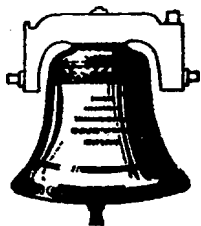

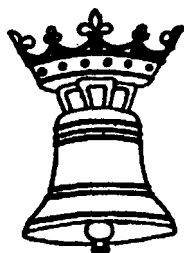

OBJECTS

The Guild shall be established for the promotion of ringing for Divine Service and in furtherance of this object:

1. To promote and encourage the practice of bell-ringing.
2. To recruit, train and encourage bell-ringers in the practice of their art.
3. To cultivate the art of scientific change ringing.
4. To promote a proper appreciation of the ringing chamber as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment thereof; as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition; to advocate needful repairs and renovations and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the condition of bells and their fittings.

CONSTITUTION

1. The Guild shall be known as the Suffolk Guild of Ringers for the Diocese of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich.
2. The Officers of the Guild shall consist of: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese as President, Patrons, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer, Auditor and the Technical Adviser.
3. The Guild shall consist of (a) Ringing Members, (b) Probationers, (c) Junior Members, (d) Honorary Members and (e) Life Members.
 - (a) Ringing Members may be elected at any meeting where there are five other members present; or provisionally by two other members, before starting a peal. Ringing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Ringing Members shall be £1.00 per year. Ringing Members, on attaining the age of 70 years shall become Honorary Life Members.
 - (b) Probationers may be elected at any meeting where there are five other members present. This grade of membership is for those learning change ringing but who have not yet rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Probationers shall be 50p. per year.
 - (c) Junior Members under the age of 16 years, or under the age of 18 years if undergoing full time education, who shall pay half the annual subscription.
 - (d) Honorary Members may be elected on a payment of £1.00 per year.
 - (e) Life Members residing out of the County to make a single payment of £1.00.

4. The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer, Report Editor, Librarian, Technical Adviser, Pearson Handbell Trustees, District Chairmen (ex-officio), District Secretaries (ex-officio), together with two elected members from each District, seven to form a quorum. The Committee will meet a minimum of three times during the year.
5. The area covered by the Guild shall be divided into Districts, each of which shall have its own Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Committee, who shall be elected at the District Annual Meeting. Each District will elect two representatives to serve on the Guild Committee. The Secretary will:
 - (a) Arrange Meetings for practice.
 - (b) Arrange for instruction.
 - (c) Collect the subscriptions of all members.
 N.B. In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary, or Captain, or Ringing Master, who shall collect all subscriptions as soon as possible after January 1st and send them to the District Secretary.
 - (d) Forward these subscriptions to the General Secretary together with his receipt book and details of any expenditure, at the end of the year for audit.
6. The Guild shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, and shall loyally abide by the rules and decisions thereof.

RULES

1. Subscriptions shall be due in advance on January 1st annually.
2. Any member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st shall lose his membership. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid. Lapsed members may be reinstated on payment of 10p in addition to the annual subscription.
3. Should a Ringing Member, having paid five consecutive years subscriptions remove from the Diocese, he may without payment become a Non-Resident Member for such time as he continues to reside outside the Diocese.
4. All Ringing at meetings of the Guild shall be under the direction of a Ringing Master and shall be such as is approved by the Central Council. The decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.
5. A peal fee of 10p per rope is payable in respect of all peals rung for the Guild. Conductors are responsible for collecting and forwarding them to the General Secretary. No peal will be recorded unless the peal fees have been paid.

6. The Secretary may pay, on request, 2nd class return railway fare, together with a maximum of two nights' hotel expenses to such representatives attending the Central Council Meeting, provided that the total indebtedness of the Guild for all representatives does not exceed £20 in any one year.
7. The Committee may remove a member from the Guild for a serious offence against the Objects and Rules, subject to appeal at a General Meeting.
8. The Objects, Constitution and Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting after three months' notice given at a General Meeting.

