OBJECTS

*The Guild shall be established for the promotion of ringing for Divine Service and in furtherance of this object:-

- 1. To promote and encourage the practice of bell-ringing.
- 2. To recruit, train and encourage bell-ringers in the practice of their art.
- 3. To cultivate the art of scientific change ringing.
- 4. To promote a proper appreciation of the ringing chamber as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment thereof; as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition; to advocate needful repairs and renovations and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the condition of bells and their fittings.

CONSTITUTION

- The Guild shall be known as the Suffolk Guild of Ringers for the Diocese of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich.
- The Officers of the Guild shall consist of: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese
 as President, Patrons, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary
 and Treasurer, Auditor and the Technical Adviser.
- The Guild shall consist of (a) Ringing Members (b) Probationers, (c) Junior Members, (d) Honorary Members (e) Life Members.
 - (a) Ringing Members may be elected at any meeting where there are five other members present; or provisionally by two other members, before starting for a peal. Ringing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in head. The subscription of Ringing Members shall be £1.00 per year. Ringing Members, on attaining the age of 70 years shall become Honorary Life Members.
 - (b) Probationers may be elected at any meeting where there are five other members present. This grade of membership is for those learning change ringing but who have not yet rung 120 changes on a tower bell or on two handbells retained in hand. The subscription of Probationers shall be 50p per year.
 - (c) Junior Members under the age of 16 years, who shall pay half the annual subscription.
 - (d) Honorary Members may be elected on a payment of £1.00 per year.
 - (e) Life Members residing out of the County to make a single payment of £1.00.

- 4. The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Treasurer, Report Editor, Librarian; Technical Adviser, Pearson Handbells Trustees, District Chairman (exofficio), District Secretaries (ex-officio), together with two elected numbers from each District, seven to form a quorum. The Committee will meet a minimum of three times during the year.
- 5. The area covered by the Guild shall be divided into Districts, each of which shall have its own Chairman, Ringing Master, Secretary and Committee, who shall be elected at the District Annual Meeting. Each District will elect two representatives to serve on the Guild Committee. The Secretary will:
 - (a) Arrange Meetings for practice.
 - (b) Arrange for instruction.
 - (c) Collect the subscriptions of all members.

 N.B. In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary, or Captain, or Ringing Master, who shall collect all subscriptions, as soon as possible after January 1st and send them to the District Secretary.
 - (d) Forward these subscriptions to the General Secretary together with his receipt book and details of any expenditure, at the end of the year for audit.
- The Guild shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, and shall loyally abide by the rules and decisions thereof.
- 7. The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds majority of the members present at an Annual or Special General Meeting provided that 14 day's notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to all members and provided that nothing herein contained shall authorise any amendment which shall have the effect of the Society ceasing to be a charity in law.
- 8. In the event of dissolution of the Guild any assets remaining after the satisfaction of all its debts and liabilities shall not be paid to or disbributed among the members of the Guild but shall be given or transferred to such other chemitable institution or institutions having similar objects to the Guild.

RULES

- 1. Subscription: shall be due in advance on January 1st annually.
- 2. Any member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st shall lose his membership. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid. Lapsed members may be reinstated on payment of 10r in addition to the annual subscription.

- 3. Should a Ringing Member, having paid five consecutive years subscriptions remove from the Diocese, he may without payment become a Non-Resident Member for such time as he continues to reside outside the Diocese.
- 4. All Ringing at meetings of the Guild shall be under the direction of a Ringing Master and shall be such as is approved by the Central Council. The decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.
- 5. A peal fee of 10p per rope is payable in respect of all peals rung for the Guild. Conductors are responsible for collecting and forwarding them to the General Secretary. No peal will be recorded unless the peal fees have been paid.
- 6. The Secretary may pay, on request, 2nd class return railway fare, together with a maximum of two night's hotel expenses to such representatives attending the Central Council Meeting, provided that the total indebtedness of the Guild for all representatives does not exceed £20 in any one year.
- 7. The Committee may remove a member from the Guild for a serious offence against the Objects and Rules, subject to appeal at a General Meeting.
- 8. The Objects, Constitution and Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting after three month's notice given at a General Meeting.

