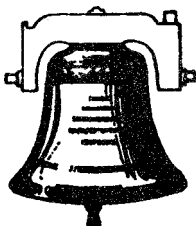

OBJECTS

The Guild shall be established for the promotion of ringing for Divine Service and in furtherance of this object:

1. To promote and encourage the practice of bell-ringing.
2. To recruit, train and encourage bell-ringers in the practice of their art.
3. To cultivate the art of scientific change ringing.
4. To promote a proper appreciation of the ringing chamber as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment thereof as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition; to advocate needful repairs and renovations and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the condition of bells and their fittings.

CONSTITUTION

A. Name

1. The Guild shall be known as the Suffolk Guild of Ringers for the Diocese of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich.
 - (a) It shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers and registered as a Charity at Law. (Ref. No. 266869).
 - (b) The President shall be the Lord Bishop of the Diocese and Vice-Presidents shall be elected at the A.G.M. of the Guild.

B. Membership

2. Membership shall consist of the following categories:
 - (a) Ringing Members. A person who can ring rounds efficiently on a tower bell.
 - (b) Associate Members. A person who wishes to support the Guild.
 - (c) Life Honorary Member. A Ringing or Associate Member who has given outstanding service to the Guild.
 - (d) Non-resident Life Members. A person who is qualified to be a Ringing Member, or Associate Member but who resides outside the territory of the Guild and who is not a member under either 2a, 2b or 2c.
3. Ringing, and Life Honorary Members only shall have voting rights and be permitted to hold Office in the Guild.
4. Churches within the Diocese may be affiliated to the Guild on payment of an annual donation.

C. Districts

5. There shall be four districts:
 1. North East District consisting of the deaneries of Beccles and South Elmham, Halesworth, Hartismere, Hoxne and Saxmundham.
 2. North West District, consisting of the deaneries of Ixworth, Mildenhall, Stowmarket and Thingoe.
 3. South East District consisting of the deaneries of Bosmere, Colneys, Ipswich, Loes, Samford and Woodbridge.
 4. South West District consisting of the deaneries of Clare, Hadleigh, Lavenham and Sudbury.

D. Government

6. The Annual General Meeting of the Guild shall be held on the Saturday following Easter or as shall be decided by the Guild Management Committee and shall be the ultimate decision making body of the Guild. It shall elect Guild Officers and set subscriptions and fees for the following year.
7. Members shall be elected to fill the following Offices:
Chairman: Ringing Master: Secretary: Treasurer: Maintenance Officer: Report Editor: Newsletter Editor: C.C. Representatives: Technical Adviser: Librarian and two Handbell Trustees.
8. In order that the Guild be run efficiently and it's Objects implemented there shall be three Committees established with the following responsibilities:
 - (a) The Guild Management Committee which shall co-ordinate all Guild activities; publish a printed Annual Report and audited Accounts and convene Sub-Committees as may from time to time be required, and shall recommend the levels of subscriptions and peal fees and other methods of raising money and shall organise general meetings and social activities.
 - (b) Recruitment and Training Committee which shall prepare training programmes for use in the Districts; provide courses for the training of Teachers of ringing and assist Districts in the recruitment of Ringers.
 - (c) Restoration and Maintenance Committee which shall maintain an up-to-date directory of towers, listing the condition of all Church bells in the Diocese; which shall make recommendations concerning the preservation and use of bells from redundant Churches; which shall advise incumbents and arrange such local restoration and maintenance work as may be necessary.

E. Finance

9. All money in the Guild's General Fund not required for normal working purposes shall be deposited by the Treasurer in such investments as may be directed by the Guild Management Committee.
10. All money in the Restoration Fund and the Jubilee Fund shall be invested by the Treasurer as may be directed by the Guild Management Committee. Grants for restoration work shall be made by the Guild Management Committee. Such grants shall only finally be made following approval of the Guild Ringing Master and Technical Adviser.
- 10a. One half of the subscriptions of Ringing and Associate Members together with one half of all peal fees shall be transferred annually to the Restoration Fund from the General Fund.
11. All cheques shall bear the signature of the Secretary or the Treasurer but any cheque greater in value than the limit set annually by the Guild Management Committee must have the prior approval of that Committee.

F. Records and Handbells

12. The Report Editor shall record all peals rung for the Guild and quarter peals rung in the Diocese and publish them in the Annual Report.
13. The Librarian shall maintain an up-to-date inventory of publications owned by the Guild.