REGULATIONS relating to PEARSON'S HANDBELLS

1. The Pearson Handbells are the property of the Suffolk Guild of Ringers, under the care of the Trustees. They are loaned to any member of the Guild whose name appears in the current Annual Report, according to the regulations relating to the handbells.
2. The bells are loaned in the first instance for a maximum period of three months. At the end of this period they are to be returned to the Trustees by the borrower, and they may then be loaned for a further three months if they are not required by another member of the Guild. If they are borrowed for this further period, the borrower may be asked to return the bells to the Trustees if they are required by another member of the Guild. A member from another tower has priority over a member from the same tower as the preceeding borrower.
3. The bells are the responsibility of the borrower, after he has signed for them, until they are returned to the Trustees by the borrower. The bells are not to be loaned to anyone by the borrower without the prior consent of both of the Trustees.
4. The bells must be returned to the Trustees upon request. The Trustees should endeavour to give seven days notice if they require the bells and should return them to the borrower as soon as possible.
5. If the bells are required for a particular occasion, they can be reserved up to three months in advance.
6. The Trustees are responsible to the Committee of the Guild for the administration of the bells, and their decisions regarding the bells can be revoked by the Committee.
7. The Trustees and the Committee of the Guild would be grateful for financial help for the maintenance of the handbells from members who have enjoyed the use of them.

STRIKING COMPETITION RULES

1. The competition shall take place on the third Saturday in May or on any other date as shall be decided by the Committee.
2. All bona fide members of the Guild may compete providing their subscriptions are paid.
3. No member may ring in more than one piece.
4. A band competing as a representative band of a particular tower must have at least four members shown in the annual report as members of that tower, or who are bona fide Sunday Service ringers at that tower.
5. Each band must have a representative present at the draw, the time of the draw to be advertised in *The Ringing World*.
6. Two minutes round ringing and stand will be allowed for practice before the test piece.
7. The test piece will be 240 true changes of any recognised Doubles or Minor method. In the event of a team ringing Doubles a cover bell must be used. The length of the test piece may be shortened at the discretion of the Ringing Master in the event of a large entry.
8. A reserve ringer, appointed by the Ringing Master, will be available to teams meeting short, at the discretion of the Ringing Master.
9. Three judges, appointed by the Committee, will be present. Their decision is final.
10. The Mitson Shield is, and shall always remain, the sole property of the Guild, which may at any time give directions for its location, safe keeping, etc.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

A complete list of the printed books and papers held by the Librarian is published in this Report. Most of these publications have been received as a result of bequests and donations in the last three years. The name of the donor or the original owner is shown against each book. It can be seen that the Guild has received some generous bequests for which, on behalf of the Guild, I extend my warm thanks.

We now have a series of Annual Reports covering the ringing in Suffolk from the early days of the Norwich Diocesan Association until the present time. Most of these reports were collected together and presented to the Guild by Claude Rush. The bound copies of the Suffolk Guild reports were left to the Guild by Charles Sedgley. It is my pleasant duty to acknowledge these gifts with grateful thanks.

In addition to the printed books and publications, the Guild has been the recipient of scrapbooks, diaries, composition collections and all kinds of bell ringing ephemera such as only enthusiastic bell ringers manage to accumulate. We are most grateful for these papers which have been given either directly or on behalf of the following: J.M. Bailey, E.V. Blake, H.D. Lister, H.C. Rush, C.J. Sedgley and G.E. Symonds. There is, fortunately, a much greater awareness nowadays of the historical interest of this kind of material and I ask everyone to be vigilant to ensure that it does not get lost or destroyed.

Perhaps the most important papers to be rescued and almost at the last moment, were the remnants of those relating to Bowell's bellfoundry in Ipswich. Ranald Clouston is busy collating and indexing the data contained in them.

I am in the process of cataloguing the various notebooks and other ephemera belonging to the Guild and it is hoped that a list can be published next year.

It is known that there are a few more books belonging to the Guild which do not appear in the list published in this report. Your librarian would welcome any information as to their whereabouts. Similarly, I would welcome any information which would help to complete the various sets of Norwich Diocesan Association and Suffolk Guild Reports.

Lastly, if any member has a query regarding the literature of bell ringing I shall be pleased to help if I can.

INDEX AND DIRECTORY OF TOWERS

The following table is used to show the condition of the ring:

- 10 - Excellent. Ball bearings, modern frame and fittings.
- 9 - Excellent. Plain bearings, modern frame and fittings - or ball bearings in an old frame.
- 8 - Good going order.
- 7 - Fair going order.
- 6 - Poor going order.
- 5 - Ringable if cleaned up and odd fittings and ropes provided.
- 4 - Ringable with difficulty and a degree of risk after making odd repairs.
- 3 - Unringable mainly because of tower and/or frame arrangement and position.
- 2 - Unringable mainly because of frame and/or fittings.
- 1 - Hung dead.
- 0 - Some bells unhung and on the ground.

