#### OBJECTS

\*The Guild shall be established for the promotion of ringing for Divine Service and in furtherance of this object:-

- 1. To promote and encourage the practice of bell-ringing.
- 2. To recruit, train and encourage bell-ringers in the practice of their art.
- 3. To cultivate the art of scientific change ringing.
- 4. To promote a proper appreciation of the ringing chamber as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment thereof; as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition; to advocate needful repairs and renovations and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the condition of bells and their fittings.

#### CONSTITUTION

- The Guild shall be known as the Suffolk Guild of Ringers for the Diocese of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich.
- 2. The Officers of the Guild shall consist of: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese na Prosident, Patrons, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer, Auditor and the Technical Adviser.
- The Guild shall consist of (a) Ringing Members (b) Probationers, (c) Junior Members, (d) Honorary Members (e) Life Members.
  - (a) Ringing Members may be elected at any meeting where there are five other members present; or provisionally by two other members, before starting for a peal. Ringing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Ringing Members shall be £1.00 per year. Ringing Members, on attaining the age of 70 years shall become Honorary Life Members.
  - (b) Probationers may be elected at any meeting where there are five other members present. This grade of membership is for those learning change ringing but who have not yet rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Probationers shall be 50p per year.
  - (c) Junior Members under the age of 16 years, who shall pay half the annual subscription.
  - (d) Honorary Members may be elected on a payment of £1.00 per year.
  - (c) Life Members residing out of the County to make a single payment of £1.00.

- 4. The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer, Report Editor, Librarian; Technical Adviser, Pearson Handbells Trustees, District Chairman (exofficio), District Secretaries (ex-officio), together with two elected numbers from each District, seven to form a quorum. The Committee will meet a minimum of three times during the year.
- 5. The area covered by the Guild shall be divided into Districts, each of which shall have its own Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Committee, who shall be elected at the District Annual Meeting. Each District will elect two representatives to serve on the Guild Committee. The Secretary will:
  - (a) Arrange Meetings for practice.
  - (b) Arrange for instruction.
  - (c) Collect the subscriptions of all members. N.B. In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary, or Captain, or Ringing Master, who shall collect all subscriptions, as soon as possible after January 1st and send them to the District Secretary.
  - (d) Forward these subscriptions to the General Secretary together with his receipt book and details of any expenditure, at the end of the year for audit.
- The Guild shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, and shall loyally abide by the rules and decisions thereof.
- 7. The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds majority of the members present at an Annual or Special General Meeting provided that 14 day's notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to all members and provided that nothing herein contained shall authorise any amendment which shall have the effect of the Society ceasing to be a charity in law.
- 8. In the event of dissolution of the Guild any assets remaining after the satisfaction of all its debts and liabilities shall not be paid to or disbributed among the members of the Guild but shall be given or transferred to such other charitable institution or institutions having similar objects to the Guild.

#### RULES

- 1. Subscriptions shall be due in advance on January 1st annually.
- 2. Any member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st shall lose his membership. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid. Lapsed members may be reinstated on payment of 10p in addition to the annual subscription.

- 3. Should a Ringing Member, having paid five consecutive years subscriptions remove from the Diocese, he may without payment become a Non-Resident Member for such time as he continues to reside outside the Diocese.
- All Ringing at meetings of the Guild shall be under the direction of a Ringing Master and shall be such as is approved by the Central Council. The decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.
- 5. A peal fee of 10p per rope is payable in respect of all peals rung for the Guild. Conductors are responsible for collecting and forwarding them to the General Secretary. No peal will be recorded unless the peal fees have been paid.
- 6. The Secretary may pay, on request, 2nd class return railway fare, together with a maximum of two night's hotel expenses to such representatives attending the Central Council Meeting, provided that the total indebtedness of the Guild for all representatives does not exceed £20 in any one year.
- 7. The Committee may remove a member from the Guild for a serious offence against the Objects and Rules, subject to appeal at a General Meeting.
- 8. The Objects, Constitution and Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting after three month's notice given at a General Meeting.