14. The Handbell Trustees shall maintain the handbells in good condition and shall make such recommendations as may be necessary for the repair of the handbells to the Guild Management Committee.
- G. General
15. The Guild shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, and shall loyally abide by the rules and decisions thereof.
16. The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds majority of the members present at an Annual or Special General Meeting provided that 14 day's notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to all members and provided that nothing herein contained shall authorise any amendment which shall have the effect of the Society ceasing to be a Charity in Law.
17. In the event of dissolution of the Guild any assets remaining after the satisfaction of all it's debts and liabilities shall not be paid to or distributed among the members of the Guild but shall be given or transferred to such other charitable institution or institutions having similar objects to the Guild.

RULES

Guild Rules

A. Election of Members and Subscriptions

1. Ringing and Associate Members may be elected at any meeting by a majority of those present when proposed and seconded. Membership shall be exercised through only one District at a time, being the District under which the member is shown in the Annual Report. Subscriptions are due on election and thereafter in advance on the first day of January each year. Membership shall cease if such subscriptions are not paid within one year of becoming due. The subscription of members elected during or after October shall cover the remainder of that year and the whole of the next year.
2. The subscription rates for members shall be fixed at the Annual General Meeting and unless a change is agreed the existing rate shall continue. Full time Students shall pay not less than half of the full rate and subscription shall be waived for members over the age of 70.
3. Life Honorary Members shall only be elected at an Annual General Meeting and nominations may only be made by the Guild Management Committee or a District. No further subscription is payable after election.
4. Persons who have been Ringing or Associate Members for at least two years may, upon leaving the Diocese, inform their District Secretary that they wish to become Non-resident Members. No subscription is payable during the period of non-residence. A person resident outside the Diocese who wishes to be associated with the Guild may be elected a Non-resident Member as an alternative to Ringing or Associate Membership. A single payment of £1.00 shall be made at the time of election.
5. For the purposes of peal ringing new members may be provisionally elected in the belfry to the appropriate category of membership subject to the confirmation at a business meeting of the appropriate District in the case of a Ringing Member or at a meeting of the Guild Management Committee in the case of a Non-resident Member. If election is not confirmed the subscription shall be refunded.

6. Any member failing to conform to the Objects and Rules of the Guild may be expelled by the Guild Management Committee which shall report the matter to the next Annual General Meeting. Such a member shall forfeit any payment made to the Guild.
7. The Objects, Constitution and Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting after three month's notice given at a General Meeting.

B. Election of Officers

8. All Officers shall retire annually at the Guild's Annual General Meeting but shall be eligible for re-election. Nominations may be made in writing to the Guild Secretary or orally at the Annual General Meeting provided always that they are proposed and seconded. If more than one nomination for any Office is received then election shall be by paper ballot, the successful candidate being the one with the highest number of votes. In the event of a tie the Chairman shall have a casting vote. C.C. Representatives shall be elected in accordance with the rules of the Central Council during the second year of the triennium at the A.G.M. of the Guild.
9. The Annual General Meeting shall appoint an Auditor who is not a member of the Guild Management Committee and need not be a member of the Guild.

C. Committee Structure

10. The Guild Management Committee shall consist of:
Vice-Presidents, Guild Officers as listed under paragraph 7 of the Constitution, two Representatives from each District and two Representatives from each of the other Committees listed under paragraph 8 of the Constitution. Nine members shall constitute a quorum. This Committee shall meet at least three times per year. The Chairman shall take the Chair at all meetings of the Guild and the Guild Management Committee. In his absence the Chair shall be taken by the Ringing Master or in his absence by a person elected by the meeting.
11. The Recruitment and Training Committee shall consist of the Guild Ringing Master as Convenor and two Representatives from each District.
12. The Restoration and Maintenance Committee shall consist of the Guild Maintenance Officer as Convenor, the Guild Technical Adviser and two Representatives from each District.
13. Each of the above two Committees shall meet at least three times a year. At a meeting which shall be held in January they shall elect their two Representatives on the Guild Management Committee.
14. The Chairman, Master, Secretary, Treasurer and Maintenance Officer shall form the Guild Executive. In the event of a Guild Office being vacated between A.G.M.'s they shall make a temporary appointment until a General Meeting can be convened.