While every effort has been made to ensure that the information given is accurate, the Technical Adviser would be very pleased to hear of any corrections.

GENERAL SECRETARY AND TREASURER'S REPORT

1974 was my introduction to the trials that befall the person holding the post of General Secretary and Treasurer. I have attempted to remain somewhat in the background and to really get the feel of what is happening in the Guild. For me this has been an interesting year and only now, as I write this report do I begin to realise how much work and time is required to maintain the day to day running of the Guild affairs. When I was elected I resolved to try and visit each District at one of their Quarterly Meetings and hopefully each Annual District Meeting. Like all good resolutions I found it hard to keep and I look forward to doing what I can to 'show the flag' during the coming year, particularly in those Districts where, as yet, I have been unable to visit.

The year following the Anniversary Year would perhaps seem much quieter but in many ways this has not been so. Our membership has again increased and as encouraging as this is, there is a suspicion in my mind that we could have had a larger membership figure if members had paid their subscriptions in time — no subscription, no name in the Report is the maxim that must be followed. A little thought in this direction would make things so much easier for both the Guild and District Officers.

Bury St. Edmunds and the fine Cathedral were the venue for the Annual General Meeting. The service was held in the Cathedral with the Provost giving the address. Using part of the new Cathedral extensions as a background, a photograph of all those present was taken before making the short journey to Horringer Community Centre where the local band had prepared a fine tea. The meeting which followed brought changes of Officers. John Blythe vacated the Chair and was elected a Vice-President for his many years of service to the Guild both as Chairman and as Secretary and Treasurer. The posts of Secretary and Ringing Master also changed hands and we thank all these people for their loyal and unselfish service to our Guild.

A glorious day in May found a large gathering of people at Bacton for the Striking Competition. This year found two teams in first place — Horringer and St. Mary-le-Tower, Ipswich.

In July a General Meeting was held at Worlingworth with a very low attendance. Luckily this meeting was a formality required by the Rules and the next General Meeting which was held at Yoxford was fairly well attended. Members present approved the re-wording of the Guilds Objects in order that we can become a registered Charity. The revised Objects appear elsewhere in this Report. Approval was also given to a request from the Executive Committee that the Guild Librarian should become a member of that Committee. Item 3 (c) of the Constitution was changed slightly to include as Junior Ringing Members all those under 18 years old who are still receiving full time education.

The Guild Executive Committee has met three times during the year. Three hundred new badges with a brooch fitting have been purchased. Much routine work has been attended to; quite a lot of it being the direct result of work done by the various sub-committees set up last year. This is very heartening and even more heartening is the fact that ideas put forward in the 'White Paper' were discussed by the Central Council. Surely this shows that ordinary Guild members do have a vital part to play and their ideas are worthy of consideration and action.

Although we are not 'in the red', our funds have had to face several outgoings this year. The General Meeting at Yoxford overwhelmingly approved an increase in subscriptions to £1.00 for a Ringing Member with other grades of membership scaled accordingly (Non-Resident Life Membership stays at £1.00). We hope to build up the Restoration Fund so that we can offer more worthwhile grants to parishes seeking to restore their bells; 5% of the cost is the figure on which the Committee now works. As the result of a very generous gift from the Beecroft family the Jubilee Fund has now been set up. It is their request that it should be a capital fund and that only the interest should be used. Grants have been promised to Hadleigh and Earl Soham and the promised grant to Great Barton has been paid.

Your Representatives attended the Central Council Meeting at Exeter and the report of this meeting appeared in 'The Ringing World' during the year. Since we now have a membership of over four hundred we are entitled to four representatives. These were elected for the next triennium at Yoxford in November and will attend their first Council Meeting in 1975. The Guild Executive felt it would be better for individual members who were elected to these posts if they knew well in advance instead of being elected at the Annual General Meeting.