#### REGULATIONS relating to PEARSON'S HANDBELLS

- 1. The Pearson Handbells are the property of the Suffolk Guild of Ringers, under the care of the Trustees. They are loaned to any member of the Guild whose name appears in the current Annual Report, according to the regulations relating to the handbells.
- 2. The bells are loaned in the first instance for a maximum period of three months. At the end of this period they are to be returned to the Trustees by the borrower, and they may then be loaned for a further three months if they are not required by another member of the Guild. If they are borrowed for this further period, the borrower may be asked to return the bells to the Trustees if they are required by another member of the Guild. A member from another tower has priority over a member from the same tower as the preceeding borrower.
- 3. The bells are the responsibility of the borrower, after he has signed for them, until they are returned to the Trustees by the borrower. The bells are not to be loaned to anyone by the borrower without the prior consent of both of the Trustees.
- The bells must be returned to the Trustees upon request. The Trustees should endenvour to give seven days notice if they require the bells and should return them to the borrower as soon as possible.

- If the bells are required for a particular occasion, they can be reserved up to three months in advance.
- The Trustees are responsible to the Committee of the Guild for the administration of the bells, and their decisions regarding the bells can be revoked by the Committee.
- 7. The Trustees and the Committee of the Guild would be grateful for financial help for the maintenance of the handbells from members who have enjoyed the use of them.

#### STRIKING COMPETITION RULES

- The competition shall take place on the third Saturday in May or on any other date as shall be decided by the Committee.
- All bons fide members of the Guild may compete providing their subscriptions are paid.
- 3. No member may ring in more than one piece.
- 4. A band competing as a representative band of a particular tower must have at least four members shown in the annual report as members of that tower, or who are bona fide Sunday Service ringers at that tower.
- 5. Each band must have a representative present at the draw, the time of the draw to be advertised in The Ringing World.
- Two minutes round ringing and stand will be allowed for practice before the test piece.
- 7. The test piece will be 240 true changes of any recognised Doubles or Minor method. In the event of a team ringing Doubles a cover bell must be used. The length of the test piece may be shortened at the discretion of the Ringing Master in the event of a large entry.
- 8. A reserve ringer, appointed by the Ringing Master, will be available to teams meeting short, at the discretion of the Ringing Master.
- Three judges, appointed by the Committee, will be present. Their decision is final.
- 10. The Mitson Shield is, and shall always remain, the sole property of the Guild, which may at any time given directions for its location, safe keeping, etc.

- 10 Excellent. Ball bearings, modern frame and fittings.
- 9 Excellent. Plain bearings, modern frame and fittings-or ball bearings in an old frame.
- 8 Good going order.
- 7 Fair going order.
- 6 Poor going order.
- 5 Ringuble if cleaned up and odd fittings and ropes provided.
- 4 Ringable with difficulty and a degree of risk after making odd repairs.
- 3 Unringable mainly because of tower and/or frame arrangement and position.
- 2 Unringable mainly because of frame and/or fittings.
- 1 Hung dead.
- 0 Some bells unhung and on the ground.

#### GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

At the end of my Report for 1974 I tried to encourage members to take a more active part in the working of the Guild. Looking back over 1975 I find is a very discouraging exercise for I can see little that has happened which could be of much significance in the annals of the Guild. Our membership has fallen - perhaps this was to be expected after an increase in subscriptions - but surely two pence a week is not much to ask as an annual subscription. It has been said that the Guild does nothing for its members but I would counter that with the answer that one gets out of the Guild just as much (or perhaps more) as one is prepared to contribute. It is worth asking oneself the question 'What do I do for the Guild?' and if the answer is 'Nothing' then ask of oneself'What can I do to help the Guild?' I feel sure that there is some useful contribution that each and every member could make and there is a mass of work to be done around the Diocess.

In April the Annual General Meeting was held in Ipswich with the Bervice at St. Margaret's Church and the tea and business meeting in the Garrett Memorial Hall. There was a good gathering of members and a fine tea prepared by the local ladies was followed by a somewhat livlier than usual meeting, the contentious part of which resulted in a recommendation that the Committee look closely at our Constitution and Rules. The Striking Competition was held at Nayland and attracted the biggest entry ever. This was perhaps the most encouraging part of the year. Two General Meetings were held - one at Stonham Aspal and the other at Buxhall. On both occasions the Central District were most generous in allowing us to take over parts of their meetings. As a result the final necessary adjustments to the Constitution were approved and I am pleased to report that the Guild is now registored as a Charity. The amendments can be seen elsewhere in the Report.