D. Expenses

15. The following expenses shall be paid by the Treasurer out of Guild funds:
 - (a) The cost of printing the Annual Report and any other publications authorised by the Guild Management Committee.
 - (b) The expenses of Guild Meetings.
 - (c) Stationery, postage, telephone, notices of all meetings and other incidental expenses.

(d) Insurance of Guild property.

(e) Central Council fees and reimbursement of Representatives expenses in attending each Council Meeting, not exceeding the second class return rail fare and a subsistence allowance as may be determined by the Guild Management Committee.

E. Peal Records

16. All peals rung for the Guild must conform with the decisions of the Central Council. All those taking part must be members of the Guild.

17. Conductors shall forward the following to the Secretary as soon as possible and not later than 15th January the following year:

(a) The names, addresses and subscriptions of any Non-resident Members elected in the belfry.

(b) The appropriate peal fees.

(c) Compositions for peals of Triples and above.

Money received for items (a) and (b) shall be passed to the Guild Treasurer.

F. Alteration of Rules

18. No alteration or addition shall be made to the Rules of the Guild except as specified in paragraphs 16 and 17 of the Constitution.

District Rules

19. Each District shall hold an Annual General Meeting during the last quarter of the year for the purpose of receiving a report from the District Committee for the previous year, electing Officers and arranging activities for the coming year. Members shall be eligible to vote or stand for Office only in the District through which they exercise membership in accordance with Guild Rule 1.

20. The Following Officers shall be elected annually:

Chairman: Ringing Master: Secretary/Treasurer: District Maintenance Officer: Newsletter Correspondent.

The Chairman, Ringing Master, and District Maintenance Officer shall normally represent the District on the Guild Management, Recruitment and Training, and Restoration and Maintenance Committees respectively but substitutes may be permitted. One other Representative to each of the Guild Committees shall be elected. The District Officers and one elected member from each deanery shall form the District Committee. A District may elect additional working Officers at its discretion to assist the running of the District.

21. The District Secretary/Treasurer shall collect all subscriptions and other monies due and forward them to the Guild Treasurer. A statement of accounts shall be submitted to the Guild Treasurer by 15th January. A directory of tower correspondents, lists of members and ringing times shall be submitted to the Secretary by 15th January.

22. The District Maintenance Officer shall endeavour to arrange for the inspection of every belfry in the District at least once a year and shall report his findings to the Restoration and Maintenance Committee at their January meeting. He shall be available to advise incumbents and shall provide leadership of local working parties where necessary.

23. The District Newsletter Correspondent shall report on District activities for the Guild Newsletter, the Ringing World and the local newspaper.
24. The District Committee shall be responsible for the efficient management of the District's affairs and shall report to the District Annual Meeting on the year's work.

REGULATIONS relating to the PEARSON'S HANDBELLS

1. The Pearson Handbells are the property of the Suffolk Guild of Ringers, under the care of the Trustees. They are loaned to any member of the Guild whose name appears in the current Annual Report, according to the regulations relating to the handbells.
2. The bells are loaned in the first instance for a maximum period of three months. At the end of this period they are to be returned to the Trustees by the borrower, and they may then be loaned for a further three months if they are not required by another member of the Guild. If they are borrowed for this further period, the borrower may be asked to return the bells to the Trustees if they are required by another member of the Guild. A member from another tower has priority over a member from the same tower as the preceeding borrower.
3. The bells are the responsibility of the borrower, after he has signed for them, until they are returned to the Trustees by the borrower. The bells are not to be loaned to anyone by the borrower without the prior consent of both of the Trustees.
4. The bells must be returned to the Trustees upon request. The Trustees should endeavour to give seven days notice if they require the bells and should return them to the borrower as soon as possible.
5. If the bells are required for a particular occasion, they can be reserved up to three months in advance.
6. The Trustees are responsible to the Committee of the Guild for the administration of the bells, and their decisions regarding the bells can be revoked by the Committee.
7. The Trustees and the Committee of the Guild would be grateful for financial help for the maintenance of the handbells from members who have enjoyed the use of them.

MITSON SHIELD STRIKING COMPETITION RULES

1. The competition shall take place on the third Saturday in May or on any other date as shall be decided by the Committee.
2. All bona fide members of the Guild may compete providing their subscriptions are paid.
3. No member may ring in more than one piece.
4. A band competing as a representative band of a particular tower must have at least four members shown in the Annual Report as members of that tower, or who are bona fide Sunday Service Ringers at that tower.
5. The Mitson Shield can only be held by a band as defined in rule 4 of the Mitson Shield Striking Competition Rules.
6. Each band must have a representative present at the draw, the time of the draw to be advertised in the Ringing World.
7. Two minutes round ringing and stand will be allowed for practice before the test piece.

