in advance on January 1st annually.
- Any member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st shall lose his
  membership. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking
  part in it are paid. Lapsed members may be restated on payment of 10p in
  addition to the annual subscription.
- 3. Should a Ringing Member, having paid five consecutive years subscriptions, remove from the Diocese, he may without payment become a Non-Resident Member for such time as he continues to reside outside the Diocese.
- 4. All ringing at meetings of the Guild shall be under the direction of a Ringing Master and shall be such as is approved by the General Council. The decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.
- 5. A peal fee of 10p per rope is payable in respect of all peals rung for the Guild. Conductors are responsible for collecting and forwarding them to the General Secretary. No peal will be recorded unless the peal fees have been paid.
- 6. The Secretary may pay, on request, 2nd class return railway fare, together with a maximum of two nights' hotel expenses to such representative attending the Central Council Meeting, provided that the total indebtedness of the Guild for all representatives does not exceed £20 in any one year.
- 7. The Committee may remove a member from the Guild for a serious offence against the Objects and Rules, subject to appeal at a General Meeting.
- 8. The Objects, Constitution and Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting after three months' notice given at a General Meeting.

#### REGULATIONS relating to PEARSON'S HANDBELLS

- The Pearson Handbells are the property of the Suffolk Guild of Ringers, under the care of the Trustees. They are loaned to any member of the Guild whose name appears in the current Annual Report, according to the regulations relating to the handbells.
- 2. The bells are loaned in the first instance for a maximum period of three months. At the end of this period they are to be returned to the Trustees by the borrower, and they may then be loaned for a further three months if they are not required by another member of the Guild. If they are borrowed for this further period, the borrower may be asked to return the bells to the Trustees if they are required by another member of the Guild. A member from another tower has priority over a member from the same tower as the preceding borrower.

- 3. The bells are the responsibility of the borrower, after he has signed for them, until they are returned to the Trustees by the borrower. The bells are not to be loaned to anyone by the borrower without the prior consent of both the Trustees.
- 4. The bells must be returned to the Trustees upon request. The Trustees should endeavour to give seven days notice if they require the bells and should return them to the borrower as soon as possible.
- If the bells are required for a particular occasion, they can be reserved up to three months in advance.
- The Trustees are responsible to the Committee of the Guild for the administration
  of the bells, and their decisions regarding the bells can be revoked by the
  Committee.
- The Trustees and the Committee of the Guild would be grateful for financial help for the maintenance of the handbells from members who have enjoyed the use of them.

#### STRIKING COMPETITION RULES

- The competition shall take place on the third Saturday in May or on any other date as shall be decided by the committee.
- All bona fide members of the Guild may compete providing their subscriptions are paid.
- 3. No member may ring in more than one piece.
- 4. A band competing as a representative band of a particular tower must have at least 4 members shown in the annual report as members of that tower, or who are bona fide Sunday service ringers at that tower.
- 5. Each band must have a representative present at the draw, the time of the draw to be advertised in The Ringing World.
- Two minutes round ringing and stand will be allowed for practice before the test piece.
- 7. The test piece will be 240 true changes of any recognised Doubles or Minor method. In the event of a team ringing Doubles a cover bell must be used. The length of the test piece may be shortened at the discretion of the Ringing Master in the event of a large entry.
- 8. A reserve ringer, appointed by the Ringing Master, will be available to teams meeting short at the discretion of the Ringing Master.
- Three judges, appointed by the committee, will be present. Their decision is final.
- 10. The Mitson Shield is, and shall always remain, the sole property of the Guild, which may at any time give directions for its location, safe keeping, etc.

#### Meetinas

The A.G.M. at Beccles was a large gathering. At the business meeting considerable concern was expressed at the number of peals of bells which may become redundant in the coming years.

The Striking Competition was held at Walsham-le-Willows on 13 May, the shield being won by the Clare band. Another large entry aroused great interest and gave much enjoyment to all present.

A General Meeting was held at Clare on 23 September to consider a motion that pensioner members should pay half the annual subscription. The meeting, after lengthy discussion, declined to pass the motion and requested the committee to give the matter further thought.

The committee has met three times during the year, there being an average attendance of seventeen.

#### Finance

The accounts show a deliberate lowering of the General Account balance – there is no need to keep a large balance here – and an increase of £180 in the Restoration Fund. One grant has been paid during the year. A further £325 of the fund is promised to four churches on the satisfactory completion of proposed restoration work.

#### Central Council

Your three representatives all attended the annual meeting in London. The Council is much exercised at present with the need for ringers to make the best use of opportunities and finances available for restoration work and the re-housing of redundant peals of bells.

Finally I wish to thank all District Officers and committee members for their valuable work during 1972. I hope that this fiftieth anniversary year will see the Guild in good heart to meet the challenge of the next fifty years.