The Executive Committee has met three times during the year and dealt with the routine administration of the Guill. The most important decision was, as a result of the proposal at the A.G.M., was to set up a small representative subcommittee to scrutinise our Constitution and Rules and to finally report back to the Committee and then the Guild any recommendations which they may have. Your Executive Committee representatives and your Rules sub-committee representatives should have kept you up to date on all these meetings. Your Central Council delegates attended the meeting at Lincoln and detailed reports of that occassion appeared in the 'Ringing World'. At the time of writing this report the Rules sub-committee (Principal Officers and a representative from each District) has met only once. It took a considerable time to elect all the District representatives to this sub-committee and hence we have only had time to meet on a single occassion. Another meeting is planned before the 1976 A.G.M. Some interesting ideas were exchanged and all agreed that there was need for some changes.

There has been an encouraging response to our invitation to members of the clergy to join us as Honorary Members and support our work, but alas, as I have already said, our membership of ringing members has fallen. Is this the old problem of forgetting to may subscriptions I wonder? It is up to each member to pay his tower secretary or District Secretary and not to sit back and wait to be asked for the money. Probably because of this (there are other factors too) the information needed to produce this year's Report has been coming in slowly and your Report Editor has had a very difficult time. We hope the Report is available at the proper time.

In this Report for 1975 I seem to have had several 'moans'. I offer no apology for this since I feel that the real drive and enthusiasm must come from the members themselves and not from just a few who may hold office. To those who have held office and worked hard for the Guild and to support me I offer my sincere thanks. In welcoming those of you who are new of Office, especially in the Districts, may I ask you not to be disheartened by this rather uneventful year of 1975 but to be spurred on to stimulate more interest and activity in 1976? All of your Officers are working hard to try and make the coming year one more worthy of note.

My thanks again this year to all of you who have so warmly welcomed my family and I where ever we have been during the past year.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

I have decided to separate the Treasurer's Report from my other report in the hope that it will be easier for members to understand. With the increase in subscription rates one would expect an increased income but this has not been as much as was hoped for because of the reasons mentioned in the Secretary's Report. However, as the Balance Sheet shows, I have been able to transfer the sum of £238.50 to the Restoration Account. This account has benefited also from collections and donations from some generous people and P.C.C.s. Two groups deserve special mention - the ladies who prepared the A.G.M. tea and, having collected payment for the food, decided to donate the money (and their time) to Guild funds and secondly the magnificent efforts of those who run the Guild Social, whose work enabled £43 profit to be put into the Restoration Account. The initiative and effort of Roger Peters (Chief Tie Salesman) must not go unmentioned. So far we have made a profit of £8.47 on this venture but if Roger can sell the remainder of his superb ties to members we stand to make a total profit of £57.67. Have you bought a tie yet? The balance of the Restoration Account looks very pleasing but we must not be too complacent for £895 of this is already promised in various grants.

The balance of the General Account is reasonable and allows the normal working of the Guild. The payments shown as 'Donations to Bell Funds' were made at the request of relatives of deceased members in lieu of wreaths. We also have (at 31st December, 1975) a credit balance of £13.67 at the 'Ringing World' Office. By keeping this account in credit we obtain a significant discount on charges levied for Guild advertisements. The payment for the Report Editor's cory of the 'Ringing World' is lower than it should be - he claimed at the old rates! A new batch of receipt books was needed during the year and a small account book has been purchased to record the details of the Jubilee Fund.

The Jubilee Fund showed little activity for the year - the increased balance is due solely to the addition of bank interest.

The £60 float which was originally given to the Maintenance sub-committee has been accounted for in detail. Much of the money was converted to stock which was distributed to the various Districts. Some payments for work done and donations have been received but they were shown on the 1974 balance sheet under the general heading of 'Donations'. Should you require details of stock held I suggest you contact your District Maintenance Officer whose name is to be found listed with the names of other District Officers.

The Finance sub-committee hope, in the near future, to be able to advise the Guild on more profitable ways of investing funds now that we can draw on the expertise of the Charity Commissioners.

