## REPORT,

#### Presented at Easter, 1924.

After the strenuous few years of the formation of the Guild, the first year of its existence since Easter, 1923, has been a quiet time of consolidation.

There is, therefore, little to record; there have been 76 peals rung up to the end of 1923, some of which were in new methods.

The Secretary has had a number of enquiries and requests for advice as to the management and re-hanging of bells, and several new companies have been formed; some new companies have joined us, such as Mendlesham and Easton. Unfortunately, there seems no diminution of the disastrous practice of "clocking," and so ultimately cracking bells, in spite of Dr. David's earnestly expressed desire. The Secretary does not know of a single parish where this practice is not considered the right thing to do at a funeral; we know how difficult it is to change funeral customs.

The question of Districts, and whether more general meetings should be held, are matters we should now settle, and also whether the Guild should issue a Certificate to its members.

No deaths have been recorded, except that of Mr. W. Grimes, of Hadleigh, who not only died "in harness" but actually in the belfry. His works do follow him—may he rest in peace.

#### RINGING MASTER'S REPORT.

The nine months from April 1st to the end of the year, 1923, produced 76 peals, an average of about two per week. Of these, four were rung in Essex, 12 in West Suffolk, and 60 in East Suffolk. Many bands have done well and shewn their loyalty to the Guild by their performances, but there are a few that deserve special mention. These are the two new Surprise Methods, "Lancashire" and "Edinburgh," at Leiston; the Double Norwich Major and Stedman Triples on Handbells by the Leiston band; the first Cambridge Surprise by a local band at Debenham; the peal of Surprise Minor by the Thornham men; and the Spliced Minor in ten methods at Wrentham.

# THE SUFFOLK GUILD OF RINGERS FOR THE DIOCESE OF

#### ST. EDMUNDSBURY AND IPSWICH.

#### OBJECTS.

- r.—**Federation.**—To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese, for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2.—**Recognition.**—To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualification for which demands much time, skill, and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3.—**Promotion of Change Ringing.**—To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Changeringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal-ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, and at a reasonable cost, instructors when and where required.
- 4.—**Reform.**—To correct abuses, irregularities, irreverent and unbecoming behaviour in the ringing chamber; to promote a proper appreciation of it as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment of the ringing chamber, as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition, to advocate needful repairs and renovations; and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the condition of bells and their fittings.

#### CONSTITUTION.

- 1.—The Guild shall consist of (a) Members, (b) Performing Members, (c) Honorary Members, (d) Life Members.
  - (a) Members may be elected at any Meeting when there are five other Members present. Or, by two other Members, before starting for a peal. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid.
  - (b) Performing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a Tower Bell; or on two Handbells retained in hand.
  - (c) Honorary Members may be elected on a life payment of £2 2s. od.; or 5/- for the first year and 2/6 in subsequent years; the other Members (including the Clergy), 1/- a year.
  - (d) Life Members, residing out of the Diocese, to pay 5/-.
- 2.—The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Ringing Master, Secretary, Treasurer, each District Secretary, and seven elected Members who may co-opt three other Members.
- 3.—All these shall be subject to election at each Annual General Meeting, held on Easter Monday at Ipswich and Bury St. Edmund's alternately.
- 4.—Each Archdeaconry may have its own Secretary, and hold its own Quarterly Meetings.
  - 5.—A District Secretary, in his District, shall
    - (a) Arrange for Meetings for Practice.
    - (b) Arrange for Instruction.
    - (c) Collect the Subscriptions of all Members.

#### RULES.

- I.—Subscriptions shall be due on January 1st: New Members elected after October 31st shall not pay a second subscription for the next year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st, and on being reminded, does not pay his subscription, shall lose his membership. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 1/- in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Junior Members, under the age of 17, may pay half the subscription and no entrance fee, but in that case may not vote at Meetings and will not receive a Report.
- 4.—The Committee may, at its discretion, allow a Tower to compound on payment of 1/- per bell yearly; this to include all the Ringers, Clergy, Steeplekeeper and Clerk; provided their names are sent to the Secretary with the subscriptions before Jan. 31st each year. Members who wish to be elected in any other month must pay the usual amounts for that year. As many Reports as there are bells will be supplied to the Secretary of a company so compounding. In return for this privilege, Members of such a Company should feel in honour bound to obtain as many Honorary Members as possible for the Guild.
- 5.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be such as is approved by the Central Council, and the decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.\*
- 6.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for serious offences against the Objects and Rules.
- 7.—These Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting, after notice given at a previous General Meeting, or at each Branch, or District Meeting. The Objects and Constitution can only be altered by a resolution passed at two General Meetings. Provided that the amounts of Subscriptions can be altered at a General Meeting after three months' notice.



# REPORT for the year 1924.

Steady progress has still to be recorded in the matters which concern our Guild. Not only have our numbers increased, but new members are coming in from towers not formerly interested in Change Ringing, while several new rings (e.g. St. Mary le Tower, Ipswich, Long Melford, Wilby) have been repaired and made available.