REGULATIONS relating to PEARSON'S HANDBELLS

- 1. The Pearson Handbells are the property of the Suffolk Guild of Ringers, under the care of the Trustees. They are loaned to any member of the Guild whose name appears in the current Annual Report, according to the regulations relating to the handbells.
- 2. The bells are loaned in the first instance for a maximum period of three months. At the end of this period they are to be returned to the Trustees by the borrower, and they may then be loaned for a further three months if they are not required by another member of the Guild. If they are borrowed for this further period, the borrower may be asked to return the bells to the Trustees if they are required by another member of the Guild. A member from another tower has priority over a member from the same tower as the preceeding borrower.
- 3. The bells are the responsibility of the borrower, after he has signed for them, until they are returned to the Trustees by the borrower. The bells are not to be loaned to anyone by the borrower without the prior consent of both of the Trustees.
- 4. The bells must be returned to the Trustees upon request. The Trustees should endeavour to give seven days notice if they require the bells and should return them to the borrower as soon as possible.

- If the bells are required for a particular occasion, they can be reserved up to three months in advance.
- The Trustees are responsible to the Committee of the Guild for the administration of the bells, and their decisions regarding the bells can be revoked by the Committee.
- 7. The Trustees and the Committee of the Guild would be grateful for financial help for the maintenance of the handbells from members who have enjoyed the use of them.

STRIKING COMPETITION RULES

- The competition shall take place on the third Saturday in May or on any other date as shall be decided by the Committee.
- All bone fide members of the Guild may compete providing their subscriptions are paid.
- 3. No member may ring in more than one piece.
- 4. A band competing as a representative band of a particular tower must have at least four members shown in the annual report as members of that tower, or who are bona fide Sunday Service ringers at that tower.
- Each band must have a representative present at the draw, the time of the draw to be advertised in The Ringing World.
- Two minutes round ringing and stand will be allowed for practice before the test piece.
- 7. The test piece will be 240 true changes of any recognised Doubles or Minor method. In the event of a team ringing Doubles a cover bell must be used. The length of the test piece may be shortened at the discretion of the Ringing Master in the event of a large entry.
- 8. A reserve ringer, appointed by the Ringing Master, will be available to teams meeting short, at the discretion of the Ringing Master.
- Three judges, appointed by the Committee, will be present. Their decision is final.
- 10. The Mitson Shield is, and shall always remain, the sole property of the Guild, which may at any time given directions for its location, safe keeping, etc.

- 10 Excellent, Ball bearings, modern frame and fittings.
- 9 Excellent. Plain bearings, modern frame and fittings-or ball bearings in an old frame.
- 8 Good going order.
- 7 Fair going order.
- 6 Poor going order.
- 5 Ringable if cleaned up and odd fittings and ropes provided.
- 4 Ringable with difficulty and a degree of risk after making odd repairs.
- 3 Unringable mainly because of tower and/or frame arrangement and position.
- 2 Unringable mainly because of frame and/or fittings.
- 1 Hung dead.
- 0 Some bells unhung and on the ground.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Reading my Report of last year and remembering my additional remarks at Lavenham I can see why it was that one member commented 'You gave 'em some stick!'. It was not that I set out to be offensive - merely that I honestly felt that there was so much more work that could have been done with just a little more effort from a lot more people. When I began the task of compiling this report and the District Accounts started to arrive the picture of the year's work took on a very dismal appearance - membership dropping and all the signs of lethargy. I knew this was not the true picture and my feelings were eventually confirmed. We have gained members even though we have lost many of the Honorary Members who joined in 1975. The activity of Guild members in the South West District rightly deserves commendation while some of the other Districts are 'ticking over nicely'. Although peal ringing is not the ultimate aim of all members it is often an indicator of Guild activity - not always encouraging this year.

The Annual General Meeting was held at Lavenham and those present for the business meeting filled the Church Rooms to capacity. The ladies of the District are to be thanked and congratulated for the excellence of the tea which was prepared under some rather tragic circumstances. Ideas for reorganising the Districts as part of the revision of the Constitution and Rules were well received by members and the Officers hope that the sub-committee's recommendations will be in front of members when we meet at Beccles in 1977. Saxmundham provided us with an interesting Striking Competition in May and where ever it is held, this event is a popular social gathering. The bicentenary of the birth of John Constable was celebrated with special ringing, including the first peal of East Bergholt Surprise Major.