8. The test piece will be 240 true changes of any recognised Doubles or Minor method. In the event of a team ringing Doubles a cover bell must be used. The length of the test piece may be shortened at the discretion of the Ringing Master in the event of a large entry.
9. A reserve ringer, appointed by the Ringing Master, will be available to teams short, at the discretion of the Ringing Master.
10. Three Judges, appointed by the Committee, will be present. Their decision is final.
11. The Mitson Shield is, and shall always remain, the sole property of the Guild, which may at any time given directions for it's location, safe keeping, etc.

INDEX AND DIRECTORY OF POWERS

The following table is used to show the condition of the ring:

- 10 - Excellent, Ball bearings, modern frame and fittings.
- 9 - Excellent, Plain bearings, modern frame and fittings - or ball bearings in an old frame.
- 8 - Good going order.
- 7 - Fair going order.
- 6 - Poor going order.
- 5 - Ringable if cleaned up and odd fittings and ropes provided.
- 4 - Ringable with difficulty and a degree of risk after making odd repairs.
- 3 - Unringable mainly because of tower and/or frame arrangement and position.
- 2 - Unringable mainly because of frame and/or fittings.
- 1 - Hung dead.
- 0 - Some bells ungun and on the ground.

While every effort has been made to ensure that the information given is accurate, the Technical Adviser would be very pleased to hear of any corrections.

TREASURER'S REPORT

This is the first set of accounts I have presented to the Guild and I would like to start off by thanking John Girt and the District Secretaries for their assistance during the year.

You will no doubt have noticed that the accounts are in a somewhat different format from previous years and are more voluminous. Part of the difference is the inclusion of the preceding year's figures to facilitate comparisons, but the major difference is the change from Receipts and Payments to an Income and Expenditure basis. Receipts and Payments is basically a cash basis and it has proved necessary in previous years to adjust the accounting period to ensure that the majority of the income relating to a particular year is included in that year's accounts. With an Income and Expenditure system of accounts it is possible to close the accounts down on a set date (e.g. 31st December) and make provision for all known commitments and expected income. The major expenditure of the Guild has always been the printing of the Annual Report and accounts kept on a cash basis (Receipts of Payments) are distorted because the income which generates the need for the Report occurs in one year (e.g. Subscriptions and Peal Fees) whilst the expenditure on the Report occurs in the following year.

The striking feature of this year's accounts is the special fund raising events which have raised over £43, £271 for the restoration fund and £172 for the General Fund. Our sincere thanks are due to Pat Bailey and her helpers in the North East and to the South East District Committee.

Treasurer's Report (continued)

The need for the increase in subscriptions, which came into force on 1st January 1979 (and are of course not yet reflected in these accounts), is evident. The General Account again made a sizeable deficit of £84 before the inclusion of the special fund raising activities. It is to be hoped that the doubling of the subscription rates will enable this basic deficit to be transformed into a surplus and the accumulated deficit to be wiped out. The Guild's aim over the next two or three years should be to accumulate a moderate surplus to cover such items as the bulk purchase of Guild badges without recourse to borrowing from the Restoration Fund.

The Restoration Fund is quite healthy and will be assisted in 1979 by the increased subscription rates. During 1978 two grants were cancelled because the projects for which they were originally approved were not going ahead and the amounts involved were not realistic in the current situation. The only note of caution on this Fund is that no new applications for grant were received during 1978.

The Jubilee Fund continued to accumulate interest but the purchasing power represented by the original bequest continues to depreciate in real terms.

The D.I.Y. Maintenance Account in no way represents a picture of the Do It Yourself work that has been going on in the Guild but merely reflects that none of the Guild's stock of materials has been used this year.

The Consolidated Balance Sheet brings together the individual Fund balance sheets. It will be noted that the majority of the Guild's surplus funds are now invested with the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England on seven day deposit, these deposits are currently yielding 11.3% (for the quarter ending February 1979).