Appeals for help in teaching ringing or re-hanging bells have been received from the following, among others: Buxhall, Metfield, Hartest, Assington, and Hepworth. Instructors have been provided at Preston and Cowlinge, and new bands started, the latter is, I believe, still making good progress.

The list of members will be found to have been differently arranged, in that those who have rung peals are now put in a separate list. It has not been found possible this year to include the numbers of peals rung by members in the former ringing Societies, whether this should be attempted in future issues is for the Guild to decide; but there are practical difficulties in the way of making such a list correct, and if it is not to be more correct than it has been it would be best omitted.

Last year we were able to record all the new compositions. This year they have been so many that it has only been possible to print those of outstanding interest, but the Ringing Master has inaugurated a book, entitled, the "SUFFOLK GUILD COLLECTION OF COMPOSITIONS," in which every new composition will be entered carefully, as it is rung.

The only death among our members that has been notified is that of Mr. Charles Cutting, of Woodbridge. His health had been gradually failing, and it is long since he rang a peal, but he was always interested in our Guild.—R.I.P.

It is to be hoped that all our members will stir up their District Secretaries to hold meetings in their neighbourhood. Unless this is done the Society cannot do its work. Some of our Secretaries have done splendid work this year. Why not all?

# THE SUFFOLK GUILD OF RINGERS FOR THE DIOCESE OF ST. EDMUNDSBURY AND IPSWICH.

# OBJECTS.

- 1.—**Federation.**—To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese, for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2.—**Recognition.**—To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualification for which demands much time, skill, and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3.—**Promotion of Change Ringing.**—To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Changeringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal-ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, and at a reasonable cost, instructors when and where required.
- 4.—**Reform.**—To correct abuses, irregularities, irreverent and unbecoming behaviour in the ringing chamber; to promote a proper appreciation of it as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment of the ringing chamber, as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition, to advocate needful repairs and renovations; and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the condition of bells and their fittings.

# CONSTITUTION.

- 1.—The Guild shall consist of (a) Members, (b) Performing Members, (c) Honorary Members, (d) Life Members.
  - (a) Members may be elected at any Meeting when there are five other Members present. Or, by two other Members, before starting for a peal. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid.
  - (b) Performing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a Tower Bell; or on two Handbells retained in hand.
  - (c) Honorary Members may be elected on a life payment of £2 2s. od.; or 2/6 a year; the other Members (including the Clergy), 1/- a year.
  - (d) Life Members, residing out of the Diocese, to pay 5/-.
- 2.—The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Ringing Master, Secretary, Treasurer, each District Secretary, and seven elected Members who may co-opt three other Members.
- 3.—All these shall be subject to election at each Annual General Meeting, held on Easter Monday at Ipswich and Bury St. Edmund's alternately.
- 4.—Each Archdeaconry may have its own Secretary, and hold its own Quarterly Meetings.
  - 5.—A District Secretary, in his District, shall
    - (a) Arrange for Meetings for Practice.
    - (b) Arrange for Instruction.
    - (c) Collect the Subscriptions of all Members.

# RULES.

- I.—Subscriptions shall be due on January 1st: New Members elected after October 31st shall not pay a second subscription for the next year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st, and on being reminded, does not pay his subscription, shall lose his membership. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 1/- in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Junior Members, under the age of 17, may pay half the subscription and no entrance fee, but in that case may not vote at Meetings and will not receive a Report.
- 4.—The Committee may, at its discretion, allow a Tower to compound on payment of 1/- per bell yearly; this to include all the Ringers, Clergy, Steeplekeeper and Clerk; provided their names are sent to the Secretary with the subscriptions before Jan. 31st each year. Members who wish to be elected in any other month must pay the usual amounts for that year. As many Reports as there are bells will be supplied to the Secretary of a company so compounding. In return for this privilege, Members of such a Company should feel in honour bound to obtain as many Honorary Members as possible for the Guild.
- 5.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be such as is approved by the Central Council, and the decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.\*
- 6.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for serious offences against the objects and Rules.
- 7.—These Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting, after notice given at a previous General Meeting, or at each Branch, or District Meeting. The Objects and Constitution can only be altered by a resolution passed at two General Meetings. Provided that the amounts of Subscriptions can be altered at a General Meeting after three months' notice.



#### REPORT for the Year 1925.

The two outstanding features of the year 1925 are:-

- (a) The completion of all our Districts, each with its own Secretary.
- (b) The issue of the CERTIFICATE of Membership and Attainments.

As nearly 200 members have now received a copy of this, it must be said that there has been some demand for it.

However, while about three-quarters of the members have not applied for one, it shows that there is considerable slackness still among our ringers. All who have had a copy speak well of its appearance. It is sold at 6d.

The failure to arrange District Meetings in so many districts is also a feature to be deplored. A few of the District Secretaries are admirable workers, and in their districts the Guild is progressing as it should. However, the number of inquiries for help which the Secretary receives in a regular stream, shows that the Guild is, on the whole, making good progress.