The Executive Committee have met regularly at Buxhall and I hope that your District Representatives have kept you informed about those discussions; if not, then you should question them at your District Meetings. The same, of course, applies to the Central Council Representatives who again attended the Annual Council Meeting.

In September we saw the long awaited Dedication of St. Mary-le-Tower bells. This proved to be a very satisfying event and we now eagerly await the ten at the Norman Tower (the work is almost complete as I write this report) and also the bells of Earl Soham.

As a very successful change, the South East District held a barbecue following their June meeting. Could it be that similar events would help draw more people to District Meetings? The big event of 1977 will be the queen's Jubilee. What an opportunity for celebration ringing this will present and elsewhere in this report the Ringing Master has outlined his plans for the Guild's contribution.

Finally, but very necessary, I offer my thanks to all who have helped make my work a little easier during 1976; to those who have been newly elected to Office a hearty welcome. Please give these people your support. Thank you to all those of you who have welcomed my family and myself when we have visited meetings and other Guild events.

TREASURER'S REPORT

It seems that my decision to separate the Treasurer's Report from the Secretary's Report has been helpfull to members and I shall therefore continue this method of reporting.

1976 has been a reasonably pleasing year for the Guild and we do not appear to have suffered from the financial cramps which many individuals have had to bear. When we remember that the grant of £500.00 to St. Mary-le-Tower has been paid and then find the Restoration Account balance is still just over £100.00 more than last year we must be receiving a reasonable income. Collections were well up on 1975 as were donations but special mention must be made of £12.00 given by a peal tour band and the ever increasing profit (£66.00) from the Social. Roger Peters has only one or two ties left to sell before we can realise the full benefit from his magnificent effort. During the coming year we must expect to pay grants to the Norman. Tower and Earl Soham, not forgetting that a total of at least £645.00 is promised to these and other towers.

The General Account shows a balance of £63.28 - a little less than last year but nevertheless a reasonable amount. The Honorariun to Mr. Clouston was made on a unanimous proposal of the Executive Committee to help towards the petrol costs he incurred while visiting towers druing 1974 and 1975. The donation to the F. Sharpe and C.E. Wigg Memorial Fund was approved by the Committee as were the presentations of a record case and record token to Miss M. R. Brown and the Book token to Canon Waddington when he retired as Provost. The major item on the expenditure side of this account is the transfer of £234.00 to the Restoration Account. This is lower than last year because quite a number of the peal fees had not been paid at the time of closing the account.

The Guild is in sound financial condition and this is as we would all want it to be. We must, however, continue to raise more money so that we can be of even more help to the many pieces of restoration work, large and small, which need to be done.

RINGING MASTER'S REPORT

As I look back over our ringing in Suffolk during 1976 I am pleased that both the quality and quantity of regular ringing seem to have been on the increase. Of course there will always be areas where ringers abound and others where we are thin on the ground - but regular Sunday service ringing in many towers is of a very pleasing standard, and practice nights seem to be better attended, and to be providing for a wide range of ability. This is good. Whilst many of those who have learned to ring over the last several years are still with us and continue to make progress, the number of newcomers is still high and we are all united by our common aim of achieving as high a standard of striking as possible.

Whilst the peal total for 1976 is low, well over half the peals rung were arranged to celebrate a particular occasion or to extend the abilities of members of the band. It is good to see Yaxley, Easton and Thorndon back in the peal columns after many years absence. We congratulate Karen Allison, Elsie Braybrook, Marie Carson, Robert Coleman, Dennis Kiddy, Edward Maddex, Margaret Roberts, Jcanna Stewart, Edgar Wade, Nicholas Wade, Meg Ward and Christine Whiting on ringing their first peal; and Julian Colman, Christine Hayes, Edwin Hynard and Alan Mayle on their first as conductor. The Polstead 'all stars' peal was a great achievement. Our warm congratulations go to Leslie G. Brett on achieving his double ambition of ringing a peal on all 366 dates in the year and reaching his 1,000th. peal in 1976. This latter performance is the more remarkable when we recall that the vast majority of these peals have been rung in Suffolk, whereas other 1000-pealers have travelled widely to reach the same goal.

The Quarter Feal total rose in 1976, with special ringing for the Constable bi-centenary and a good number of Sunday Service quarters.