The other assets of the Guild which are not formally listed in the accounts are the sets of handbells, which are held by the Guild on trust and are currently insured for £2,200, the Mitson Shield etc., the Guild Library, and the stock of badges and certificates which at 31st December were:-

Included with this annual report are covenant forms and explanatory notes thereon. I do hope that you will read these carefully and complete the covenants (if appropriate) as the extra income could make a significant difference to both the General Fund and the Restoration Fund.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

One of the suggestions advanced after the lengthy A.G.M. at horringer last year was that the Reports given to the meeting should not be the lengthy verbal additions to that already published. It is sometimes difficult to avoid this situation since something of the order of three months elapses between the writing of the written Report and the Annual Meeting. However, I will endeavour to curtail my speaking at the meeting and also be reasonably brief in this written record of the year.

A great deal of hard work has been done by District Officers as is obvious by the response obtained at District Meetings. It is encouraging to see people attending and willing to take on the work of the Guild. Your District Officers are offered my very appreciative thanks for what they have done during 1978. We must not forget the work done outside the confines of the District organisation by the Recruitment and Training and Restoration and Maintenance Committees, both of which have made a significant start. To all these people and everyone in the Guild I also offer my thanks for their help and co-operation.

It is difficult to compare membership figures with those of previous years because of the different membership grades now in operation. Overall we have passed the five hundred mark and have increased in size by about five per cent. We really ought to be able to show a more significant growth than that! It is encouraging to see that nearly one fifth of our members are Junior members - surely it must be our aim to recruit and train more young people to enable a thriving Guild to exist in the years to come.

Regular meetings of the various Committees of the Guild have been held with fairly good attendance over the year. The Central Council meeting was attended by all representatives at the start of a new Triennium when some interesting ideas on Restoration Funds were discussed at the open meeting.

The Striking Competition this year was held at Bredfield where again a well attended event was enjoyed by all in the warm spring sunshine. The South East District held an open day in July when large numbers of members and visitors spent the day 'grabbing' as many towers as possible. Perhaps the most significant event was the opening of the ten bells at St. Peter's, Sudbury. This event saw the end of the massive amount of work which was led by Leslie Mills who, with help from others and the support of the Friends of St. Peter's and the Guild, achieved what at one time could have been regarded as almost impossible. The Guild Social, 'under new management', had to move to Hintlesham because the usual venue was not available but this did not curtail either the support or the enjoyment of those members and friends who made the journey.

Last, but not least, our congratulations to Ann and Lawrence on the birth of their daughter, to Sally and Alan Munnings on the birth of their son, and to Mary and Alan Baker on their marriage.

Let us enter 1979 with added enthusiasm to recruit new members and consolidate the good work done in 1978. There is always something of use which every one of us can do to further the aims and objects of our Guild.

TECHNICAL ADVISER'S REPORT

Without doubt the great event of 1978 was the rededication of the augmented ring at St. Peter's Sudbury. The old eight with two new trebles had been hung with new fittings in a new metal H type frame of box girder construction just above the clock and a stage lower than formerly. The new bells and the frame and fittings were supplied by the Whitechapel Foundry, and Leslie Mills and his helpers did virtually all the erection work. This was a major task, and they are to be congratulated on a difficult job successfully accomplished. Work remains to be done coupling the clock to the external dials and fixing up the clock chime hammers and wires, and until this has been done it will not be sensible to do much to reduce the sound level in the ringing chamber where the bells are rather too loud. Otherwise the result is very satisfactory.

At St. Gregory's Sudbury the tower repairs are almost complete and it is hoped to have all eight bells ringing again early in 1979. Tower repairs have also been completed at Ipswich St. Clement and Yoxford, but Bramfield, Tunstall and Sproughton towers are now unfit for change ringing.

Clappers in the larger bells at the Cathedral, Ipswich St. Mary-le-Tower and Hadleigh have given trouble during the year. Those in the two larger bells at the Cathedral have been changed for new ones in spheroidal graphite cast iron as now used by both foundries with satisfactory results, and the other towers have been advised to do likewise.

St. Mary's Woodbridge tower rocks appreciably N-S due to the sixth and seventh which were roped on opposite sides of the wheels. Readings taken by the Whitechapel Foundry with their seismograph confirmed that an improvement would be obtained if the roping of the sixth was changed to the other side of the wheel and the writer understands this has been done.

At Stansfield your Adviser inspected the five bells cast at the Whitechapel Foundry in 1896 and hung in a new frame with new fittings at that time. Pigeons have made a serious mess in the bell chamber, the tower roof leaks and there are severe vertical cracks in the north and south tower walls. He advised action to stop further deterioration and keeping the bells in a ringable state for the time when the tower has been repaired. His view is that ringing the bells in changes now would be unwise due to the tower weakness.