Finally let me welcome all those members who have been newly elected to office in the various Districts. I will do my part to help them in the same way that many Guild Officers and members have given me much help, advice and encouragement over this past year. I offer my thanks to them all and to all of you who have welcomed my wife and family where ever we have been. 1975 lies before us with a bigger challenge than ever before; let us really show what a fine group of people the Suffolk Guild really is.

RINGING MASTER'S REPORT

After the great efforts of the 50th anniversary year to make Suffolk, and the Exercise generally, sit up and take notice that ringing in the Diocese is very much a going, and a growing, concern one might reasonably have expected a large decrease in the quantity of ringing in 1974; but the volume of activity during the year has been such that I am only able to summarise here the more outstanding points.

The peal total of 133 is a good one, most of the peals being rung by resident bands. Ten members rang their first peal: Helen Ashburn, Robert Ashton, Jennifer Barnard, Simon Curl, Derek Ibbott, Stephen Keeble, Gilbert Onion, George Perry, Joanna Rothery and Charles Steward. Adrian Knights and Stephen Pettman rang their first peal on handbells, whilst Brian Atkinson and Kevin Harrold scored firsts as conductor. Our congratulations to you all.

The footnotes to peals provide fascinating reading. We are pleased to see that C. Jack Gibson and William J. Button celebrated the 40th and 50th anniversaries respectively of their first peal, whilst Leslie G. Brett's total is now well over 900. The 50th anniversary of the first peal of Yorkshire in Suffolk was duly commemorated at Debenham; Thurston made its first ever appearance in the peal columns, Brome its first for 53 years and Monk Soham re-appeared for the first time since 1900!

The Quarter Peal total of 199 is very pleasing, for it is in extended ringing, such as the quarter peal, that learners have an opportunity to set higher standards of achievement in striking than is possible in short touches, when very often most of the time is occupied with remembering the method and 'getting the feel' of a bell. Twelve of the quarters were on handbells. It is good to see the increasing interest and steady progress being made in change-ringing on handbells. There has been too little attention paid by the Guild, over the last decade, to this aspect of our art.

The AGM at Bury St. Edmunds and Horringer, and the Striking Competition at Bacton (at which the honours were shared between Horringer and St. Mary-le-Tower) were very well supported. The General Meetings at Worlingworth and Yoxford were less well attended probably because they were clearly more concerned with the transaction of Guild business and less with the ringing and social sides of our art.

The most important aspects of our Guild efforts, that is the Sunday service ringing and regular teaching, are the most difficult to review. It is only through conversation with members at District meetings, and in committee, that one can learn the ups and downs of practice nights, numbers of learners and their progress, frequency of Sunday ringing and the like. My impression is that service and practice ringing is being maintained at a steady level. The increase in membership suggests that the teaching which has been going on throughout the county in the last few years has borne fruit; and the number of quarter peals rung for service is encouraging.

In conclusion, I thank all those who have been responsible for the organisation of ringing, at District or tower level, for service, practice or peals, during 1974. As an Exercise we depend far more than we often realise on our local leaders. They are the backbone of our organisation. A particular 'thankyou' to Frank Gilbert and John Harrold, whose work has caused them to move out of the county during the year, and who whilst in Suffolk have given valuable service as District Officers in the West.

May 1975 prove to be a year of continued progress for us all, as individuals and as a Guild.

SUFFOLK GUILD ANNUAL REPORT 1974

TECHNICAL ADVISER'S REPORT

1974 has been another eventful year as the Guild's efforts to do maintenance work has got into its stride with very satisfactory results; however much remains to be done. The report covers this activity for the first time and our thanks are due to Michael Howes, Convener of the Maintenance Sub-Committee for compiling this section.

There have been no bell rededications in 1974. St. Mary's, Bury St. Edmunds expect their bells back in the tower early in 1975 but they will unfortunately be hung dead in the old frame. No date can as yet be fixed for the return of the Cathedral bells; as many will know the Norman Tower was built as a gatehouse and was not intended to house a ring of bells, there have been structural problems which are being dealt with by the Department of the Environment.

An order has been placed with Messrs. John Taylor & Co. to rehang the heavy eight at Hadleigh in a new frame with new fittings.

Another order has been placed with the same firm to overhaul the St. Mary-le-Tower, Ipswich, bells; this work to include a new frame and fittings and recasting of the front six and the eighth bells. With the amount of work on hand at Loughborough it does not look as though either restoration will be complete before 1976.