We had an enjoyable A.G.M. at Lavenham and the striking competition, held this year at Saxmundham, remains a popular event. Eleven teams entered this year, Lavenham taking the shield. The Bures weekend, at which many former pupils of Leslie Mills gathered, was likewise a memorable ringing and social occasion.

Now we look forward into 1977. I hope that we shall all make a special effort during Jubilee Y ear in peal and quarter peal ringing. We are marking Jubilee Day, Tuesday 7th June, by ringing the bells in as many parishes as possible throughout the Diocese. The District Ringing Masters will be co-ordinating ringing within each District: please give them your support and cooperation so that every town and village may know that we seek to serve, by our art, the whole Diocese.

TECHNICAL ADVISER'S REPORT

The major event in 1976 was the rededication of the restored ring of twelve at St. Mary-le-Tower, Ipswich. From the ringing point of view your Adviser was very satisfied with the result. The audibility of the bells in the ringing chamber is greatly improved by having the four tenors on top and the remainder in the tier below in the new frame. Unfortunately the reproduced inscriptions on the recast bells have some errors and omissions.

At the Cathedral the bells have now been returned to the Norman Tower and at the end of the year awaited rehanging. When this has been completed the outside faces of the tower are to be restored so the bells will not be available for swinging in full circles till later in 1977.

At Earl Soham it is anticipated that the bells will be rehung in January 1977.

Early in 1976 the Hadleigh bells were taken down and your Adviser inspected them in the churchyard. The headstock was still bolted to the crown of the tenor and when this was removed in the Loughborough Bell Foundry concern was expressed about the thinness and poor casting of this area. Your Adviser went to Loughborough to discuss the problem with Mr. Paul Taylor, and it is hoped that we have come to a solution which will save this bell for further use. The weight is only 22 cwt 51b for the note D, and recasting would involve a considerable increase in weight with attendant extra costs.

The gales in early January 1976 did considerable damage to our Suffolk church towers; at Peasenhall and Flempton pinnacles fell through the church roofs. Other towers are structurally defective, and we are now unable to ring at Pakenham, Mendlesham, Wissett, Ampton and the spire at Yoxford needs additional support which it is hoped to install in the Jubilee year 1977.

The very dry summer brought its attendant problems of bells becoming loose in their fittings; even with metal headstocks there is often a timber pad over the crown of the bell which can shrink. At Halesworth the tenor became virtually unringable and your Adviser visited and after replacing some washers got the bell tight in the headstock and as easy to ring as formerly. At Stonham Aspal the tenor gave similar trouble and attention to the headstock bolts cured the problem.

At Stratford St. Mary the Whitechapel Foundry has been rehanging the bells in the Victorian timber frame; it is hoped to bolt this down more securely to some steel girders installed by Alfred Bowell. This work should be completed early in 1977.

Stoke by Nayland has a new metal bell frame installed in 1956 and your Adviser found this to be loose in the walls as the grout round the ends of one of the main support girders was no longer bonded to the brickwork and the girder. There are also vertical cracks in the centres of the tower walls which change their widths as the bells are rung. Your Adviser revisited with the church architect and plans have been made to remedy the situation.

At Bramfield the detached round tower is badly split vertically and is really four quadrants all acting independently. The bells remain quite easy to ring, but it is clear that the situation will not be satisfactory until the tower can be held together by a reinforced concrete girdle.

At Henley the Ubbeston treble cast by William Culverden of London about 1515 has been hung as a clock bell above the ring of eight.

At Harkstead your Adviser reinspected the five bells and obtained details to specify the note of a treble to make six. At Tattingstone the ringers are looking for a redundant bell, note E 1318 Hz, and 2 1/8 inches thick in the soundbow, to make a treble to six.

Sudbury St. Peter, now redundant, has an ambitious project to rehand the eight bells for change ringing in a new frame for ten. We all wish Leslie Mills well for the speedy achievement of this scheme.

At Rougham your Adviser was asked to visit to examine the clapper joints. After ten years use the wear is much more than should be the case and he recommended close attention to the lubrication of these joints every quarter.

The notes on Belfry Care and Maintenance prepared by your Adviser some years ago for our Guild have now been printed by the Oxford Diocesan Guild as one of their technical pamphlets. He has now completed his transcription of the Bowell foundry records on a tower basis; it was interesting to note how widespread these towers are.