#### RINGING MASTER'S REPORT

1972 has been an active and generally successful year in many ways, and we have much to look back on with satisfaction, tempered as always with an awareness of the work which has still to be done in many parts of the County. A great deal of basic work has gone on in several areas, notably the S.W. District under the enthusiastic leadership of Frank Gilbert; and at various other towers where far-sighted instructors are aware that the future of ringing in Suffolk relies on the introduction of young people to this Art which can offer so much to all generations.

Most of the main activities have been well supported, particularly the Striking Competition at Walsham-le-Willows when the trophy changed hands again with a well deserved victory by the Clare band led by the up-and-coming Sam Twitchett'. What a great joy to us all to see him receiving the trophy after so many years of hard work. The general standard was again a complimentary reflection on the Sunday service bands of Suffolk, but I get the feeling that some bands don't enter because they know they have no chance of winning – which is a pity because the only way to make progress is to give youngsters experience of the competition.

Inasmuch as quarter peal ringing and peal ringing show something of the strength of the Guild, 1972 must rate as extremely satisfactory. The quarter peal columns are again full of indications of the rewards of perseverance and enthusiasm, none more than the local band quarter at Bacton on their re-hung peal and over at Poslingford young George Perry showing his potential with a quarter peal at the age of 9. In the peal columns, and some 88 years away in age difference, George Symonds continues to astonish the ringing excercise by ringing a handbell peal and then capping that by calling a peal of Bob Major, all after his 97th birthday. Nothing that I can say will add anything to everyones' respect and admiration for this unique man.

In many other ways the peal columns this year have been full of interest. 16 first pealers constitutes something of a record, and our congratulations go to Lynne Ablitt, Faith Barton, Sheila Franks, Valerie Gowan, Christine Hayes, Grace Sidey, Dianne Stilwell, William Barnes, Rupert Bray, Keith Cornish, Robert Gowan, Kevin Harrold, Paul Griffiths, Aubrey Peacock, Stephen Peters and David Smith. New conductors must augure well for the future of the Art in this County, and we extend our congratulations to the four who conducted their first peals in 1972, Amanda Richmond, Peter Archer, John Harrold and Walter Perry. Two peals caught the eye because of their footnotes. The peal at Stoke-by-Clare, which included 5 first pealers was suitably dedicated to Charles Pledger who had so much to do with the teaching of the band; and the peal at Polstead which was in appreciation of Edwin Hynard's work with the bands at Kersey, Nayland and Polstead.

Several ringers passed important milestones. Muriel Page and Edwin Goate rang their 200th peal, and Barrie Hendry his 400th. However, pride of place must go to J. Martin Thorley who rang his 1000th peal on July 30. It is believed that this is the first time this has been achieved by a resident member of the Suffolk Guild and we extend our congratulations to Martin and wish him and his family good ringing in their new surroundings in Lancashire. Other peals of note included Stedman Triples at Stowmarket, the peal at Barking in which three of the band stood in a similar peal 50 years ago and two peals of Maximus with predominately resident members which allowed five members to ring their first peal on 12 bells. Some rare towers have been pealed this year. South Elmham St. Cross were pealed for the first time; Westhall and Ipswich St. Nicholas appeared after a 60 year gap and Wickham Market after 20 years.

One of the features of 1972 has been the resurgence of handbell peals. Six peals of Bob Major and one of Bob Royal were successful and the following members rang their first handbell peals, John Girt, Walter Perry, Lawrence Pizzey and Brian Redgers.

The Grundisburgh Tuesday night band eventually reached the end of one particular road with the ringing of 23 Spliced Surprise Major all the work, the first time that this had been achieved in the Eastern Counties.

We have a great deal to look back on with pride, but as usual we must guard against complacency and make an effort to ensure that 1973, the Guild's 50th Anniversary, is even more enjoyable and successful than 1972. Thankyou all for your help and encouragement in the past year.

#### TECHNICAL ADVISER'S REPORT

1972 saw the rededication of the rings at Nayland and Bacton. At Nayland the ring of six has been overhauled and rehung with new fittings in a new metal two tier frame lower in the tower. The tower rock, which was a serious problem, is now acceptable, but the openings in the base of the recently built spire are not nearly big enough to allow the bells to be heard plainly outside in all directions.

At Bacton the new frame is a stage lower in the tower and a new treble has been cast to make them a ring of six. Apart from a minor painting problem the writer is happy with the result.

The bells from East Bergholt are at the Loughborough bell foundry. Your Adviser visited the foundry with the local ringers to check that the hanging of these bells in ball bearings would not affect their handling. The tenor of about 25 cwt was set up for ringing in a full circle in the foundry in ball bearings and it was agreed that this was quite satisfactory. It was perhaps the first visit of a local band to Loughborough to ring one of their bells in a full circle in the foundry.

The Great Barton bells are at Loughborough and are expected back in their tower early in 1973.

At Bildeston the top of the tower has become more seriously cracked than when the writer inspected the six bells in 1962. It is hoped to remove the bells to the foundry to enable the tower to be repaired. We all hope that this will lead to the restoration of the bells but this is not immediately in prospect.