At Horringer the writer found that excessive looseness in some of the joints of the two tier timber frame was causing four of the middle bells to be difficult to ring, and he recommended action to stiffen the frame to reduce this movement and this work has been carried out. In the longer term the bells do need rehanging in a new frame of different design with new fittings as the seventh is cracked in the crown, some of the bells are badly worn by the clappers, the present frame design is too weak, and the tower is cracked on the north and south sides by the roof.

At Mendlesham your Adviser re-inspected the bells after they had not been rung for some time. He found the equipment much as it had been in 1963 when he inspected and in 1965 when the treble was added. Certain maintenance work was needed but none of the bells appeared cracked, and in his view all could be rung in changes when required.

At Stoke-by-Nayland the writer visited to inspect the reinforced concrete girdle round the tower walls just below the frame support joists and found the frame now firmly secured to the girdle and the latter holding all four corners of the tower rigidly together.

At Baylham the writer re-inspected the bells after 20 years. Alas the very poor lead roof was still not repaired, and though a new frame support beam had been inserted by the east wall, the beam under the two tenors shows evidence of death watch beetle attack and requires treating. He recommended some maintenance work to keep the bells in a ringable state, but the outlook is bleak if the leaking roof is not dealt with.

At West Stow the tower roof leaks badly over the tenor and one side frame is appreciably weakened. The vertical tie rods through the frame and support beams have nuts on their lower ends and these are only accessible with a long ladder in the clock room. The writer did his best to tighten as many of these as he could reach. As he said in his 1972 report these should be reversed and have their nuts on their upper ends.

At Hesselst the writer re-inspected the five bells after a period when change ringing had not been permitted. This had resulted from a bell founder finding the tenor very loose in the headstock in 1970, this did not apply in 1978 when the bells were rung again. The Milla-combe chiming hammers were in a poor state and striking some of the bells by the lips and that on the third fouled the slider when in the fully lowered position. The writer has in hand adjustments to remedy this situation to permit the bells to be rung in changes or chimed from the manual when required. With the second and third bells cracked in the crown and a flexible frame the ring is not in good order.

At Stradishall the work recommended in his report of 1960 had only been partly dealt with, and five of the main bearings were loose in the frame and the latter was found to be distorting horizontally and vertically due to no bolts or tie rods securing it to the support beams. The side frame for the treble by the west wall was found to be shifting horizontally a little over $\frac{1}{2}$ inch. The writer has revised his recommendations and will visit again as the work proceeds.

At Offton the five bells were augmented to six and hung in a new H type metal frame with new fittings in 1959. Your Adviser visited to examine the possibilities of hanging two trebles to make eight; there is plenty of headroom above the present frame and in his view the scheme is quite practicable.

At Woodbridge St. John it will be remembered that the former spire had to be taken down due to becoming unsafe. Below is quite a large but low brick tower with at present a single bell of 1897 hung dead. The brickwork in the bellchamber is cracked in two areas, probably due to the former spire, but the writer feels that the tower would be very suitable for a light ring of six with a tenor of about 3 cwt.

Mickfield church has been declared redundant and has now been put on the market for sale as a private dwelling. There are three bells; treble by Thomas Mears II 1816, second by Miles Graye I 1626, and a badly cracked tenor with a chunk out of the lip by Thomas Gardiner of Sudbury 1716. If the sale goes through we may have to find homes for the second and if possible the treble; unfortunately the bells are on the thin side. The details are 27 $\frac{3}{4}$ and 28 $\frac{5}{8}$ ins. diameter, 1 $\frac{15}{16}$ and 1 $\frac{7}{8}$ ins. soundbow thickness, 1125 and 1055 Hz, C sharp and C natural.

We are still looking for a suitable treble to make six for Tattingstone. The project for a ringers' gallery had a false start in the faculty application stage but the writer now hopes that the idea is approved by the authorities leaving some access details to be agreed with the church architect. The main problem is to minimise the loss of light from the west window of the tower brightening the west end of the nave.

At Earl Soham the bells remain far too loud in the ringing chamber due to lack of a dead space, and our promised grant remains unpaid. It is hoped that this matter will soon be resolved.

During 1978 your Adviser wrote for the Council for Places of Worship what appears to be the first bell inspection manual. A copy is lodged in our library.