Two outside events have interested our members, one is the destruction of the Coventry Cathedral Bells, a ring unique as a record of the skill of masters of the art of Bell Founding in the past. Your Secretary left no stone unturned to save these bells, but prejudice against old bells was too strong for him and those who were working with him.

The other matter is the meeting of the Central Council at Ipswich next Whitsuntide. A Special Committee has been formed, and an appeal has been made to welcome the Council to our County, a visit which not many of us can hope to live to see repeated.

#### RINGING MASTER'S REPORT.

The Peals rung by the Guild during the year 1925 number 68; showing a rather considerable falling off as compared with the 90 for 1924. That the number is so large, is mainly due to the efforts of two or three bands, notably those of Leiston, Debenham, and Helmingham.

There are few outstanding performances. The ringing of another peal of London Surprise at Helmingham is very creditable, as is the peal of Minor in seven methods by the Ipswich St. Clement's band. The Leiston company continue to maintain their reputation for Surprise ringing. The revival of ringing at St. Mary-le-Tower, Ipswich, after the restoration of the bells, and the ringing of Stedman Caters on handbells, the first by a local band in Ipswich, is noteworthy. It is also noted as a good sign for the future, that a good many members have rung their first peals in various methods.



#### SOME LARGE CLOCKS.

ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL CLOCK—was designed by Lord Grimthorpe (the great authority on large clocks), and was made by John Smith & Sons, of Derby, in 1893. The movement is the same size as the clock at the Houses of Parliament at Westminster; its frame being 19 ft. long, and rests on two steel girders each 28 ft. long. The main wheels on the striking and quarter-chime parts are 3 ft. in diameter, and the pendulum weighs about 6 cwt. The three dials are 17 ft. diameter. The hours are struck on a 5-ton bell (cast by Phelps in 1709) by a hammer weighing  $2\frac{1}{4}$  cwt.

BEVERLEY MINSTER CLOCK.—This was also made by Messrs. Smith & Sons. It chimes the quarters on a peal of 10 bells having a 2-ton tenor, strikes the hours on "Great John." weighing 7 tons, and shows the time on one dial 14 ft. diameter.

## THE SUFFOLK GUILD OF RINGERS FOR THE DIOCESE OF ST. EDMUNDSBURY AND IPSWICH.

#### OBJECTS.

- I.—**Federation.**—To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese, for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2.—**Recognition.**—To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualification for which demands much time, skill, and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3—**Promotion of Change Ringing.**—To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Changeringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal-ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, and at a reasonable cost, instructors when and where required.
- 4.—**Reform.**—To correct abuses, irregularities, irreverent and unbecoming behaviour in the ringing chamber; to promote a proper appreciation of it as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment of the ringing chamber, as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition, to advocate needful repairs and renovations; and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the condition of bells and their fittings.

#### CONSTITUTION.

- 1.—The Guild shall consist of (a) Members, (b) Performing Members, (c) Honorary Members, (d) Life Members.
  - (a) Members may be elected at any meeting when there are five other Members present. Or, by two other Members, before starting for a peal. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid.
  - (b) Performing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a Tower Bell; or on two Handbells retained in hand.
  - (c) Honorary Members may be elected on a life payment of £2 2s. od,; or 2/6 a year; the other Members (including the Clergy), 1/- a year.
  - (d) Life Members, residing out of the Diocese, to pay 5/-.
- 2.—The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Ringing Master, Secretary, Treasurer, each District Secretary, and seven elected Members, who may co-opt three other Members.
- 3.—All these shall be subject to election at each Annual General Meeting, held on Easter Monday at Ipswich and Bury St. Edmund's alternately.
- 4.—Each Archdeaconry may have its own Secretary, and hold its own Quarterly Meetings.
  - 5.—A District Secretary, in his District, shall
    - (a) Arrange for Meetings for Practice.
    - (b) Arrange for Instruction.
    - (c) Collect the Subscriptions of all Members.

#### RULES.

- I.—Subscriptions shall be due on January 1st. New Members elected after October 31st shall not pay a second subscription for the next year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st, and on being reminded, does not pay his subscription, shall lose his membership. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 1/- in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Junior Members, under the age of 17, may pay half the subscription and no entrance fee, but in that case may not vote at meetings and will not receive a Report.
- 4.—The Committee may, at its discretion, allow a Tower to compound on payment of 1/- per bell yearly; this to include all the Ringers, Clergy, Steeplekeeper and Clerk; provided their names are sent to the Secretary with the subscriptions before Jan. 31st each year. Members who wish to be elected in any other month must pay the usual amounts for that year. As many Reports as there are bells will be supplied to the Secretary of a company so compounding. In return for this privilege, Members of such a Company should feel in honour bound to obtain as many Honorary Members as possible for the Guild.
- 5.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be such as is approved by the Central Council, and the decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.\*
- 6.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for serious offences against the objects and Rules.
- 7.—These Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting, after notice given at a previous General Meeting, or at each Branch, or District Meeting. The Objects and Constitution can only be altered by a resolution passed at two General Meetings. Provided that the amounts of Subscriptions can be altered at a General Meeting after three months' notice.