Earl Soham hope to rehang their ring in the excellent Day frame with new fittings. Some work will be needed to adequately support and anchor the frame. Currently it rests on decayed beams on two rolled steel joists, and the plan is to replace these beams with new steel joists and bolt the frame down to the steelwork.

Your Technical Adviser continued his inspecting work and he has now filled in his report form for 353 of our Suffolk sets of bells.

At Walsham-le-Willows the bells remain in quite good order, your Adviser listed the items which would make the bells easier to ring. In the longer term the bells need rehangng in the present frame.

At Worlingworth some short term maintenance work was listed; the ring is now spoilt by the cracked tenor and the sooner this bell is recast the better.

At Badwell Ash pigeons have been getting into the bell chamber with much attendant mess and the tower roof leaked. As the bells swing the ancient frame distorts and apart from keeping the bolts tight to minimise this not much can be done, Really a new frame is needed.

At Great Ashfield there is much worm attack in evidence in the fittings, and the rope chutes and ceiling blocks are badly worn. Unless the worm attack is arrested promptly the going order of the bells is bound to be affected.

At Bardwell the tower repairs are now complete and concrete girdles have been placed round the inside of the ringing chamber. Permission was granted for us to ring and your Adviser visited and got each bell into ringing order. Alas some rope guides for 2, 3 and tenor had been removed by the builders, and this left some 35 ft. of unguided rope above the ringers. So he made up and fitted some guides which enabled the bells to be rung on 9 November for the first time for a number of years. There remain some short term jobs to be done and these have been listed. The bells are quite easy to ring but here again a new frame is needed in the longer term.

At Worlington your Adviser met the new incumbent and discussed the derelict ring of five bells. A faculty had been granted to rehang them in a new frame some years ago but finding the money to pay for the repairs carried out on the tower has delayed matters, and with the present economic difficulties the rehangng will have to wait again. However, he overhauled the Ellacombe chiming apparatus so the parish can at least hear their bells.

At Hawkedon your Adviser was approached by the parish to carry out his recommendations of 1955. These included anchoring the oak frame to the support beams below to prevent it sliding 1½ inches along the floor as the bells swing. He designed some securing straps which Neville Whittell very kindly made up and they were fitted. The bells were overhauled and after a silence of some 18 years were found to be quite easy to ring. They are now rung for Sunday services about once a month.

At Great Barton the anchor was fitted to the middle of the north wall at the bottom cill level of the frame and this has prevented horizontal distortion of the latter. Your Adviser is now quite satisfied with the result.

At Hollesley he inspected the bells; some minor items of maintenance required to be done and these were listed and put in hand.

At Market Weston some members of the PCC hope to be able to put in some steelwork to support the east end of the frame and to get the bells ringing again. Your Adviser met them, discussed the project and set down the work which needs to be done. The tower here was struck by lightning and part of the north east pinnacle fell through the nave roof, fortunately the insurers will pay for making good the damage. The tower has no lightning conductor but one may soon be fitted.

At Hinderclay your Adviser had reported to the parish that the metal bell frame needed painting as long ago as 1959. In 1974 he found that this work had still not been done and was now even more urgent.

On the SE District Open Day for the Cathedral Appeal he attended the ringing at Blaxhall where at one time the bells were going to be rehung in a new frame, but apart from removing the floor by the present frame nothing was done. The bells have not been rung for some years and in 1970 your Adviser recommended placing old sleepers on the top of the floor above the ringers to catch any clappers that might fall out. Unfortunately this has not been done.

At Kelsale the bells hang in a two tier timber frame which shifts. He reported on them in 1967 and recommended a new frame. He visited again in 1974 to see what short term work could be done.

At Haverhill the tower parapets are in a very crumbly and decayed state. Unfortunately a public footpath passes the west side of the tower. Your Adviser recorded his concern at this situation with the Vicar.

At Tattingstone it was grand to be able to ring the bells for the first time for many years. The work done is noted in the maintenance section below.

At Poslingford a defective tower roof beam has had to be propped up from the bell frame which prevents the bells being rung. It is hoped that this will only be a temporary situation.