As his thought for the year your Adviser would ask each ringer to take a special interest in the structure of his tower and when the PCC has had an adverse architect's report on it to see that something is done to remedy the matter.

Alec Morris and his band of ringers have fitted new ropes, redecorated the ringing chamber, refixed peal boards and improved the lighting.

Ufford

A thorough overhaul of the bells and fittings was undertaken by S. Pettman and his helpers. The bell chamber and ringing room were cleaned and swept out and the topes checked.

Bredfield

William Barnes is to be congratulated on his efforts here where he has overhauled the bells and fittings. The frame was brushed down and painted. The bell chamber and ringing room were cleaned and swept out.

Harks tead

The local band have done a considerable amount of general maintenance work, including cleaning and tightening up nuts and bolts. New ropes have been fitted.

South West District

Maintenance Officer

W. A. Perry, The Willows, Stoke Road, Clare, Sudbury.

Great Thurlow

All frame bolts, bell and headstock bolts tightened up as required. Ropes adjusted, including one which was spliced. Broken stay repaired.

Stoke-by-Clare

All frame bolts and tie rods (top cill to bottom cill and in some cases to supporting beams) tightened up. Three rusted tie rods cut out and replaced with new ones (made and supplied by D. Smith). Bell headstock bolts tightened.

Cowlinge

D. Kiddy has re-roped the 2nd. and 4th to opposite hand. This entailed turning the wheel round and moving the ground pulley. New rope chutes were fitted for these two bells in the intermediate chamber. The rope guides in this room were also refixed. The bottom half of the ringing room has been cleaned down and damp proof paint applied. W. A. Perry made and fitted a set of rope guides in the ringing room (some 12ft. from the floor) and these have improved the handling. This has now completed Mr. Clouston's recommendations as far as D.I.Y. is concerned.

Long Melford

D. Rutherford has tightened up the large number of frame bolts (and bell head-stock fittings) used here.

Glemsford

It was noted that the bells went considerably better than in recent years and it is evident that G. Bloomfield has done a lot of work on them.

This is a classic example of a local steeple keeper doing a great deal of work without being noticed. We are fortunate in that three out of four towers in our District have such steeple keepers.

OBITUARIES

Mrs. S. J. Perry - Clare

Joyce Perry epitomised the happiness that a ringing family can bring into the Church and into the belfry. We mourn her passing at such a young age leaving her devoted husband and children, but are grateful for her example and contribution to the Guild especially in the South West District.

David Vincent - Wilmslow, Cheshire

David Vincent was a Stradbroke man and above all a character. Much travelled, generous, talkative, a competent ringer and highly individualist, one could not fail to be aware that sometime, someplace, David would be around! He was responsible for the augmentation of Stradbroke bells to ten for which village he had a life-long affection.

Solomon Barber - Wingfield

This grand old Wingfield gentleman of over 90 passed away early in 1976 and was ringing before the turn of the century. Along with the Filbys and the Riches these families have been the mainstay of ringing in the Fressingfield - Wingfield area for over a 100 years.

Alfred Chapman - Bedfield

Quiet, unassuming but very loyal this dear country man passed from us in September. He knew and rang with Ted Jenkins, William G. Crickmer and many another famous name in the Framlingham region and will be missed especially at Monk Soham and Bedfield.

Ernest Whiting - Pulham Norfolk

A highly competent eight-bell man up to Bristol Surprise Ernie was a prolific peal ringer and conductor, calling the greater portion of his 700 or so peals. Outwardly very abrupt, this concealed a warm heart and a delightful East Anglian sense of humour. He will be remembered along the Waveney Valley as long as Church Bells ring and far longer than his 90 years.

Fred Wade - Kessingland

Frederick died in October aged 73 and like many Sunday service ringers up and down the land, not in the headlines, but always in the ranks. We thank God for loyal servants such as he.

Rev. Alfred Neads - Polstead

Mr. Neads learned to ring as a young man in the West Country. He came to Polstead as Rector in the late 1950s but because of his health was unable to take any part in active ringing. He was however a most interested Honorary Member of the Guild, a great friend to all ringers, and especially helpful to the Polstead company.

We also remember Mrs. Eva Symonds (96), Mrs. Madeline Pye, Sam (Jimmy) Mills of Little Glemham, and any of our member's relatives. May they rest in peace.