## THE SUFFOLK GUILD.

## REPORT for the Year 1926.

The out-standing event of the year 1926 was the visit of the Central Council to Ipwich, at Whitsuntide. An excursion round West Suffolk was arranged and a tea given to all who were interested in the meeting. The weather was favourable and general pleasure was expressed by everyone at the arrangements made. Not quite sufficient funds were raised and it will be necessary to consider how to close this account.

It might appear to be only a reaction to this unwonted activity that fewer meetings of our own have been found possible this year, but this would not seem to be the true explanation. From all sides complaints are made that meetings are not being held; while it is difficult to get any but a few select towers to welcome meetings.

Apparently, owing to the gap caused by the war, the old and young ringers do not combine in as good a succession as in the past. It is true that in one or two towers the method of compounding has led to young ringers persevering and learning change ringing; may the number of such new towers increase. But most old ringers do not seem to have the patience or discernment to keep on helping to teach beginners, and so many ringers do not seem to have the time now-a-days to attend meetings.

It has already been pointed out that in our list of members there are 60 towers with less members than there are bells, where, of course, the Guild would gain if the Church Authorities concerned could be induced to compound; while there are 46 more towers where there are rings of five or more bells and no members at all.

There is here a good field for the Guild to work on besides the many towers that are not yet mentioned in the Report. Can we not make a move to get all Districts to hold at least one meeting a quarter and, in addition, to arrange a District Peal once a quarter? Once a month in each case would be better and should not be impossible. At every meeting it should be a rule to try to get at least one new tower interested.

During the year a number of towers have been visited by your secretary and reported on. At Yoxford the six bells have been thoroughly repaired and put into good going order, and a band of change ringers are being instructed, who are hoping to join the Guild. At Metfield the middle bell of the three has been welded by the firm of Barimar, and the crack seems to have been quite repaired.

We are asked to lend any interesting exhibits, such as jugs or sets of ancient rules from our belfries, to the Exhibition at the Church

Congress, at Ipswich, by September 26th.

## RINGING MASTER'S REPORT.

During the year 1926, 64 peals have been rung by the Guild, this being 4 less than the previous year. Peals on higher numbers than eight show an increase this year, as also do peals of minor, but the eight bell peals show a falling off of thirteen.

An outstanding event of the year was the ringing of the fiftieth consecutive Surprise Peal, at Leiston, a truly remarkable record, and a very good indication of the way this company is enriching our Surprise Peal list. The St. Mary-le-Tower Society have had a successful year, with seven peals on twelve, including four different methods of Maximus. The band located in and around Helmingham have again distinguished themselves with some good performances. The Lavenham band still remains almost the only peal ringing band on the west side of the county, and continues to add good peals to our records. Our six bell members have been more active during the year and several good performances are recorded, especially the peals in 6 and 7 methods, at Blaxhall, Thornham, and Wrentham.

A list of towers where peals have been rung during the year, and also of conductors, have been added to the report and should prove of interest.

# THE SUFFOLK GUILD OF RINGERS FOR THE DIOCESE OF

#### ST. EDMUNDSBURY AND IPSWICH.

#### OBJECTS.

- r.—**Federation.**—To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese, for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2.—**Recognition.**—To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualification for which demands much time, skill, and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3.—Promotion of Change Ringing.—To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Changeringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal-ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, and at a reasonable cost, instructors when and where required.
- 4.—**Reform.**—To correct abuses, irregularities irreverent and unbecoming behaviour in the ringing chamber; to promote a proper appreciation of it as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment of the ringing chamber, as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition, to advocate needful repairs and renovations; and to supply, when required reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the conditions of bells and their fittings.

#### CONSTITUTION.

- 1.—The Guild shall consist of (a) Members, (b) Performing Members, (c) Honorary Members, (d) Life Members.
  - (a) Members may be elected at any meeting when there are five other Members present. Or, by two other Members, before starting for a peal. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid.
  - (b) Performing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a Tower Bell; or on two Handbells retained in hand.
  - (c) Honorary Members may be elected on a life payment of £2 2s. od.; or 2/6 a year; the other Members (including the Clergy), 1/- a year.
    - (d) Life Members, residing out of the Diocese, to pay 5/-.
- 2.—The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Ringing Master, Secretary, Treasurer, each District Secretary, and seven elected Members, who may co-opt three other Members.
- 3.—All these shall be subject to election at each Annual General Meeting, held on Easter Monday, at Ipswich and Bury St. Edmund's alternately.
- 4.—Each Archdeaconry may have its own Secretary, and hold its own Quarterly Meetings.
  - 5.—A District Secretary, in his District, shall'
    - (a) Arrange for Meetings for Practice.
    - (b) Arrange for Instruction.
    - (c) Collect the Subscriptions of all Members.