In the redundant churches field declarations of redundancy have been made in connection with Akenham, Sapiston, Ubbeston and Stanton St. John. Sapiston and Stanton St. John are to go to the Redundant Churches Fund for care and maintenance, the former has a ring of four in a poor state and the latter now has no bells. At Ubbeston the cracked tenor of 1567 has gone to Moyses Hall Museum, Bury and the bell hung in the tower of c1520 may go to Henley as a clock bell or may have to be stored until a new home can be found.

MAINTENANCE WORK

South East District

Hasketon

Wheels treated with Protim; renewed felt pads in bearings and oiled same. Removed pulleys, surface planed them so that they rotate more freely. Renewed split pins and tightened up nuts on clappers. Renewed retaining bolts which hold third bell to headstock as one was missing and others were in a poor state. Painted headstocks. Tightened up nuts and bolts in general. Removed old wire netting over louvres and replaced with new nylon Netlon mesh netting. Asbestos sheets being put over this to prevent bells being too noisy outside. The bell chamber and the intermediate chambers were all swept out and old birds' nests and debris removed. All wooden ladders were treated with Protim to combat any further worm attack.

Tattingstone

All headstocks and wheels have been treated with Protim. Stays have been renewed on 2nd, 4th and tenor and all treated with Protim. Sliders have all been cleaned down and treated for easier running. Pulleys have been cleaned and oiled. Two new pulleys have been fitted on the 3rd bell, one in the bell chamber and one in intermediate chamber below rope chute. New wooden bushes have been fitted in floor to avoid friction on bell ropes when ringing. Renewed felt pads in bearings and oiled same. Clapper joints have all been tightened. Securing ironwork was cleaned down, tightened and then painted. The bell frame was cleaned down and treated with Protim. Bell ropes have been renewed. The bell and intermediate chambers were swept out and all old rubbish removed. The floor boards under the third and the future treble pit were renewed. All ladders were treated with Protim.

Hintlesham

Unfortunately one of the metal bolts which secured the fourth bell to the headstock sheared off, so some swift repairs had to be made. Ron Steward kindly made up six 13" by $\frac{5}{8}$ " bolts with a $1\frac{1}{2}$ " offset. Two of these were used on the fourth and the other four on the third and fifth bells where the bolts were also in danger of shearing off. On looking round we also found that the tenor's bearings were extremely loose and nothing short of new bolts would secure them. Ron Steward kindly made up two 15" x $\frac{5}{8}$ " bolts and metal plates, and also supplied four coach screws which were all duly fitted. The bearings of all the bells were fitted with new felt pads and oiled. Thanks go to Ron Steward who did all the work in this tower.

Ipswich St. Nicholas

The rope guides in the ringing chamber have been lifted 3 ft. to make the ropes easier to handle. This work was done by Neville Whittell and the Tower Captain.

Ipswich St. Mary at Quay

Bell Chamber. All the woodwork under the bells was carefully checked and cleaned. Approximately fifteen 1 cwt. bags of rubbish were removed from the tower. The louvres were also repaired where necessary. The pulley on the fifth was resecured. All the bells were cleaned. The bell ropes were also checked and repaired where necessary. The frame was cleaned down and general oiling of bearings and maintenance work was done. The clock room was cleaned and left tidy. All this work was done by the Society of Gippeswyk Youths. The Redundant Churches Fund is spending £20,000 on the church, and this includes repairing all the flint work on the east side and securing the parapets.

Hollesley

See the Technical Adviser's Report.

South West District

Acton

The wooden bell frame has been cleaned and swept down, then treated with Protim wood preservative. The louvres have been repaired and new wire netting put over them to stop birds flying in. All securing ironwork and the other metal fittings have been wire brushed and painted with Galvafroid and red oxide. The bell chamber was given a general tidy up and other usual maintenance jobs were done.

Stoke by Clare

Some repair work has been done on the roof to make it watertight. This was done very successfully by the local builder and the roof is now in good condition.

Hawkedon

See the Technical Adviser's report.

The following towers have had general maintenance work done in them, such as oiling, tightening nuts and bolts, and generally tidying up, etc. The work being done by the local ringers or district helpers. The towers are Haverhill, Glemsford, Long Melford and Assington.