MAINTENANCE OFFICER'S REPORT

Last year has shown us a wider variety of works from the most routine simple job to installing a ten bell ring, which despite the vast difference was mainly confined to a few dedicated people. People like Les. Mills who organised the whole effort of getting St. Peter's, Sudbury a ten bell ring. His efforts with the support of his wife have amounted to a full time job. There are others who have spent almost three out of every four Saturdays in different towers, including the odd evening as and when needed.

We are only nibbling at a very large amount of work which needs your own individual involvement. I am unable to arrange a maintenance week, but if the more active members of our Guild spent two Saturdays visiting and keeping a weather eye on unmanned towers, attend to any small job, and if there is anything that requires urgent attention let the P.C.C. or incumbent know of the Church concerned. Please advise R.W.M. Clouston, your District Maintenance Officer, or myself, then we might be able to get things put right. An example is a tower which birds have gained access and have left a vast amount of rubbish, then perhaps the roof may leak onto this, the result is devastating to wooden frames and flooring.

At Horringer B. Wells, C. Nunn, F. Potter, C. Longridge and Susan Sargeant have completed the works recommended by our Technical Adviser's report. This involved fitting in a 6 ft. R.S.J. to help support the frame and involved removing and refixing the flooring, tighten up and clean up frame and fittings. The top tier of the bell frame has been made more stable. The tenor clapper bolt has been repaired and the clock hammer action has been improved. New stays have been fitted at Clare and Poslingford. Our thanks to T. Bailey and his friends who got Baylham into a more ringable condition.

St. Peter's, Sudbury - thanks and appreciation to our friends from Hobal Engineering who did so much work in lifting the bells and frame. Particular mention of the district members who rallied round and "humped" the steel frame into the Church, also to Archie Fitch who was one of our most regular helpers.

St. Gregory's, Sudbury -by the time this report is out we will have had the re-dedication of the tower and bells on 15th March. The host of district members who cleared the tower of rubbish, and at the time of writing am hopeful they will return to paint the frame. A. Fitch, W. Girling and W. Perry have cleaned down. It has been very satisfying at St. Gregory's, whose P.C.C. arranged and paid the accident insurance cover for the whole of the Guild's maintenance team for 1978/79. They also have given me a free hand to get whatever materials I require on account, for St. Gregory's. This measure of co-operation and the help my district have given me shows that things can get done. We just need some help.

I have outstanding work at Stansfield, Hessay, Stradishall, Hepworth, Great Ashfield, Mendlesham, etc. etc., - your help is needed.

My thanks to retiring district maintenance officers and welcome to their replacements.

RINGING MASTER'S REPORT

The re-organisation of the Guild into four districts, designed to coincide with ecclesiastical deanery boundaries, took place very smoothly at the beginning of the year and District Officers are to be congratulated on the way in which they have worked to make the new areas feel united. It is interesting to note that three of the four Districts have plans for their own Striking Competitions in 1979; from 16 years experience of the Guild competition we know that these occasions combine a right sense of striving to improve in our Art with a real sense of fellowship amongst those attending.

As a Guild we rang together on four routes of towers leading to Bury St. Edmunds on A.G.M. day. The Guild Striking Competition was held at Bredfield (the venue 15 years earlier for the first such occasion). The team representing Saxmundham Deanery had least faults; the Mitson Shield, for the highest placed band representing one tower, was awarded to Beccles.

Ringers from all over the county journeyed to Sudbury in October for the rededication of St. Peter's bells. Leslie Mills' enthusiasm and dedication, in fund-raising and organising work in the tower (including the actual rehanging), has given us a fine and much-needed peal of ten in the S.W. District. St. Peter's is unique amongst our Suffolk peals in that the building is redundant as a church - though being fully used as a centre for the local community - and the authority and responsibility for the bells (which normally devolve upon an incumbent) has been given to the Guild. Local ringers and Guild Officers are now experiencing the conflicts of opinion and interest, from ringers and the general public, which individual clergymen have borne for years.

Peal ringing activity (which some thought would decline after Jubilee Year) has increased slightly, 142 peals being successfully concluded. During the year Cecil W. Pipe rang his thousandth peal - a fine achievement for anyone. This thousand has not been rung in a young man's burst of enthusiasm, but crowns a lifetime's love of ringing. Other noteworthy personal achievements during 1978 included 500th peals rung by Ernest Pearce and Stephen Pettman and the 400th peal of Ron Steward. Amongst tower statistics we note the 200th peal was rung on Framsdon bells and the 100th at Ufford; the first peal was scored on the restored ring at the Norman Tower; and Baylham and Rendham return to the peal towers list after absences of over 40 years!