#### RULES.

- I.—Subcriptions shall be due on January 1st. New Members elected after October 31st shall not pay a second subscription for the next year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st, and on being reminded, does not pay his subscription, shall lose his membership. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 1/- in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Junior Members, under the age of 17, may pay half the subscription and no entrance fee, but in that case may not vote at meetings and will not receive a Report.
- 4.—The Committee may, at its discretion, allow a Tower to compound on payment of r/- per bell yearly; this to include all the Ringers, Clergy, Steeplekeeper, and Clerk; provided their names are sent to the Secretary with the subscriptions before Jan. 31st each year. Members who wish to be elected in any other month must pay the usual amounts for that year. As many Reports as there are bells will be supplied to the Secretary of a company so compounding. In return for this privilege, Members of such a Company should feel in honour bound to obtain as many Honorary Members as possible for the Guild.
- 5.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be such as is approved by the Central Council, and the decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.\*
- 6.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for serious offences against the Objects and Rules.
- 7.—These Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting, after notice given at a previous General Meeting, or at each Branch, or District Meeting. The Objects and Constitution can only be altered by a resolution passed at two General Meetings. Provided that the amounts of Subscriptions can be altered at a General Meeting after three months' notice.



# THE SUFFOLK GUILD OF RINGERS FOR THE DIOCESE OF ST. EDMUNDSBURY AND IPSWICH.

#### OBJECTS.

- r.—Federation.—To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese, for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2.—**Recognition.**—To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualification for which demands much time, skill, and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3.—Promotion of Change Ringing.—To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Changeringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal-ringing; and to provide, as far possible, and at a reasonable cost, instructors when and where required.
- 4.—**Reform.**—To correct abuses, irregularities, irreverent and unbecoming behaviour in the ringing chamber; to promote a proper appreciation of it as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment of the ringing chamber, as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition, to advocate needful repairs and renovations; and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the conditions of bells and their fittings.

#### CONSTITUTION.

- 1.—The Guild shall consist of (a) Members, (b) Performing Members, (c) Honorary Members, (d) Life Members.
  - (a) Members may be elected at any meeting when there are five other Members present. Or, by two other Members, before starting for a peal. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid.
  - (b) Performing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a Tower Bell; or on two Handbells retained in hand.
  - (c) Honorary Members may be elected on a life payment of £2 2s. od.; or 2/6 a year; the other Members (including the Clergy), 1/- a year.
    - (d) Life Members, residing out of the Diocese, to pay 5/-.
- 2.—The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Ringing Master, Secretary, Treasurer, each District Secretary, and seven elected Members, who may co-opt three other Members.
- 3.—All these shall be subject to election at each Annual General Meeting, held on Easter Monday, at Ipswich and Bury St. Edmund's alternately.
- 4.—Each Archdeaconry may have its own Secretary, and hold its own Quarterly Meetings.
  - 5.—A District Secretary, in his District, shall
    - (a) Arrange for Meetings for Practice.
    - (b) Arrange for Instruction.
    - (c) Collect the Subscriptions of all Members.

#### RULES.

- I.—Subscriptions shall be due on January 1st. New Members elected after October 31st shall not pay a second subscription for the next year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st, and on being reminded, does not pay his subscription, shall lose his membership. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 1/- in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Junior Members, under the age of 17, may pay half the subscription and no entrance fee, but in that case may not vote at meetings and will not receive a Report.
- 4.—The Committee may, at its discretion, allow a Tower to compound on payment of 1/- per bell yearly; this to include all the Ringers, Clergy, Steeplekeeper, and Clerk; provided their names are sent to the Secretary with the subscriptions before Jan. 31st each year. Members who wish to be elected in any other month must pay the usual amounts for that year. As many Reports as their are bells will be supplied to the Secretary of a company so compounding. In return for this privilege, Members of such a company should feel in honour bound to obtain as many Honorary Members as possible for the Guild.
- 5.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be such as is approved by the Central Council, and the decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.\*
- 6.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for serious offences against the Objects and Rules.
- 7.—These Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting, after notice given at a previous General Meeting, or at each Branch, or District Meeting. The Objects and Constitution can only be altered by a resolution passed at two General Meetings. Provided that the amounts of Subscriptions can be altered at a General Meeting after three months' notice.

### THE SUFFOLK GUILD.

#### REPORT for the Year 1927.

The only outstanding subject during last year has been one of finance. As the year 1926 ended with a small deficit, the matter has had to be one of anxious consideration both of the members, and especially of the committee. They have met several times, and at length unwillingly proposed that the Report now in the printer's hands should be issued without the list of members, and this was endorsed at a general meeting. At first it was hoped that the deficit was only temporary, but as it has been increased during 1927, this is not the case. It is clear that we are spending slightly above our income. As the deficit is not a large one, and should be quite wiped out by printing the smaller Report for one year, it should not be difficult to pay our way in future if we all try.