Central District

Great Finborough

The bearings were cleaned out and oiled. The bell frame was cleaned down. All nuts and bolts were checked for tightness and tightened where necessary. All securing ironwork was brushed down and painted. All headstocks, wheels, etc., were treated with preservative against woodworm attack. The entire belfry was swept out and all rubbish removed. New nylon netting was put up over the louvres to keep birds out.

Wetherden

The ceiling blocks in the first floor have been bored out to suit the sallies and the bells are now in ringing order.

North East District

Westhall

Retightened nuts and bolts in securing ironwork and elsewhere. Adjusted bell ropes as necessary. Oiled bearings. General clean and tidy up.

Blythburgh

Renewed broken stay. Adjusted ropes as necessary. General maintenance work and cleaning up also carried out.

Wenhaston

Spliced and repaired ropes as necessary. Repaired and adjusted sticking stays (Hastings type). General maintenance, oiling and cleaning up was also undertaken.

Weybread

Retightened loose tenor on to headstock. Checked over the other bells for loose nuts and bolts. Retightened loose bearings. General maintenance, oiling and cleaning up was also done.

Barsham

Spliced and repaired ropes as necessary. Oiled bearings and did general maintenance work.

North West District

Felsham

New wooden bush was made for the fourth bell's rope guide and fitted.

OBITUARIES

Albert E. Austin — Newmarket

For years a staunch member in the extreme west of the county, often ringing with both Suffolk and Cambridgeshire bands. Albert was a first class handbell ringer in company with Jack Acres and the late Reggie Heath.

Edward V. Ballam — Lackford

A most valued friend and church worker, he died on 22 September. He served as a churchwarden at Lackford for 24 years and his voluntary work in the upkeep of the churchyard was but a small part of his service to the church.

Ernest V. Blake — Ipswich

Known affectionately as "owd Arnie", Ernest came to us, from Norfolk in the early '50's and was attached to St. Margaret's, Ipswich for many years. He conducted peals on all numbers and his rich accent was always worth hearing.

Frederick H. Cooper — Horringer

A most loyal member of the local band and an ever present for service and practice ringing until ill health curtailed his ringing activities. He passed away on 28 October.

George Garwood — Hartest

George gave a lifetime of faithful service to ringing at Hartest. He succeeded his father as tower captain and served in that capacity for 40 years. He was content to ring the treble all his life, his favourite method being Grandsire Doubles. He was untiring in his efforts to maintain regular Sunday service ringing. He died in January aged 84.

Leslie Ludbrook — Kelsale

On 15 December Leslie died at the age of 80 years. He started ringing in the early 1900's and was tower captain at Kelsale for over 50 years, in which time he trained many ringers and kept the bells ringing throughout. Although always a call change ringer he followed with interest the doings of his friends in change ringing and listened to many a peal.

Percy May — Ipswich

Percy died in February in his seventies after a long illness. He "hailed" from Aldeburgh and Kelsale and spent his life as a railwayman. Beside his ringing he was a

fine singer (tenor) and enjoyed the fuller service to the church. A noted striker, especially on 12 bells, Percy's proudest moment was being congratulated by the great William Pye after ringing in a peal of Superlative Maximus at short notice — no mean achievement around 1929-30.

Leonard G. Pryke — Lavenham

Taught to ring in the early 1920's by the late Arthur Symonds he remained a regular ringer at Lavenham until his death. A very capable ringer, especially round the "heavy end", he will be sadly missed. He rang 23 peals for the Suffolk Guild.

George E. Symonds — Ipswich

This grand gentleman made his own epitaph, by his great age, his utterly Christian example and as the fashioner of the performances of the St. Mary-le-Tower Society between the two world wars. Of his 478 peals, 286 were for the Guild, most of which he conducted. He died in August in his 100th year.

George Waterman — Harwich

Although an Essex man he was very attached to Suffolk and rang in many peals for the Guild. A kindly and jovial man he brought joy into many a belfry, not least his own at Harwich.

Ethel Wright — Rougham

Mrs. Wright learnt to ring at Mistley in 1936 and with her husband Leslie has rung in many towers in Essex and Suffolk. In 1938 she took part in the first peal by a ladies band in Suffolk and rang 9 peals in all, 7 for the Guild. Poor health forced her to give up active ringing in 1959. She passed away on 8 November.

May these past members and friends rest in peace, the Suffolk Guild offers its sympathy to the bereaved.