#### RINGING MASTER'S REPORT

The most cursory glance at the pages of 'The Ringing World' during 1975 would have given you the correct impression that the number of peals and quarter peals rung in the Diocese during this year has been smaller than for several years past. I know that the increased cost of travel has contributed to the decline in the number of peals being attempted, but a more prominent factor is a growing reluctance amongst members even to attempt peals. Whilst I have never been one to advocate that all our members should indulge in peal ringing for its own sake, I do urge you to show greater enthusiamm when peals are organised to celebrate a particular national, local or even personal event.

We congratulate Stephen Christian, who called his first peal this year and those who rang their first peal - Margaret Barnard, Stephen Fincham, Evelyn Hartley, Geoffrey Grayston, Christine Jennings, Elizabeth Jennings, Carol Perry and Albert Wade together with those who rang their first peal on handbells - Christine Hayes, Alan Mayle, George Perry and Joyce Perry. This resurgence of interest in handbell ringing in the S.W. of the county is also to be seen in other areas, notably in the N.E. and S.E., and we look forward to reports of further progress in this field of our art.

One band in particular has concentrated on ringing in towers which have not been amongst the most popular with peal bands, Hepworth being their piece de resistance this year, with the scoring of the first ever peal on the bells.

Personal achievements in peal ringing have included Leslie Brett's 950th., Cecil Pipe's 900th., John Blythe's and Stephen Pettman's 300th.

The 1975 A.G.M. in Ipswich was well attended, and the Striking Competition at Nayland produced the best ever entry. Of the 15 teams competing, Grundisburgh emerged the well-deserved winners. It was good to see new teams competing, and we look forward to another keenly contested competition, in 1976, at Saxmundham.

I hope that in 1976 established bands will give serious thought to the possibility of attempting regular quarter peal ringing, with the aim of improving the repertoire and the striking of all members of that band. Without fresh goals and higher standards to aim for we all tend to grow stale. Don't drop your standards to those of your learners - aim high!

A survey of Sunday service and practice ringing during the year has shown a deal of activity in some areas, and a dearth of it in others. In the long run our aim must be to establish local bands at towers which at present do not have their own ringers. The Debenham band was established in this way, and similar projects are in hand at Harkstead, Stutton and Hollesley. Whilst 'circuit' ringing is better than none at all, the setting up of new local bands - which will involve much time and effort by those who undertake to train them - is another aim which we should have before us. Your District and Guild officers will be only too pleased to hear of towers where the establishment of a new band is a real possibility.

My thanks to all who have been responsible for regular Sunday service ringing and for organising teaching sessions, practices and peals this year. We look forward into 1976 - to the return of St. Mary-le-Tower and Earl Soham bells, and hopefully to a year in which we shall all aim to improve both the quality and quantity of ringing throughout the Diocese.

#### TECHNICAL ADVISER'S REPORT

Two major factors have caused concern in 1975. The first was the collapse of the top of Bildeston church tower and the second was the effect of galloping inflation on the cost of bell restorations.

At Bildeston the writer advised the parish in his detailed report of 1962 of the very unsatisfactory state of the bells, the frame and fittings, and the tower structure. In 1972 he visited again in connection with lowering the bells to safety and particularly commented in his report on the major cracks in the walls in the area of the staircase turret by the bell frame. Alas this area gave way on 8th May. 1975 when work was in hand to repair the tower. Now the belfry stage has been taken down and the walls will be capped off at this level. The west end of the nave and the south aisle were badly damaged and the cost of the repair work will be considerable. The diocesan inspecting architects have all examined the damage and naturally enough they will be looking at the towers in their care very carefully for similar signs of distress. It must be remembered that Bildeston is an extreme case where neglect had gone on for many decades and where we have been unable to ring for probably 75 years or so. The writer feels that the failure was most probably caused by a long standing roof leak in the centre of the south wall and the weakening effect of the staircase turret in this flint rubble structure.

The steep increase in the cost of bell restoration work has worried Earl Soham, the September 1973 estimate is likely to rise by almost 70% to completion early in 1976.

At St. Mary-le-Tower, Ipswich the bells were removed in 1975 and it is hoped to recast the front six, the eighth and, if funds permit, the tenor. A now frame will be provided with the front eight in a lower tier and the tenors above. With inflation still significant the founders are being urged to complete the work as soon as possible.