There are several ways in which we can do this. The number of honorary members is very small, and could be easily doubled. This alone would free us from any anxiety in future. If a tower cannot get one or two people to be sufficiently interested in their ringing to pay 2/6 a year to the Ringers' Guild, it does not speak much for the skill they have attained, or for the pleasure they give to their hearers. We may be sure however, that that is not the reason, and that round every ringing tower there are several people who only need asking, in order to subscribe to us.

Another way is by every member getting certificates. Very many members have not yet got their membership certificates, while very few have applied for certificates of any attainment they may be entitled to. The Central Council is thinking of issuing such certificates, so evidently other ringing associations are not so backward as we are in applying for them.

But the chief way in which we can put our funds straight is by paying our subscriptions. In 1926 just 50 less than half the recorded members paid up. This is a matter of which the remedy is in our own hands. Let every tower see that all its members pay, and promptly. Let every secretary see that all the members in his district pay, and promptly, and we shall have all the money we want and more. The difficulty is largely about members who live at a distance. Obviously it is not worth anyone's time to make a long journey to collect a shilling each year, but could not every outlying member, or tower, be visited once; and an arrangement made by which the subscription in future years would be collected and paid with a minimum of trouble and cost?

So far we have made a good start, and in 1927 we have had 425 ringing members who have paid, against 347 in 1926.

#### RINGING MASTER'S REPORT.

The peals recorded for the Guild in 1927 have quite maintained the standard of previous years, both as regards quality and quantity; 69 have been rung, as against 64 last year, and 68 in 1925.

The outstanding performance is the Superlative Maximus, at St. Mary-le-Tower, which it is no exaggeration to say has set the whole ringing world talking, and as readers are no doubt aware, has provoked great controversy on method extension. Whatever views one may have on this, the fact remains that it is an exceedingly fine achievement, and the Guild is to be congratulated on having amongst its members a band capable of giving a lead to the whole exercise.

The Leiston band, to whom we always look for good additions to our peal lists, have not failed us, and have maintained their reputation as one of the leading eight bell bands in the country. We are pleased to note the appearance of fresh names in their band; a good sign this!

The band at Lavenham have again done well, and valiantly keeps the torch of change-ringing shining in the west side of the county. Congratulations are due to them on ringing the first peal of Superlative by a local band in W. Suffolk.

The band centred in and around Debenham have again been busy, and rung several good peals.

We are pleased to see another name peal this year, this time by a band of "Georges," rung on the feast day of their patron saint.

Several good performances are recorded on six bells, notably the peals, in seven methods at Benhall, in six methods at Blaxhall and Hasketon, and the peals of Bankes-James arrangement of Cambridge S. Minor at Sproughton. The Hasketon band is new to our list, and we are pleased to see also the Ixworth and Mendlesham bands ringing peals.

In addition to the ringing recorded in peals, there is a large amount of ringing done in the diocese by bands, who for various reasons do not ring peals, but who are nevertheless doing their bit to keep the East Anglian tradition of change ringing alive.



# THE SUFFOLK GUILD OF RINGERS FOR THE DIOCESE OF ST. EDMUNDSBURY AND IPSWICH

#### OBJECTS.

- 1.—**Federation.**—To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese, for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2.—Recognition.—To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualification for which demands much time, skill, and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3.—Promotion of Change Ringing.—To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Change Ringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, and at a reasonable cost, instructors when and where required.
- 4.—Reform.—To correct abuses, irregularities, irreverent and unbecoming behaviour in the ringing chamber; to promote a proper appreciation of it as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment of the ringing chamber, as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition, to advocate needful repairs and renovations; and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the conditions of bells and their fittings.

#### CONSTITUTION.

- 1.—The Guild shall consist of (a) Members, (b) Performing Members, (c) Honorary Members, (d) Life Members
  - (a) Members may be elected at any meeting when there are five other Members present. Or, by two other Members, before starting for a peal. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid.
  - (b) Performing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a Tower Bell; or on two Handbells retained in hand.
  - (c) Honorary Members may be elected on a life payment of £2 2s. 0d.; or 2/6 a year; the other Members (including the Clergy), 1/- a year.
  - (d) Life Members, residing out of the Diocese, to pay 5/-.
- 2.—The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Ringing Master, Secretary, Treasurer, each District Secretary, and seven elected Members, who may co-opt three other Members.
- 3.—All these shall be subject to election at each Annual General Meeting, held on Easter Monday, at Ipswich and Bury St. Edmund's alternately.
- 4.—Each Archdeaconry may have its own Secretary, and hold its own Quarterly Meetings.
  - 5.—A District Secretary, in his District, shall
  - (a) Arrange for Meetings for Practice.
  - (b) Arrange for Instruction.
  - (c) Collect the Subscriptions of all Members.
- N.B.—In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary (or Captain, or Ringing Master), who shall collect all Subscriptions as soon after January 1st as possible, and send them to the District Secretary.