We congratulate David Coleman, Christina Cooper, Simon Girt, Michael Hayes, Susan Sargeant, Timothy Taylor and Martin Woods on ringing their first peal; Janice Baldry (nee Langley), Richard Knight and Ivan Ludbrook on their first peal as conductor and Christine Hayes on her first handbell peal as conductor.

We are pleased to draw attention to the fact that more peals are being rung on higher numbers of bells and in more intricate methods - in other words peal ringers are setting their sights higher. I hope that, with increased opportunities at Ipswich, Bury St. Edmunds and Sudbury for regular practice on easygoing higher numbers of bells, these trends will continue; and that they are an indication that the quantity and quality of Sunday service ringing is being not simply maintained, but increased. As a Guild we must keep in mind that our prime aim is the promotion of ringing to summon people to the worship of Almighty God. All personal aspirations and achievements in ringing should be secondary to our corporate effort to fulfil this aim.

The Recruitment and Training Committee, encouraged by the attendance and enthusiasm for last October's day course of instruction, will be organising a further day's course in 1979. We hope that tower captains and ringing masters will encourage ringers in their area to make use of this instruction day.

In concluding my 1978 report, I express very warm thanks to those who have been responsible for leadership in ringing at tower, Deanery and District levels during the last year. For 1979, let our aim be ever upward.

OBITUARIES

James R. Bailey & Arthur E. Cook - Rickinghall

Two life long friends died within a few weeks of each other, aged 79 and 75 respectively and have left the Northern part of our Diocese the poorer. These Christian gentlemen were mainly six bell ringers, enjoyed good striking and loved their outings and their meetings. Arthur served as District Secretary for some years.

Frederick E. Dunnett - Harkstead

A real character of the Orwell estuary - Fred. with his thick beard, pipe, heavy belt and his "dawg" Jake; a familiar sight laying nets from his boat on the river or walking in Harkstead village. He loved his ringing and his church and we shall miss him.

Arthur Gillingham - Ipswich St. Margaret

A member up to the outbreak of World War II he was one of three ringing brothers who all rang at two or three Ipswich churches. Arthur died in the Spring aged 80.

Harry Hollocks - Preston

Another well known six bell ringer in West Suffolk - one of the noted Surprise Minor band at St. Mary's and of course keeping company with the Lavenham tower nearby.

Harry King - Ixworth

A stalwart of the old Ixworth company, for years a small group that kept the Art alive in an area that really saw its heyday in the 1800's. Harry came from a ringing family and was a founder member of the Guild (1923).

Leslie Nice - Rougham

Rougham tower suffered a second severe blow in the loss of this gentleman, so soon after Mr. Rolfe. Sunday service ringing was his calling and pleased and proud he was to do it for many a long year.

Arthur Rolfe - Rougham & Bury St. Edmunds

At the time of his passing Arthur at 90 was our senior member, learning to ring at Chevington eighty years ago. He will be remembered as not only a devoted member of his church and Guild but a kindly and generous man; both to his neighbours and towards the furtherance of the Art. He rang 14 peals for the Guild, but liked nothing better than his touch of Stedman Triples.

Through his friend Leslie Wright he gave the treble to make Hartest into a ring of six.

John Frederick Tillett - Ipswich St. Mary-le-Tower

Ben Tillett as he was known, to distinguish him from his illustrious father Frederick John and his uncle Frederick William, was also a founder member of the Guild, joining the St. Clement's company first. Those were the days when entry into the St. Mary-le-Tower Society, then nearing its 12-bell supremacy in the land, was hard earned. He rang 56 peals for us, many of them the firsts ever rung on twelve.

Ben was rightly proud of his daughter Phyllis, who in the early thirties was a leading lady ringer. Like his father too he was an immensely strong man and liked his pint and his pigeons.

Arthur R. Woodard - Stowmarket

One of two very capable brothers (Claude died tragically in 1967), Roy passed away at the age of 71. Up to the war he was a very enthusiastic service and peal ringer, and rang many at Stowmarket, Stonham Aspal and district with Harry Lister and Garnham Blaxcell's band.

We also remember any ringers relatives who have died during the past year and the families of the above.

May they rest in peace.