The Cathedral bells from the Norman Tower remain at Loughborough, but the Provost, the writer, the bell founders, and the Department of the Environment representatives met in London in October to discuss the project. The Department is having difficulty with the restoration of the walls, but the bell founders have been released to complete their foundry work including making a new frame and fittings and overhauling the ten bells. The bells were removed early in 1973 and the estimate was based on costs ruling in October 1971 so the delay already occasioned will increase the cost of this work considerably. The Department is pressing on with the tower work, and there is a hope that a sound lantern will be put on the roof as recommended in the writer's 1959 report to avoid noise nuisance in the area round the tower. No date can yet be fixed for the rededication of these bells.

The Hadleigh bells are due to be removed to Loughborough for their overhaul in January 1976.

The Bury St. Edmunds St. Mary's church bells have now been hung dead in the old frame. Chiming sallies have been connected to the clappers and suspended in the ringing chamber so four or more ringers can chime the eight bells.

At Newton by Sudbury the nave and tower are in the care of the Redundant Churches Fund, and the five bells, which were in a very poor state, have been removed. They are being overhauled and hung dead in the restored tower. The Fund has only limited resources, and unfortunately these do not run to rehanging the bells for change ringing. However, if Sudbury and Newton Green develop in the future the bells could be so hung if required. Covehithe church tower has also been put in the care of the Redundant Churches Fund.

Your Adviser visited Henley to investigate the hanging of the redundant Ubbeston treble above the ring as a clock bell. At Pakenham he examined the inside of the central tower where loose flints were dropping on the bell chamber floor. At Great Finborough he advised on the restoration of 16 handbells. At Long Melford the lip of the treble was catching on a bolt head in the top cill of the frame and he made appropriate adjustments to the securing ironwork.

Two bells cast by John Darbie of Ipswich in 1670 became available from Tivetshall St. Margaret, Norfolk; the treble would have replaced the cracked treble at Old Newton. Your Adviser spoke to a meeting of the PCC on the desirability of the project, but the parish felt unable to meet the expense which was about 60% of the cost of recasting. The second bell would make a treble to six at Exning and the writer contacted this parish but has had no reply. He has visited Ringsfield to get the pitch required for a treble to make a ring of four.

At Wickham Market the base of the octagonal tower is showing distress with vertical cracking. Ringing has been suspended and it is hoped that repair work will soon be put in hand. It will be desirable to rehang the bells lower in the tower and this will unfortunately involve the expense of a new frame and fittings.

Your Adviser has given written advice on Sudbury St. Peter, Great Bealings, Clopton, Tattingstone, Athelington, Cretingham, Darsham, Hawkedon, and verbal advice on a broken clapper at Thorndon. He has continued his examination of the Bowell foundry records, and certain tenor weights have been corrected in the Directory of Towers.

At Tunstall it is reported that the stay on the fifth bell catches some staging and the writer has a note to visit to see what can be done to remedy this.

At Burgh the structural state of the top of the tower is reported to have caused ringing to be suspended until repairs can be effected.

During 1975 your Adviser has continued his inspecting work and he has now filled in his report form for 365 of our Suffolk sets of bells. At Hepworth he made sundry adjustments and swung each bell in a full circle. The treble wants a new stay and some maintenance work is needed. In the longer term a new frame and new fittings are required.

At Framlingham the last major overhaul was in 1892. The tenor's elm headstock has a vertical crack in the centre and could cause trouble at any time and the ends of the heams supporting the frame require examining where they are buried in the wells. The writer gave his recommendations for a complete overhaul. Alas since his visit the Rector, Canon Bulstrode, has died, and it is to be hoped that his successor will be as energetic as he was to raise money to repair this fine fabric and its fittings.

At Haverhill the frame and fittings are by Day of 1903, and the bells need rehanging with new headstocks and fitted with ball bearings. The bells themselves need tuning, the frame needs tie rods vertically through the side frames and the bottom cill needs anchoring to all four walls, and the other fittings need overhauling. The state of the tower parapets was mentioned in the 1974 report and deteriorated still further. Now clamps have been fitted to prevent them and the owner pinnacles falling to the ground or on to the nave roof. Until these parapets have been repaired ringing has been suspended.