#### RULES.

- 1.—Subscriptions shall be due on January 1st. New Members elected after October 31st shall not pay a second subscription for the next year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st, and on being reminded, does not pay his subscription, shall lose his membership. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 1/- in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Junior Members, under the age of 17, may pay half the subscription and no entrance fee, but in that case may not vote at meetings and will not receive a Report.
- 4.—The Committee may, at its discretion, allow a Tower to compound on payment of 1/- per bell yearly; this to include all the Ringers, Clergy, Steeplekeeper, and Clerk; provided their names are sent to the Secretary with the subscriptions before January 31st each year. Members who wish to be elected in any other month must pay the usual amounts for that year. As many Reports as there are bells will be supplied to the Secretary of a company so compounding. In return for this privilege, Members of such a Company should feel in honour bound to obtain as many Honorary Members as possible for the Guild.
- 5.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be such as is approved by the Central Council, and the decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.\*
- 6.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for serious offences against the Objects and Rules.
- 7.—These Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting, after notice given at a previous General Meeting or at each Branch or District Meeting. The Objects and Constitution can only be altered by a resolution passed at two General Meetings. Provided that the amounts of Subscriptions can be altered at a General Meeting after three months' notice.

#### THE SUFFOLK GUILD.

### Report for 1928.

We may hope that we have turned the corner as regards our finances. The deficit of nearly two pounds has been changed into a balance of over seven pounds. This is, however, only the result of our not printing the names of members in last year's Report. Unless we can increase our income permanently, we shall have to repeat this every few years, which would be undesirable. However, our paying members still increase in number; this year there are 490 ordinary members who have paid.

Unfortunately, the full list of members is still swollen by the inclusion of names which ought not to be there. Until we can get the Secretaries, both of Companies and of Districts, to keep a sharp look-out for these useless names, and get them removed from our lists with the most urgent promptitude, we shall still have to print them unnecessarily, and the Secretaries themselves will still be short of the amounts that are due from them, according to the printed list.

There have been much-needed attempts at instruction on all sides; the Halesworth District is responsible for quite new companies at Yoxford and Huntingfield, taught by the District Secretary, who has also helped three other towers in his district to revive their companies. There is unlimited room for work of this kind in the Diocese. Will each company see if they cannot make a dead set on some other tower in their neighbourhood in the coming year, and make it a new recruit to our Guild by teaching it Change-Ringing?

### Ringing Master's Report.

The peals rung by the Guild in 1928 total 79, an increase of 10 over the previous year. Handbell peals have increased from 1 to 14, and Minor and Doubles peals from 16 to 27. The handbell peals, with the exception of one in Essex, have been rung by two bands, those of Lavenham and Ipswich, and the latter are to be congratulated on ringing a peal of Oxford T. B. Max., the first on handbells since 1816. On tower bells 11 Surprise Major peals have been rung in five different methods, chiefly by the bands at Leiston, and the Debenham district. Peals of Double Norwich, Kent T. B. and Plain Bob are well represented in our list. It is pleasing to note the increase in the number of seven-method peals of Minor, and also the number of members who have rung their first peal for the Guild.

The St. Mary-le-Tower Society, deprived of the use of their bells for some time by the cracking of the 7th, are to be congratulated on ringing a peal of New Cambridge Max., the first in the method; congratulations are also due to Mr. Wm. Rumsey, of Debenham, who, as the result of a busy year of ringing, during which he rang 27 peals, is the first member to ring a hundred peals for the Guild.



# THE SUFFOLK GUILD OF RINGERS FOR THE DIOCESE OF

# ST. EDMUNDSBURY AND IPSWICH.

# OBJECTS.

- 1.—**Federation.**—To supply an organisation which shall unite the separate companies of Church Bell Ringers within the Diocese, for the purpose of mutual support and encouragement in the performance of the duties of their office, and in the practice of their art.
- 2.—**Recognition.**—To obtain full recognition of the ringers' office as essentially a branch of the Church's work; that ringers and their services (qualification for which demands much time, skill, and mental labour) may be placed upon a true and acknowledged basis.
- 3.—Promotion of Change Ringing.—To encourage, cultivate, and foster the art of scientific Change Ringing by frequent meetings in various centres for practice or peal ringing; and to provide, as far as possible, and at a reasonable cost, instructors when and where required.
- 4.—**Reform.**—To correct abuses, irregularities, irreverent and unbecoming behaviour in the ringing chamber; to promote a proper appreciation of it as a part of God's House; to encourage the bestowal of care and attention on the cleanliness and proper equipment of the ringing chamber, as well as the preservation of the bells in an efficient condition, to advocate needful repairs and renovations; and to supply, when required, reliable information and advice of a practical character concerning the conditions of bells and their fittings.