The Bury Cathedral bells in the Norman Tower are now expected to be removed for an overhaul and the fitting of a new frame early in 1973. Alas your Adviser has heard of no firm plans to get the St. Mary's Bury fine ring of eight bells back into the tower and hung for change ringing.

At Long Melford the cracks in the tower have been satisfactorily repaired and regular ringing has recommenced for Sunday services.

At West Stow your Adviser inspected the bells and it is hoped that the local ringers will be able to overhaul the bells and fit new ball bearings. He gave written advice on this excellent project and will be on hand to visit again when required.

At Ipswich St. Nicholas all the five bells have been rehung on ball bearings thanks to the efforts of Neville Whittell. A local band has started, and it is hoped that interest will be aroused to keep them regularly rung and in due course for the bells to be rehung in a new frame.

At Stanstead your Adviser met the new incumbent and one of the church wardens and discussed the technical plans made some years ago for rehanging the six bells. At the moment only the treble is hung and that is unsafely clocked in a temporary frame.

At Theberton the writer visited to inspect the cracks in the tower walls. These were there before the bells were rehung in a new frame in 1957 and the latter was designed to minimise the effect of the bells being swung on the cracks. The Architect and your Adviser both feel that ringing need not be restricted.

At Sweffling the east parapet on the top of the tower has been repaired and ringing has recommenced.

At Ixworth and Westhall the towers have been restored and the bells have been rung again.

At Hopton your Adviser inspected the ring of six bells. The bell frame has seriously decayed by the west wall and in the longer term a new frame is needed.

At Monks Eleigh it was hoped that it might be safe to ring the bells but the writer found an area of loose flints in the north wall on the inside of the tower above the tenor. In this same zone of the tower on the outside a large fall of flints took place some years ago and this was repaired, unfortunately the inside was not consolidated at the same time.

At Tattingstone the writer reinspected the tower after some repair work had been done to it on the east side. He feels that all the bells should not be swung till the vertical crack in the west wall has been stitched. Unfortunately all the bells swing north-south and they will aggravate such a crack.

Your Adviser also inspected the chime of six at St. Peter's lpswich. They have not been hung for swinging at least since 1902. The four trebles are hung dead in a two tier gallows structure and the fifth and tenor individually on vertical props from the floor. Only the tenor has a clapper and all can be sounded from a plucking type manual at ground level. Some of the bells have been appreciably chipped at the lip, it seems that there was once a larger tenor which was exchanged for a treble which involved appreciable retuning.

At Henley it is hoped to rehang the bells on ball bearings and to rebush the clapper joints during 1973.

We are progressively becoming a do-it-yourself community, about the home and more recently up the tower. This is sometimes the only way that we are going to keep some of our sets of bells in a ringable state. Your Adviser will be pleased to visit towers where this sort of work is envisaged to make helpful comment on what he feels can be done. This particularly applies where bells hang in sound modern frames by Days or Bowell but where the fittings are now in need of attention. The scope for this D-I-Y work is very restricted if the bell frame has seriously decayed.

#### OBITUARIES

#### June Cotton (nee Wright)

June, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Wright of Rougham, died at the early age of 26 at Oxford. This tragic loss to Suffolk was even more poignant when one knew and heard of her courage and faith. She rang two peals for the Guild and was a devoted Sunday service ringer.

#### Edward Jenkins (Oldham, Lancs.)

A native of Earl Soham and Baylham, Ted Jenkins became a legend in his own lifetime and was without doubt one of the finest ringers of all time. As we say in Suffolk, 'He came from nothing and was five foot nothing and nothing he couldn't do'. Conducting, composition, heavy bells or the light end all came within his remarkable compass and as a leader of men he will never be forgotten, especially in Cheshire and Lancashire.

#### Herbert Parker – Stonham Aspal

Herbie was a Suffolk 'character' and a ringer at Stonham for 50 years. Loved by old and young alike, he was a great listener to ringing, especially enjoying hearing peals at his own tower, when his opinion was well worth noting. He rang two peals himself, but his great love was that wonderful institution 'The Ringers' Outing'.

#### Frank Rolfe - Sproughton

A founder member of the Guild, Frank was one of the famous Sproughton Company that made history at the turn of the century with the brothers Mee. That band was one of the earliest to ring London Surprise Major, something of which he was always proud.

#### Antony R. Price (Feltham, Middx.)

Tony Price, son of a Norfolk vicar and a great lover of East Anglia, was a Life Member for 50 years and in his day one of the best heavy-bell ringers in the country. A devoted Christian, his discipline extended to the belfry, where he expected striking of the highest order.

#### Percy Rawlings - Barrow

Percy died in March in his 80th year – a faithful servant of the Church and belfry at Barrow. He was one of those quiet men who gave loyal service over his whole life and will be missed.

#### Edward Newson - Yoxford

A loyal Church worker and tutor of many ringers, Sam Newson died in September aged 83, after a long illness. Originally from Tunstall before the First World War, he rejoiced at the restoration of those bells in the 1950's.