At Clare the frame and fittings are again by Day of 1900. The bells form the heaviest ring of eight in the diocese with a draft of 56 feet from the top of the frame to the ringing chamber floor. They are now not easy to ring. Some short term work would help to improve their 'go' but a full overhaul is now overdue. New metal headstocks, gudgeon pins and ball bearings are needed, the frame required vertical tie rods and anchors to all four walls. The bells require some tuning and turning to allow the clappers and clock hammers to strike where the bells are unworn inside and out.

At Cowlinge the five bells all swing N - S which is the weaker way of this western brick tower. With rounds being rung the top of the tower at parapet level rocks horizontally quite violently and there is a crack beginning in the centre of the west wall in a vertical direction which changes its width as the bells are rung. When changes other than rounds are rung the tower rock is not serious; analysis of the thrusts shows that because of the roping the horizontal thrusts from some of the bells are cumulative in rounds. Tests showed that if the fourth and second bells are roped on the opposite sides of the wheels rounds then produced little movement. Action is being taken to change the roping. As we can ring rounds for five minutes at a time it is vital that the tower rock is acceptable with this change. Any other change is quickly rung and another takes its place so the tower does not have much time to react fully to it. Until this problem is satisfactorily solved it will not be desirable to add a treble to make six. The frame for six and the fittings are by Bowell of 1909.

At Thelnetham a long standing roof leak has damaged the timber frame between the two tenors. The bells were rehung in a new frame with new fittings in 1907 and now the main bearings are badly worn. Fortunately the bell chamber floor is 2 1/4 ins thick oak so if a gudgeon pin did shear the bell concerned would not fall through. The fourth bell of 1603 is badly cracked in the crown and now has a very poor tone. Short term work was recommended to keep them ringable but a long term restoration is badly needed.

At Wattisfield the tower structure is badly cracked as is the fourth bell. The writer rang the four other bells in full circles successfully but the cracked bell has an incomplete pulley and was not swung. The tower needs repairing and the bells overhauled and rehung in a new frame set lower in the tower with new fittings. The fourth bell of 1584 had poor tone before becoming cracked and would best be replaced by a redundant bell of the right note and thickness.

At Gislingham there has been little change since the writer's inspection in 1954. The tower roof still leaks like a sieve. In 1962 he noted a crack in the crown of the third, and now the fourth is cracked in the soundbow. A new frame and fittings are vital here if the bells are ever to be ringable again.

At Poslingford the tower roof has been repaired and the bells are ringing again. At Stowmarket the upper part of the spire has had to be removed as being dangerous but the bells here are now ringing again. At Barking the wrought iron bell frame by Bowell of 1911 has been cleaned down and painted.

For some years now one of the writer's New Year resolutions is to shorten his report! He regrets that he must register another failure.

#### MAINTENANCE WORK

#### Central District

#### Barking

The entire bellframe has been cleaned and wire brushed down, then painted with 'Galvofroid' and red oxide. All nuts and bolts were checked for tightness and tightened where necessary. The entire belfry was swept out and all rubbish removed.

#### Stradbroke

All louvres have been replaced and repaired where necessary. All bearings have been cleaned out and lubricated. All pulleys have been freed where necessary and lubricated. Clapper joints have all been tightened and lubricated where necessary. The belfry has had a general tidy  $\mathbf{u}_P$  and been cleaned out.

#### Stowmarket

All clappers have been removed, rebushed, replaced, greased and adjusted as necessary.

#### Debenham

The belfry has been swept out and all rubbish removed. All woodwork has been swept down and treated with Protim. All new bell ropes have been fitted. The tenor clapper was taken out, welded, and re-fitted.

#### North West District

Maintenance Officer Christopher Nunn, 37 Bury Road, Barrow, Bury St. Edmunds.

#### Bardwell

New electric light wired in Ringing chamber. Floor under bells cleaned down, and repaired as necessary. Broken staves on ladder replaced. Ringing chamber floor cleaned down, and repaired as necessary. Headstocks, wheels, stays, sliders and pulley boxes treated with wood preservative. 4th pulley box repaired and re-fitted. Treble slider straightened. Treble and second slider stops removed, re-welded, and re-fitted. New pulley and pulley box fitted on roof of clock case, at the point where fourth's rope changes direction. All metal work was wire brushed down and painted with 'Galvafroid' and red oxide.

General Maintenance has taken place at Churches where there are local ringers at hand.