# CONSTITUTION.

- 1.—The Guild shall consist of (a) Members, (b) Performing Members, (c) Honorary Members, (d) Life Members.
  - (a) Members may be elected at any meeting when there are five other Members present. Or, by two other Members, before starting for a peal. No peal shall be recorded unless the subscriptions of all taking part in it are paid.
  - (b) Performing Members may be elected as soon as they have rung 120 changes on a Tower Bell; or on two Handbells retained in hand.
  - (c) Honorary Members may be elected on a life payment of £2 2s. 0d.; or 2/6 a year; the other Members (including the Clergy), 1/- a year.
  - (d) Life Members, residing out of the Diocese, to pay 5/-.
- 2.—The Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Ringing Master, Secretary, Treasurer, each District Secretary, and seven elected Members, who may co-opt three other Members.
- 3.—All these shall be subject to election at each Annual General Meeting, held on Easter Monday, at Ipswich and Bury St. Edmund's alternately.
- 4.—Each Archdeaconry may have its own Secretary, and hold its own Quarterly Meetings.
  - 5.—A District Secretary, in his District, shall
  - (a) Arrange for Meetings for Practice.
  - (b) Arrange for Instruction.
  - (c) Collect the Subscriptions of all Members.
- N.B.—In each company there shall be chosen a Secretary (or Captain, or Ringing Master), who shall collect all Subscriptions as soon after January 1st as possible, and send them to the District Secretary.

# RULES.

- 1.—Subscriptions shall be due on January 1st. New Members elected after October 31st shall not pay a second subscription for the next year.
- 2.—Any Member whose subscription is unpaid on December 31st, and on being reminded, does not pay his subscription, shall lose his membership. Lapsed Members may be reinstated on payment of 1/- in addition to the annual subscription.
- 3.—Junior Members, under the age of 17, may pay half the subscription and no entrance fee, but in that case may not vote at meetings and will not receive a Report.
- 4.—The Committee may, at its discretion, allow a Tower to compound on payment of 1/- per bell yearly; this to include all the Ringers, Clergy, Steeplekeeper, and Clerk; provided their names are sent to the Secretary with the subscriptions before January 31st each year. Members who wish to be elected in any other month must pay the usual amounts for that year. As many Reports as there are bells will be supplied to the Secretary of a company so compounding. In return for this privilege, Members of such a Company should feel in honour bound to obtain as many Honorary Members as possible for the Guild.
- 5.—All ringing at Meetings of the Guild shall be such as is approved by the Central Council, and the decisions of the Central Council shall be recognised in recording any ringing performances.\*
- 6.—The Committee may remove a Member from the Guild for serious offences against the Objects and Rules.
- 7.—These Rules can only be altered by a General Meeting, after notice given at a previous General Meeting or at each Branch or District Meeting. The Objects and Constitution can only be altered by a resolution passed at two General Meetings. Provided that the amounts of Subscriptions can be altered at a General Meeting after three months' notice.

# Report for 1929.

This year has been one of steady (if not very fast) progress. The difficulties about district secretaries are diminishing. Only one district, that of Clare, is not now efficiently staffed in this respect. We had, however, a very successful meeting there last year, and hope we may now soon find a secretary for that neighbourhood. The Halesworth district is very flourishing, and new bands are still being taught by the energetic and able secretary, Mr. F. C. Lambert.

Although our finances are improving, they are not yet satisfactory. In spite of a generous addition of over four pounds to our income this year from a whist drive at Sproughton, our balance has only increased by less than two pounds. As there is three pounds owing for advertising meetings in the "Ringing World," this means that we are not paying our way by more than five pounds a year.

Where bells are rung in changes, there are always some people in the parish who are sufficiently interested to subscribe half a crown to our funds. Forty such half-crowns would make us pay our way; there are many more than forty towers where there is not a single honorary member connected with the Guild. If none of our members in these villages will collect those half-crowns, will they not subscribe them themselves? Is not our Guild worth keeping as it should be kept?

## Ringing Master's Report.

During 1929 a total of 99 peals were rung by the Guild, the largest number since its inception, and an increase of 20 over last year. These peals have been rung in 41 different towers, 193 members taking part, of whom 31 shared the conducting; 34 members have rung their first peal for the Guild during the year.

A great variety of methods have been rung, all the standard ones, and many others, being represented, including a large proportion of the more intricate methods.

A few performances stand out for special note, and congratulations are due to the St. Mary-le-Tower Society, Ipswich, for placing the first peal of Yorkshire Surprise Maximus ever rung upon our records, and also for other good performances; to the Leiston band for peals in five different Surprise methods; to the Lavenham, Helmingham and Debenham bands for many good additions to our peal list, and to the band of well-known ringers who rang 12 peals during a week's tour of the county in September. Our 6 bell bands have not been idle, and the Hasketon, Wrentham and St. Clement's, Ipswich, companies, are to be congratulated on peals in seven different Minor methods. We welcome another handbell band in our midst—that of Helmingham—and it is hoped that they will make progress in this fascinating branch of our art.

May I again ask conductors to send peal reports to the "Ringing World." Two peals rung in 1928 have been missed from our report for that year through failure to do this, thus throwing the numerical order of the peals into confusion.