#### Keddington

The second clapper has been rebushed. The tenor pulley has been rebushed. All nuts and bolts on bell frame, and headstocks were tightened up. A flared out sleeve was made and fitted to the fourth to prevent the rope chaffing.

#### Clare

All pulleys have been rebushed. An ash stay was made and fitted on the 6th. All securing nuts and bolts on frame have been tightened. All headstocks, pulley blocks, rope chutes, stays, sliders, and also the east side of the frame have been treated with Wykomol +.

#### Haverhill

All pulleys have been rebushed. General maintenance work is also in hand. Unfortunately there is no ringing here at present, due to the fact that timber splints being placed round the parapet, also the pinnacles have been tied in as a temporary measure. It is hoped to start work on repairing the outside off the tower in the Spring, but much will determine on the amount of finance available.

#### Long Melford

All necuring nuts and bolts on frame and headstocks tightened up. The 3rd slider path has been re-fitted. The 4th pulley block has been resecured. An electric light point has been installed in the bell chamber.

#### Cowlinge

Repaired leaking roof. New downpipe has been fitted down North side of tower. The metal bell frame has been wire brushed down, as well as the headstocks, and all have been painted with 'Galvafroid' and red oxide. The wheel spokes and flanges have been repaired as necessary. Wheels, pulleys, stays, and sliders have all been treated with Wykomol +. A Harvest Supper was arranged by the local ringers, and their wives, with proceeds going towards the purchasing of materials to decorate the belfry next year.

#### Higham

The bell frame has been completly wire brushed down, and painted with 'Galvafroid' and red oxide.

#### Acton

Temporary repairs have been made to leaking roof. Repairs have also been made to the flagpole.

#### South West District Cont.

#### Stradishall

Leaking roof has been repaired. The downpipe in the ringing chamber has also been repaired. Resecured bearings of 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 5th to frame by means of longer coach bolts. All debris, has been cleaned out of both bell and intermediate chambers, and both swept out. Re made Lattice type grills for louvres and wire netting same. Repaired three rope chutes, and resecure to proper positions. The bearings have been cleaned out, new foam pads fitted, and lubricated. All securing nuts and bolts on frame have been tightened up.

#### Poslingford

Local builders have completed the new tower roof, also repairs to the parapet masonary. The following work was done by Walter Perry - The metal bell frame has been wire brushed down, and painted with 'Galvafroid' and red oxide. The clappers have all been rebushed. The treble headstock removed, and rotten parts cut out and new timber spliced in and capped with channel iron. The bell was then rehung Headstocks, wheels, pulley blocks, and stays all treated with Wykomol +. All bearings have been cleaned out and re-fitted with new foam pads, and relubricated. All securing nuts and bolts on frame and headstocks have been tightened. Ringing room walls have been replastered where necessary and the whole place has been redecorated. The rope guides have also been repaired. The bellchamber was completly swept out and all debris removed. The louvres have all had new wire netting put up.

#### J. C. G. Hagger - Sproughton

Gordon Hagger was the last of the pre-First World War band of St. Mary-le-Tower Ipswich, joining James Motts and Will Catchpoles' company as a lad in 1906. The entrance then was 1008 of Bob Major, and a pint of ale all round on acceptance. Gordon rang peals of Stedman Cinques and Treble Twelve and then between the wars lived in Debenham where he arranged the 1st peal of Yorkshire S. Major. This talented man will be missed.

#### W. W. Miller - Earl Soham

A true, salty countryman was Walter; quiet, wise and very able. Taught by the redoubtable William Crickmer and lifelong resident of Earl Scham, he was a fine striker in all the standard methods and loyal member of our Guild. One remembers his ringing of Stonham Aspal Tenor before rehanging, in his unconcerned way and his delight at a piece of good ringing. The Central District especially will be the poorsy for his passing.

#### E. Ambrose - Long Melford

Like his friend George Symonds, Ernest Ambrose was legendary and scarcely a ringer in Western Suffolk, Cambridge and Ely had not heard of him either on bell, organ or 'yarning'. His life is immortalised in his book "Melford Memories" and here we have lost a link with this Christian gentleman and the ringers of the last century around Lavenham and Sudbury.

May those past members and friends rest in peace. The Suffolk Guild offers its sympathy to the bereaved.
